It's very exciting to always have new officials come on board; but also, for existing TO's, to have the opportunity to continue to learn and update your skills.

The following requirements must be met before you start officiating on pool deck.

- 1. be a **member of a swimming club** within your State
- 2. have a **valid Working With Children Check** (WWCC or equivalent) uploaded on Swim Central (not a VIT)
- 3. have completed the **Community Officiating Essential Skills course**
- 4. complete the online training module & upload certificate on Swim Central
- 5. start training on pool deck
- 6. when ready, request a practical assessment.

- Recognise how effective communication can boost engagement and inclusivity.






Interacting and engaging with others

- Identify situations you may need to manage or resolve.

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


Recorder

Award:

Successful candidates should print their certificate and take it to a meet for practical assessment and accreditation. This may require prior arrangement.

Duration:

Less than an hour.

Prerequisites:

 None, although a basic familiarity with a swim meet from an audience perspective would be an advantage.

Study tips:

- You can access this course via a computer, tablet or smartphone. Headphones are recommended.
- Whilst we recommend that this short course is completed in one sitting, if necessary, you can stop and return later.
- Certificates may be printed on an attached computer or retrieved later for printing or saving.

Other things to know:

- Before working at a meet, you must have Working With Children clearance. It is easy to apply for online here, valid for 5 years, and free for volunteers.
- Officials should be members of a Swimming Australia club. The non-swimmer category is recommended. Apply via your club registrar.

In this 17 minute video you will learn:

- 1. Different types of timing equipment and how you should prepare for a meet.
- 2. Procedures at the start of the race, during it, and at the finish.
- 3. Determining times from up to 3 stopwatches.
- 4. Rules for records.
- 5. Additional duties of a Chief timekeeper including the stopwatch check.



Timekeeper

Turn on your audio. Start the video using the button on the left. Enable full-screen viewing with the button on the right. Pause using the button. Move forward or backwards using the timeline slider.
