



- act in good faith and loyalty to ensure the maintenance and enhancement of the Company and swimming, its standards, quality and reputation for the collective and mutual benefit of the Members and swimming;
- at all times operate with and promote mutual trust and confidence between the Company and the Members in pursuit of these Objects;
- at all times to act on behalf of, in the interests of, and in conjunction, with the Members;
- promote the economic and sporting success, strength and stability of the Company, and each Member Association and to act interdependently with each Member Association in pursuit of these Objects;
- ensure compliance with the by-laws, policies and rules as amended from time to time of FINA, SAL and the Company;
- make New South Wales the leader in Australian swimming;
- apply the property and capacity of the Company towards the fulfillment and achievement of these Objects;
- use and protect the Intellectual Property;
- collect, distribute and publish information in connection with swimming;
- promote and control state meetings, competitions and championships and to the extent relevant, promote and assist in conducting national and international meetings, competitions and championships;
- strive for governmental, commercial and public recognition of the Company, the Member Associations and swimming;
- promulgate and secure uniformity in such rules as may be necessary or appropriate for the management and control of swimming and related activities in New South Wales;
- promote swimming as a spectator sport;
- through or in association with the Member Associations or other entities or of itself, promote the health and safety of all Individual Members;
- pursue through itself or others such commercial arrangements, including sponsorship and marketing opportunities as are appropriate, to further these Objects;
- formulate or adopt and implement appropriate policies, including in relation to member protection, equal opportunity, equity, drugs in sport, health, safety, junior and senior programs and such other matters as arise from time to time as issues to be addressed in swimming;

ANNUAL REPORT 2010 / 2011

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

I am pleased to present to you the 114th Annual Report of Swimming New South Wales Limited and my second as Chief Executive Officer.

The booklet contains detailed reports on the competitions and developmental areas of the sport along with a summary submitted by the Chairpersons of each of the Board, Competitions, Technical Swimming, Projects & Membership, Technical Open Water Swimming and Audit and Risk Committees.

It will also address our significant achievements and awards as well as the Company financial performance with a comprehensive audit report.



Achievements

As you will read in the President's report the Company has had some major achievements throughout the year against our Strategic Plan. The Board has provided strong strategic leadership flowing through to the Operational Plan which in turn sets the projects and goals of the office staff.

The last three years have been of significant change for the sport of swimming in NSW and the focus this year has been about capitalising on these changes to ensure the continued improvement of our sport into the future. The Board and staff are well aware of the importance of continually evolving the administration of our sport to suit the modern day needs of our membership and this year we have aimed to achieve this through both increased and improved service to our members. We have begun to notice decreased participation levels in other sporting organisations that have not adapted to their members needs and this is a constant reminder that we need to remain particularly diligent in this area.

Accordingly, the key focus this year has been the recognition of the importance of stakeholder engagement when making significant decisions about our sport and we trust that we have been able to demonstrate this through the consultative approaches we have adopted. We have increased our staff presence across NSW and ensured these people are willing to engage with members to assist the Company in heading in the right direction. The face to face contact, sharing of ideas and working together to find solutions have proved invaluable and will hold us in good stead for the coming years.

The review of the Competition Strategy Policy is one area where we conducted extensive consultation with our stakeholders to ensure we got the document right, so the Policy will be able to provide positive outcomes for competition at all levels of our sport. We are now undergoing a similar process as we review the Development Structure Policy and we expect that this will have similar outcomes for our development programs.

This year also brought the completion of the Area Rationalisation process to an end and whilst this was, for some members a difficult time, it was a process that was essential for the longevity of our sport and now we can now use our new area structure as a stepping stone for continued improvement. At the time of writing we have 12 areas within NSW, down from the original 23 and most importantly the completion of this process has coincided with the continued employment of our regional development officers. We now have a total of seven (7) staff in the area of sport development, including regional development officers for Coast & Valley, Mountains and Plains, New England and North West, North Coast, South Eastern, Southern Inland and Western. We also have the Metropolitan Development Officer who provides support to the Metropolitan Areas.

The introduction of these Development Officers has greatly improved the two way communication between the Company and our members. We are now better placed to hear the concerns of our members and ensure that we can react accordingly, both strategically and operationally. Some of the key areas that our members have identified are the importance of Coach Development and Recreational Swimming. It is becoming increasingly evident that the Company's focus has been skewed somewhat towards high performance athlete development and over the coming years we will be working to address this and have an improved Coach Development pathway and also an increased amount of servicing for our grass roots level swimmers.

The Company was encouraged this year by the increased uptake of both the Online Registration and Meet Entry systems, with online registrations achieving uptake of 85% (up from 67% in 2009/10) and online meet entries regularly achieving over 90% for each event. It is pleasing to see that our members are embracing the new technologies that are available to our sport and we will continue to ensure that new technologies are made available and that they provide an increased level of service to our members. We will also be continuing to keep our website current and informative and embracing social media so as to effectively communicate with our younger members. We also hope to complete the upgrade of our online shop this year, so all our members regardless of their location will be able to enjoy the benefits of our Speedo Swim Shop.

Again this year we have seen continued improvements in the High Performance area particularly at the Open level, with an increased number of our swimmers being selected on National teams. It is also pleasing to see that a greater proportion of these swimmers are now coming from home coach based programs as well as the elite training programs that are in place. We are also beginning to see these home based coaches being selected as coaches on National Teams which is another step forward for NSW. There has also been a small increase in the performance of our swimmers at Age level, but this is an area we need to remain diligent with, particularly as our swimmers step up to Open level to ensure we have continued depth across the board.

Our events continue to be the showcase for our sport and this year we have introduced a number of new initiatives to enhance the experience for all stakeholders when they attend our meets. We have introduced online ticketing and merchandise for all events to help reduce the congestion in these areas especially at the commencement of meets. Online results are now available both on our website and on some portable devices including mobile phones. We will continue to ensure that our events remain innovative and at the forefront of swimming events in Australia.

Financial Performance

The Company recorded a loss for the financial year of \$78,926 however the size of this deficit was much smaller than the originally intended budget deficit of \$184,100.

The major reasons for the result are as follows:-

- ❖ Increased Donations, Sponsorship and Government Grants of \$87,000.
- ❖ Increased Swim Meet Revenue of \$85,000 due to increased entries and attendances.
- ❖ Increased Interest received of \$18,000 due to higher returns achieved on the Company's investments.
- ❖ Area Development Grants to the value of \$26,500 not being utilised due to some areas not undertaking sufficient development activities.
- ❖ A saving of Club Development Expenses of \$33,045 due to the costs saved by having regional placed development officers rather than transporting development officers to regional areas.

This gave the Company an Operating deficit of 138,000 and this was offset by our Swim Trade and Speedo Shop profits to the value of \$59,000.

The Swim Trade which consists predominately of our merchandise sales made a good profit this year, however the Speedo Swim Shop did have a disappointing year only achieving a small surplus in comparison to previous years. This was due in part to a cool summer and reduced patronage through SOPAC.

Whilst the performance of the Speedo Shop is disappointing and has contributed largely to the deficit we experienced this year, the Board is committed to ensuring our core activities are not affected in the coming year. The Board is also conscious that continued deficits of this size are not sustainable and will be implementing a slightly tighter budget for the 2011/12 year.

Membership

The membership figures as at year end indicate a small reduction in membership of 1.76% or 615 to 34,250. Interestingly, at the time of writing the Company has 35,053 financial members which represents a small increase in membership on last year's figure of 188 or 0.5%. Whilst this increase is small, it is an important change in the membership trend that we have seen over recent times of regular reductions in membership.

Overall membership is something that the Board has spent significant time reviewing over the last year and these discussions will culminate in a membership workshop at this year's State Forum. The key focus of this forum will be to identify the key barriers to increasing membership and what initiatives have worked for clubs in the past.

It is hoped that this forum will provide vital insight into initiatives that the Board can introduce to arrest the continued reductions in membership that we have experienced over the previous years. We also expect that our increased focus on the servicing of members through new programs and incentives will drive membership throughout the year.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

I am pleased to present my 4th Annual Report as President of Swimming New South Wales Ltd (SNSW). This report continues to highlight our performance against the 2008-2011 Strategic Plan.

The plan was comprehensively reviewed by the Board during the latter part of the year which resulted in the inclusion of some revised or varied strategies. Development of a new plan for 2012 and beyond will take place later this year and following receipt of updated strategic guidance from Swimming Australia. In the meantime we have continued to conduct our business against the four strategic pillars of High Performance, Swimming Development, Business development and People Development.



Looking at our vision, swimming as a pastime looms large in any survey of people's leisure time. Our task is to translate this informal leisure activity into more tangible club membership. To do this, clubs need to be pro-active in channeling new members across from learn to swim providers and the school swimming scene. Current figures reveal a membership turnover of about 30% each year which is understandable given our member's young age profile. The Board has been driving towards measures which might provide programs and incentives for our swimmers to continue on in our sport not only during their competitive phase but beyond as a healthy lifestyle pursuit. Our performance against the remaining aspects of our vision is covered throughout this report.

The Board also reviewed the eight overarching objectives originally developed with member ideas at the October 2007 President's meeting. It was agreed that these objectives still represented our fundamental requirements within the context of the Strategic Plan.

I now turn to a consideration of the four pillars:

HIGH PERFORMANCE

Our relationship with the NSW Institute of Sport (NSWIS) is a vital component of our high performance strategy. SNSW contributes \$180,000 a year to the NSWIS swimming program in support of our high performance objectives. Jim Fowle operates as the joint swimming head coach of SNSW and NSWIS. Our CEO and I are members of a joint management committee which oversees these programs. We have stressed the need to maintain effort on the coach education and development aspect of their charter. The NSWIS employment of former Olympic coach, Brian Sutton, as a coach mentor is aimed towards improving coaching standards and as a consequence, improving the performance of home based swimmers.

Our performance targets for 2010-2011 included a five percent improved medal count at national meets. The 2010 results showed a healthy 90% gold, 38% silver and 30% bronze medal improvement at the national open championships. At the time of writing, the 2011 results, which will be formally reported next year, indicate that the ground made up has been surrendered and that much more work needs to be done to bring NSW performance levels to the necessary standard. The 2010 national age results provided a 41% gold, 67% silver and 33% bronze medal improvement. However our national short course results showed a slight decline. Congratulations are extended to all who achieved success at our various championships. Overall we achieved significant improvement over previous years but we still languish in comparison to the Queensland performances at these meets.

We continued to concentrate on our development and competition policies throughout the year, having implemented the new policies during April. The competition policy was fully reviewed after the winter season and discussed in detail at the Area President's meeting. A revised policy incorporating agreed outcomes was implemented in November.

Participation rates have increased across all levels of competition and we have met our performance measure. Internationally, SNSW provided 76 swimmers across ten national teams which is an 18% improvement over the previous year. Congratulations to all of our representative swimmers, who have been identified elsewhere in the Annual Report.

Coaching development has been a major focus and we continued to coordinate and conduct Bronze Licence courses with a significant increase in participation occurring at the higher level. A revised coach's scholarship program saw 11 NSW coaches undertake national scholarships. In addition, one overseas based scholarship was also awarded and I look forward to a continuation of this progress with ultimately improved coaching outcomes which is essential if SNSW is to enhance its high performance outcomes.

The talent identification program includes the coordination and conduct of age development squad activities. To this end, we undertook a successful tour of Queensland with 27 swimmers. The Age Development camp saw a total of 61 swimmers participating. Our open water and multi-class programs have continued with the Open Water squad competing at various Marathon Series events during the year. We continue to run our separate Multi Class meets with support from the NSW government as well as having an abridged but integrated program in our Open Championships. We are looking to do more next year.

SPORT DEVELOPMENT

The key component of our sport development objective has been the area rationalisation program. This program has taken almost four years to achieve in a governance sense and has seen a reduction from 23 to 12 swimming areas in NSW. The board recognises that it has a responsibility to the sport and members to ensure that the proper policy settings are in place to allow the governance structure to function to best advantage. In parallel, the board approved budget cover to allow for the appointment of our area based development officers.

At time of writing, the appointment of the new Swimming North Coast development officer has completed this task. Development officers have progressively undertaken a comprehensive visit program to ascertain club/member needs and concerns. The board has reviewed detailed reports on findings which has greatly assisted its deliberations as well as facilitating the tailoring of specific responses. In particular, development officers assisted in the putting together of several area competition programs and generic area championship programs together with supporting local policies and procedures. The generic programs are viewable on the SNSW web-site. The cultural evolution needed to ensure the best outcome for the sport and members in the revised areas will take longer to develop and embed but progress is certainly being made on several fronts.

Consultation and assistance has also been given in the construction and implementation of development programs however the objective of increasing our overall membership through strengthened development programs and competition has not yet been achieved. Whilst we have basically retained our membership numbers, the earlier reported membership turnover figures indicate that more needs to be done. Our development officer network provides information which gives us a better understanding of the complexities of the problem and it intended to fully workshop the issue at our State Forum this year.

It is recognised that the various learn to swim (LTS) providers, be they professional swim schools or club based programs are the major source of our new membership. We recruited upwards of 12000 new members over the period but also lost a similar number of existing members. Both staff and the Projects and Membership Committee have put a lot of effort into enhancing our recruitment activities. Additionally, work on the Junior Excellence Program and the Youth Performance Scheme has continued to ensure that ongoing effort to retain our members. We have also joined the social networking revolution with Face-Book and Twitter sites. Whilst policy development for competitive swimming has progressed well, more work is required to encourage recreational swimming and to promote our sport amongst other special population groups. This is in hand through enhancing our programs aimed at community participation and this will be a feature of our work during the ensuing year.

Pool space availability for learn to swim, training and competition has become a significant problem. In the sport development segment, we have continued to lobby existing aquatic space providers in the interests of our clubs and members and we are getting some messages across in a difficult environment. The CEO and I have pressed the needs of our sport amongst higher policy and political figures with yet to be realised outcomes, but we will continue the effort, particularly in the new political climate. From a business perspective, we have taken big steps to put ourselves into a better bargaining position and I will discuss this more in the business development section.

Our committee structure works well although we appear to not have a broad range of volunteers from which to populate these committees. The pressures on family life, with a high proportion of both parents in the work force clearly impede volunteering. I take this opportunity to thank all of our committee members for their commitment and service, encouraging other members to consider nominating for one of these all important committees whose work is vital to our advancement. I also thank the relevant office staff for their secretarial support to our committees.

Our development officers have again had increasing impact in the development area. The company has been able to conduct numerous junior excellence/youth performance activities, Go Club forums, meet and team manager courses as well as a number of "come and try" days. These activities have greatly increased over recent year achievements.

Much staff emphasis has been placed on promoting technology based information and communication tools. Some 85% of membership registrations and up to 97% of event entries have been achieved on line. This is far and away the best on-line achievement of any Australian state association and members are to be congratulated on their acceptance of the system. Swimming in NSW continues to be a drug free sport with no reported transgressions.

All in all, a good result which importantly sets the scene for further achievements next year in all of our development objectives.

BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT

Our business development goal was to achieve and maintain a high level of business stability and viability. We addressed this with ten initiatives and associated strategies. Eight of twelve performance measures have been or are being met. Two have been partially successful and the remaining two items relating to sponsorship and benefiting from Swimming Australia commercial activities are unattainable and the Board has accordingly revised the Strategic Plan. Other business activities continue and we have benefited from our Speedo shop and other merchandising, albeit, the Speedo shop's final results are disappointing.

The audit of our accounts identified some accounting and marketing problems relating to the shop which have now been adjusted. A thorough independent investigation by our auditors, Ernst and Young Ltd., confirmed that profit margin was lower than our average return and that this was masked for some months due to incorrect accounting. The investigation confirmed accurate opening and closing stock figures with no evidence of wrongdoing. The most disappointing aspect of this situation was that our closely managed expenditure for the year was based upon incorrect figures. The Board has mandated additional controls and checks to ensure accounting accuracy and this problem will not reoccur.

Whilst the reported company deficit was, in fact, less than that originally budgeted, the latter half of the year expected result had been for a broadly break even situation. This was because some significant expenditure was not incurred either at all or fully within the original time scale. Planned additional revenue streams have been slow to come to fruition so a tighter budget will be applied during ensuing year. Members can be confident that the financial position of the company, as evidenced in the detailed audited published accounts remains very sound. A strong asset base in cash and equivalents, investments and property continues and the Board has retained its commitment towards the development of our sport whilst maintaining membership fees at the lowest for any state association.

The company has invested much time and effort in refining and managing both our strategic and operational risk. A number of policies, documents and strategies have been developed to reduce key risks. The Board is confident that company risk management is well controlled. An outcome of this work has been the development of risk templates and instructions for clubs and areas and these are identified on the company web-site.

The availability of pool space for training and competition is a high priority member driven strategic objective. We conducted a feasibility study into entering the market and have now formed a separate company, Swimming NSW Aquatic Management Pty. Ltd. for the purposes of entering into pool management and the teaching of swimming/coaching business primarily in partnership with professional coaches. It is early days yet but the new company will move towards tendering for appropriate business opportunities in due course. This is an exciting development which will provide benefits to our members.

Sponsorship is difficult in the present economic climate. The CEO has re-signed our existing sponsors for a further term and this has been very helpful. I thank all of our sponsors for their continued support of our sport. A corporate golf day was organised at Oatlands Golf Club and proved to be quite popular. We undertook this in conjunction with Andrew Lauterstein and the Ian Thorpe Fountain for Youth and we are looking forward to a bigger and better event next year.

A member survey was conducted over the internet during the year with some interesting results. These results will be discussed at the forthcoming state forum in July where members can and should fully participate.

We have endeavoured to improve funding and policy outcomes through strengthened relations with Swimming Australia, state and local government and other key sporting partners such as the NSW Institute of Sport, ASCTA and disability sports. The CEO, through good work, has gained some additional grants, particularly in support of our multiclass swimmers and our country based technical officials and this has been an excellent result.

Our event management standards continue to improve with our showcase state open championships attracting swimmers from several overseas countries as well as the bulk of the national team. Well done to the all concerned for this outstanding event and again, congratulations to all of the successful athletes. All of our state level events have experienced increased entries over the year despite strong surveillance of qualifying times by the Competition Committee. This is another indication of slowly but steadily improving standards.

A new initiative has been the introduction of on line ticketing which is now gaining acceptance amongst members as it clearly reduces queues during peak arrival times. Event specific merchandise provides a good income stream and will continue to evolve into the future. We have also introduced a member's discount program through the Business Plaza concept and on line membership offers have now commenced. This has also been done in conjunction with the introduction of new membership packages which offer additional benefits at different price levels. More details are available on the company web-site.

Overall, our business activities have remained sound with some exciting prospects emerging in relation to pool management and on line business.

PEOPLE DEVELOPMENT

The goal here is to provide leadership and good administration and management to ensure the continued growth of swimming in NSW. The enhancement of club administrative performance has been supported through the release of the vastly updated clubs administrative manual and in the encouragement of clubs to attain Gold Go Club standard. A total of 118 clubs attained some Go Club standard during 2010 although gold standard remained static. This is a fair result but we encourage clubs to strive for better outcomes next year.

A range of forums and workshops have been conducted to assist in the development of club administrative performance as well as our technical official expertise. A parent and swimmer seminar is planned for this year which will follow on from a successful parents breakfast held at the state age championships. The work of the development officers has been significant in the club arena and the Technical Swimming Committee has done a lot of work to re-energise the Area Technical Swimming Committee Coordinator role and function. Training plans have been developed in many areas and these are beginning to bear fruit with more technical officials being assessed and accredited. In addition several technical official scholarships have been awarded to assist in our technical official development program. A mentoring program has been introduced which is expected to expand in future. The work being done in support of the coach education program has been reported elsewhere but continues with a strong relationship between ourselves and the coaches association—something that I have worked hard to enhance during my term as president.

All staff appraisals have been undertaken on time with a revised and more detailed format being implemented. The Board constantly monitors CEO performance through the operational plan outcomes and fully reviewed his and the company's performance at the end of the reporting year. Training plans are in place as indicated in the appraisals. The Board also maintained its self review process and directors identified areas where self improvement could be beneficial. Directors undertook a range of "E" learning courses through the Australian Institute Of Company Directors throughout the year. We continued to maintain a strong gender equity ethos and encourage women to aspire to higher level positions within the organisation. Four women stood for election to the board in 2010 and three were successful.

CONCLUSION

Before summarising the year, I am sad to have to report the passing of two esteemed Life Members. Joan Valler passed away earlier this year in Port Macquarie. She had been active in community life until the end. Joan was my predecessor on the Board of Swimming NSW and made a significant contribution to swimming over her lifetime. At the time of writing, we became aware of the passing of another Life Member and Vice Patron of Swimming NSW, Esna Stewart OAM. Esna was Executive Vice President of NSW Swimming for two decades I greatly appreciated her progressive thinking on many contemporary swimming issues during the time that I knew her. Swimming is the poorer with the loss of these two wonderful servants of our sport and I offer the sympathy of all members to both Joan and Esna's families and friends.

My congratulations are offered to our Service Excellence Award recipients, Sunny Bidner, Neil Rogers, Amanda Charnock and our father and daughter couple, Robert Guyer and Janelle Barnett. All of these people have provided long and meritorious service to swimming and fully deserve their awards.

We have been blessed with a stable office structure and staffing during the year and this is evidenced by the confidence that members are placing on the quality and level of support being provided. My thanks to our CEO Mark Heathcote who has grown strongly into the role and managed his staff professionally and well. Thanks also to the staff for their commitment and continued hard work.

My thanks also go to Swimming Australia President David Urquhart and CEO Kevin Neil who have canvassed SNSW on a range of issues from time to time. The success of swimming as a major sport requires a fully collaborative approach by all governance levels in the country.

The last four years have been a period of change in our sport which has caused some angst amongst members. We have made the right decisions and I am appreciative of my fellow directors and the majority of members who have contributed to these decisions and remain committed to making all of the changes work. Change is simply part of the scene these days and our task is to ensure that correct decisions are made and that change management is properly undertaken. With your continued help—this will happen. This report shows that we have continued to move forward on many of our strategic objectives and that the next several months should see some significant gains which will greatly benefit our members. I look forward to a successful year.

The SNSW Competitions Committee continued their approach of the ongoing review of Swimming NSW competition events to ensure further development of the NSW event structure, in line with National events. The result has again seen increased participation across Swimming NSW Championships. This is a remarkable achievement given that the qualifying times are reviewed on a regular basis and the Competitions Committee has continued to raise the qualifying standards at NSW Championship events. The increase in participation across events is a tribute to the continued hard work of the coaches and athletes, indicating that they are well-prepared for NSW Championship events.

The event structure of the NSW Championships has remained fairly stable with the only change being the introduction of a new NSW Country Championships program after feedback from Country coaches. The NSW State Age Championships was a huge success, following on from last season's record numbers, entries again increased, further demonstrating the tremendous job our coaches are doing preparing their swimmers for success at the key NSW Championship events. Bringing the State Age Championships program in line with the Australian Age Championships program has been beneficial for our swimmers, ensuring our swimmers are receiving the best possible preparation for the Australian Age Championships.

The Annual Point Score Banner was once again hotly contested by all NSW clubs. The Annual Point Score Banner is a prestigious award for clubs to compete for throughout the season, with the emphasis being placed upon all club swimmers to participate and gain points to contribute to their club's overall tally.

The NSW State Open Championships was our premier event during the past summer season and was an outstanding success, due to the timing of the Championships, increased entries and competitor numbers as well as coaches and athletes looking for high quality racing in the lead up to the Australian Open (World Championship) trials. As a result there was a large contingent of interstate and international swimmers competing at the championships. Our swimmers can only benefit from this standard of competition, having to race hard and fast to gain places in the finals.

As in previous years, Swimming NSW awarded prize money at the Championships to reward swimmers, coaches and clubs for their outstanding performances over the three days of competition.

The NSW Competitions Committee continues to develop a long term Calendar in consultation with Swimming Australia to ensure there is a consistent and reliable Event Calendar in place and are looking at providing high quality competition on a regular basis across the season. The calendar allows coaches and athletes to effectively plan their training programs while targeting specific Championship events.

The Swimming New South Wales Competition Strategy was reviewed during the year following consultation and feedback for Area and Club stakeholders. The Competition Strategy is aimed at continuing the development of high quality events and the sport of swimming overall in New South Wales. It is hoped that the revised strategy is easier for clubs and areas to follow with a number of very useful resources now available on the Swimming NSW website for club and area use.

As always, input from Swimming NSW members and coaches is vital to ensure the Committee is providing the best programs for all swimmers.

The outcomes from these workshops were circulated and have assisted to improve the policies and processes of the Technical Swimming Committee, as well as assisting each Area to develop strategies to address the issues of recruitment, training and retention of technical officials within their own memberships.

During the past year the committee has reviewed, created and updated the following Training Notes and Exercises;

Judges of Strokes (JOS)

Timekeeper

Chief Timekeeper

The training document for “Jury of Appeal” has also been updated (our thanks to Pat Troy for this).

There have also been a number of amendments to the SNSW Swimming Rules, and General Rules, as a result of FINA and SAL rule and protocol changes. These have been circulated as they have been finalised and a complete reprint of the SNSW Rule Book will be sent out shortly to replace those previously issued.

The SNSW Assessment Panel has also been very busy this past season with many Referees and Starters being elevated to Level 2 and Level 3 status. The numbers of those applying for these assessments is such that it is now difficult to assign all applicants to meets approved for this purpose within the confines of one swimming season.

It was pleasing that the number of people presenting themselves for training and assessment has improved this past year, with the majority of Areas now being involved. The new Monthly Training Report that we ask each ATSC Coordinator to complete has certainly helped to improve our insight into what is happening within the Areas.

NSW State Championships

NSW State Open Short Course Championships

18 – 19 June, 2010 at SOPAC

The NSW State Open Short Course Championships were held at Sydney Olympic Park Aquatic Centre once again this year from 18th – 19th June 2010 with 478 athletes making the journey to the Olympic venue. A steady 1639 entries were received by Swimming NSW – an increase from 1597 recorded last year with 91% of entries being completed through the Online Entries System. This impressive figure indicates that the swimming community is now accepting and using the system efficiently for a majority of their entries at the elite level. The Premier Club Pointscore Trophy was awarded at the Championships to Cranbrook Eastern Edge who took out the title this year with 673 points.




NSW State Age Short Course Championships

13 – 15 August, 2010 at SOPAC

The NSW Speedo State Age Short Course Championships were held from 13-15 August 2010 at the Sydney Olympic Park Aquatic Centre with 126 teams coming from both Metropolitan and Regional NSW, as well as athletes from New Zealand and Canada making the journey. Entries totaled 4354 this year which was a 5.6% increase compared to 2009 figures. For the State Championships, Swimming NSW welcomed Speedo as the major sponsor along with welcoming Moshtix to do all the online ticketing for future Swimming NSW events. In its first trial, a good proportion of the total ticket sales were purchased online throughout Moshtix which got the online ticketing initiative off to a promising start. The Point score Trophy was also awarded at the Championships to Carlile with 2,750 points.

Swimming NSW was also lucky enough to have a number of VIP's attend the Championships with the Minister for Sport and Recreation, Mr Kevin Greene MP attending to present medals to a number of our State athletes along with Olympian Sarah Ryan (now one of the Coaches at Mount Annan Swim Club) and George Souris MP Shadow Minister for Hospitality and Tourism, Racing and Major Events.



NSW State Age & Open 5km & 10km Open Water Championships

18 – 19 December, 2010 at SIRC

The major Open Water swimming event on the Swimming New South Wales calendar was held on the 18th and 19th of December at the Sydney International Regatta Centre in Penrith. Clubs from across New South Wales were strongly represented in both the 5km and 10km events with solid entry numbers. Joining New South Wales swimmers were competitors from Queensland, Victoria, South Australia along with visiting athletes from New Zealand and Japan. Saturday saw the 5km events held in pleasant conditions with over 220 competitors taking part in the age group and open events. The weather turned cold on the Sunday as competitors took to the course for the 10km event but despite this there was still some strong swimming and the event provided great race practice for those swimmers hoping to gain places on the National Team at the trials to be held in March 2011.

A big thank you must be extended to all the volunteers who assisted with water safety and the Technical Officials that attended the Championships, without your support the event could not take place.




NSW 10 & Under -12 Years State Age Championships

8 – 9 January, 2011 at SOPAC

The Speedo NSW State 10 & Under-12 Years Age Championships were held on 8-9 January 2011 at SOPAC with 673 athletes from 119 teams from across the State attending the 2 day competition. One of the major attractions of this meet was the signing session organised on Saturday afternoon with Commonwealth Games Medalists Emily Seebohm and Alicia Coutts. Swimmers, coaches and spectators all lined the SOPAC Bridge for at least half an hour to get a glimpse, photo or signed merchandise with the girls. This appearance was ahead of the newly devised 2011 Summer Swim Series meet which took place at North Sydney Pool later in the month with all of the Australian Swim Team swimming in teams against each other and competing for prize money. Swimming NSW continues to host this signing session at the State Championships each year as an encouragement and exciting opportunity for the upcoming stars in NSW to meet their Olympic or Australian Swim Team heroes.

The Point score Trophy was also awarded at the Championships to Carlile with 1,163 points, dominating the rest of the teams as NC Aquatic made a surge into 2nd place with 827 point and Cherrybrook Carlile rounded out the top 3 in 3rd place with 699 points.



NSW State 13-18 Years Age Championships

11 – 16 January, 2011 at SOPAC

With 1 day to recover for coaches, parents and technical officials, the Speedo NSW State 13-18 Years Age Championships kicked off on Tuesday 11th January 2011 with 943 athletes from 128 teams converging on the Olympic venue at Sydney Olympic Park for the 6 day meet. Teams from Victoria and Queensland also attended the meet with 4,032 entries (80% of those being online) being received by Swimming NSW. The summer Age Championships are always contested in a Heats and Finals format with the heats commencing in the morning and the finals being swum at night. The top 10 swimmers from the morning's heat session advance to the night time finals and have the opportunity to experience an elevated quality of competition format with swimmers names being announced to the crowd, especially timed medal presentations and at times, commentary from the announcers. Many clubs dressed up in not only their club gear but also in other team colours to support and cheer on their fellow team mates which produced a number of outstanding performances.



NSW State Open Championships

11 – 13 February, 2011 at SOPAC

Swimming NSW's premier event, the 2011 NSW State Open Championships, were held at Sydney Olympic Park Aquatic Centre from 11th – 13th February 2011 with a number of high profile athletes, both interstate and overseas, attending the 3 day meet. International athletes including Commonwealth Games Gold Medalist Ryan Cochrane of Canada and Olympic Silver Medalist Therese Alshammar of Sweden, made the journey to Australia along with teams from Japan, Great Britain, Singapore, Malaysia, Israel, Croatia and New Zealand. Interstate teams made their mark with Queensland, Victoria, Western Australia, Tasmania and South Australia not afraid to take on the NSW athletes on their home turf. There were a total of 142 teams, 877 athletes and 3379 entries for this Meet with all figures steadily showing an increase compared to 2010 figures.

The NSW SCU Metropolitan SC Championships were hosted by Swimming NSW this year from 3-4 July 2010 at Sydney Olympic Park Aquatic Centre with an outstanding result of 111 records broken over the 2 days of competition. Numerous athletes from Metro North West, Metro South West, Metro South East and newly merged area Metro North East converged on the Olympic venue for some serious racing in the local area clash. SCU Mobile Lender, Glen Warner, also attended the meet over the weekend to present the SCU Chairman's Award to the winner of the 50m Freestyle in Men and Women. Te Haumi Maxwell (MLC Marlins) was awarded the Male prize with Nicole Mee (Cranbrook Eastern Edge) taking out the girls prize clocking an impressive 25.87. 



Courtyard by Marriott North Ryde NSW Country Short Course Championships 10 – 11 July, 2010 at SOPAC

The Sydney Olympic Park Aquatic Centre hosted 652 athletes from across the regional areas of NSW for the Courtyard by Marriott North Ryde NSW Country SC Championships with a staggering 86 records broken. 79 teams from ACT, Mountains and Plains, Southern Inland, Coast and Valley, Far North Cost, Mid North Coast, New England and North West, South Eastern and Western Areas made the journey to the Olympic venue for 2 days of outstanding performances. The Club Point score Award was presented at the Championships to the 2010 Winner; Novocastrian with 3,903 points.



Courtyard by Marriott North Ryde NSW Country Championships 26 – 27 February, 2011 at SOPAC

On 26-27 February 2011, 866 athletes descended on Sydney Olympic Park Aquatic Centre for the Courtyard by Marriott North Ryde NSW Country Championships. 96 teams from the ACT, Mountains and Plains, Coast and Valley, Far North Coast, Mid North Coast, Southern Inland, New England and North West, South Eastern and Western Areas made the journey to the Olympic venue for the 2 day meet.

One of the highlights of the weekend was the Annual Parade of Competitors which was conducted on the Saturday. In its 34th year of tradition, an impressive 85 teams participated in the march past around the competition pool with the Small Teams section taking centre stage first followed by the Speedo Trophy Big Teams section. Werris Creek was named as the winner of the Small Teams Trophy – its first win since its inception in 2003 with Kincumber Pacific Dolphins taking home the Speedo Trophy in only its second time since 2008. In accordance with the rules, the march past was judged on each team's neatness, suitability and uniformity of dress, and for deportment, in accordance with a point score system.

NSW Speedo Sprint Series


Heats 5 - 6 February, Finals 13 March 2011

The annual NSW Speedo Sprint Series Finals continued to be the biggest Swimming NSW event of the season with family and friends flocking to Sydney Olympic Park Aquatic Centre on March 13th to watch their swimmer's contest the Finals. Entry count was up this year with 3,094 entries being submitted by the Areas and 1,169 athletes contesting the day long meet of 50m sprints and relay events for each age group 8 -13 years. Swimmers needed to have competed at the Speedo Sprint Heats competition (an encouragement meet for new members to join the sport of swimming in NSW in a competitive racing environment) beforehand and placed in the top 6 to progress through to the Finals. As a result, this competition continues attract and highlight the young talent in NSW. Metro South East took out this year's title and making it 4 years in a row with 2,353 points. Metro South West came in a close 2nd with 2,295 points and Metro North West in 3rd place with 1,768 points.

National Achievements

2010 Australian Age Championships



The most prestigious event on the National Calendar for age group swimmers, the 2010 Australian Age Championships, were held from 5th – 10th April at Sydney Olympic Park Aquatic Centre. While other swimmers may have been enjoying the Easter long weekend festivities, National Age competitors were down at SOPAC before 7:30am Easter Monday morning for the doors to open and ready themselves for a week's worth of competition. 1510 entries were received by Swimming Australia for the 527 strong NSW athletes who made the journey in their home state to SOPAC.

There were many standout performances at the Championships including Wests Illawarra Aquatic's Emma McKeon. McKeon dominated her 50m Freestyle and was off the blocks in 0.74s reaction time to clock a very slick 25.19 for the Gold. The 15 Year Old then backed up for the 100m Freestyle with Brittany Elmslie (Noosa) giving McKeon some tough rivalry; however McKeon proved too strong in the end to touch in 55.40 for the double gold so far. The 400m was up next with Laura Crockart (Ryde Carlile) also in hot medal contention as both the girls dove in to set themselves up for the 8 lap middle distance event. McKeon swam a steady race clocking 2:09.65 at the half way mark and came home in a negative split to finish in 4:17.68 to snatch another Gold. Crockart also finished strongly to clock 4:24.23s and bag the Bronze medal with another Bronze coming in the 400m IM to finish in an impressive 5:07.52. However, the 200m was McKeon's best performance again being unstoppable in her pet stroke to not only take home her 4th consecutive Gold of the Championships in 2:00.21 but also broke the 15 Years National Age Record.

Woden's 15 Year Old Hugo Morris was also in fine form over the 6 days of competition with a very quick reaction time of 0.67s as he took to the water for the 200m Butterfly. Morris clocked just off his personal best for the heats session and went in as the fastest athlete for the finals next to Brandon Grochala (Liverpool). Flying out of the blocks and away from his rivals, Morris convincingly sealed his victory in a personal best time of 2:03.01, 1.50s ahead of his closest competitor Zac Featherstone (Southport). Grochala also finished strong to place 4th in 2:08.60. Qualifying in 1st again for the finals in the 400m Freestyle, Morris continued to annihilate his personal bests to stay ahead of Jarrod Poort (Wests Illawarra Aquatic), a distance specialist, in the heats session. Both boys moved onto the finals with Morris making his name known throughout the Championships to take home Gold in 4:01.01 with Poort settling for 4th position in 4:05.37. Morris also collected Silver in the 100m Butterfly and 200m Freestyle with Bronze in 400m Individual Medley to cap off a successful Nationals 2010 meet.



It was now the young guns turn to pull out some excellent performances, with Ryan Leonard (Hunter) answering the call and coming up with 4 Gold medals for his efforts. The 100m Breaststroke saw Leonard do a personal best time and qualify in 3rd position for the finals alongside team mate Matthew Mensforth (Hunter) and Harry Dai (Ryde Carlile). In a seldom trifecta, the boys showed off their NSW talent on the national stage with Leonard taking out the Gold in 1:10.94, Dai in Silver for 1:12.81 and Mensforth collecting Bronze in 1:13.23. Lachlan Colquhoun (Tuggeranong Vikings) and Jayke Small (Barker Aquatic) then joined Leonard in the 200m Breaststroke as they all qualified for the finals on day 5 of the meet. Leonard again collected the Gold in 2:33.54 with Colquhoun and Small taking out equal Bronze in an impressive 2:36.75.

However, it was the 400m Individual Medley that Leonard left his mark on to break the National Age Record in 4:42.99 with Hayden Hinds-Sydenham also stepping up to collect Silver in a quick 4:52.37. Hinds-Sydenham and Colquhoun also went on to contest the 800m Freestyle with both being successful in the medal tally with Hinds-Sydenham taking out the Silver in a swift 8:39.77 and Colquhoun the Bronze in 8:59.11.

Edward Marks (MLC Marlins) was another strong competitor at just 13 years old to go up against Peter Topalidis (Auburn) and Angus Hannan (Cherrybrook Carlile) in the 100m Freestyle. All the boys clocked near or bettered their personal best time to secure their spot in the finals and took to the water leaving nothing in the tank to power home and take out another surprising trifecta for NSW. Topalidis bagged Gold in 54.96, Marks for Silver in 55.42 and Hannan claimed Bronze in 55.84. Marks had to settle for Silver in the 50m Freestyle (25.58) also behind Paul Van Westing (Knox Pymble) who dominated the entire event and clocked a very quick 25.16.



However, it was the 100m Butterfly where Marks would claim his victory although not without tough competition from Sam Biddle (Hunter). Biddle qualified in 1st position for the finals (1:01.77) with Marks back in 3rd, but the only results that would matter would come in the finals where Marks convincingly took out the Gold in 59.80 – the only competitor to break the sub 1:00:00 mark. Biddle settled for 5th but picked up Silver in the 200m Butterfly with a speedy 2:14.43.

13 Year Olds Meg Bailey (Hunter) and Ami Matsuo (Carlisle) jointly had a successful meet with their clash in the 400m Freestyle. The girls didn't spend too much energy in their heat swim, qualifying in 3rd for Bailey and 7th for Matsuo as part of their strategy to perform in the finals session. They stepped up onto the blocks and also remarkably stepped up the pace with Bailey and Matsuo battling it out until the closing stages of the race which determined Bailey in the Silver position with a personal best time of 4:25.67 and Matsuo claiming Bronze in a personal best of 4:26.94.

Matsuo then went on to medal in the 50m Freestyle after qualifying in equal first for the finals alongside Brittany McEvoy (Southport). However, Matsuo was too strong for McEvoy and claimed the win in 26.79 and then backed up to clock a personal best time in the 200m Freestyle (2:05.23) in a close race with Sumi Song (Southport) and take home her 2nd Gold for the meet. Bailey secured her Gold for NSW in the 200m IM with 2:23.66 however the 400m IM proved to be a bigger task against Jade Moody (Singleton). The girls were neck to neck the entire race with Bailey pulling out all stops in the final 50m to stop the clock at 5:03.40 for the Gold and Moody settling for Silver 5:05.57.



Seasoned National Age competitor, Kenneth To (Trinity Grammar School) was the 3rd NSW athlete to break a National Age Record at the Championships and did so in excellent style in his pet event – 200m IM. Looking to secure lane 4 for the finals, To swam a steady race to clock just off his personal best of 2:02.62 with Daniel Tranter (Liverpool) also in the finals mix. Leading the entire race, To put together a great race which rewarded him with not only the Gold medal but also the 17 Years National Age Record in 2:01.85. Tranter was not far behind and also swam an excellent paced race to clock 2:04.16. To also collected Silver in the 100m Freestyle in a slick 49.93. Tranter was also hungry for a slice of National Age victory and carved up the competition in the 400m IM to take out the Gold with a lead of nearly 7 seconds to clock 4:24.59. The

200m Butterfly was not such an easy task with the likes of Declan Potts (Pro-Ma Miami) proving he was a force to be reckoned with qualifying in 1st position for the finals ahead of Tranter in 2nd. However, Tranter did not let his Queensland rival dictate the finals race and battled it out all the way until the closing stages where Tranter snatched the Gold in a close 2:01.64 and Potts for Silver in 2:01.99.

Te Haumi Maxwell (MLC Marlins) was another seasoned National athlete who was unbeatable in the 50m and 100m Freestyle. Maxwell was waves ahead of the competition in the 100m, qualifying in 1st position for the finals more than 2 ½ seconds ahead of Cameron McEvoy (Southport) where Maxwell went on to better his personal best shaving off 0.12s to clock a speedy 50.67 and take home the Gold. Both boys then backed up to contest the 50m but Maxwell proved why he is the best Freestyler for the 15 Year Age group and smashed the wall to clock an impressive time of 23.16. Maxwell also bagged a Bronze in the 100m Butterfly with 56.85.

In a collectively excellent effort by the athletes, NSW finished with 5 more gold medals than last year and held the point score; medal count and gold medal count up through until the very last day and very last event! Swimming NSW would also like to congratulate all NSW competitors as they placed 2nd in both the overall final State Point Score and Medal Tally.

2010 Telstra Australian Swimming Championships

From March 16-21, Sydney Olympic Park Aquatic Centre was entertained with 6 days of electrifying competition and witnessed countless super star performances at the 2010 Telstra Australian Swimming Championships. These Championships doubled as selection trials for both the Commonwealth Games and Pan Pacific Championships with the squads naming 27 NSW athletes to compete for Australia.

The final team would not be announced until after the Pan Pacific Championships in August, however all swimmers who won gold or silver in an individual event at the week's selection trials were automatically destined for Delhi with Australian Commonwealth Games Association CEO Perry Crosswhite welcoming the first official members of the Australian team for Delhi.



Eamon Sullivan underlined his tag as Australia's premier sprinter and sealed a place on the plane for the Commonwealth Games in Delhi, winning gold in the men's 100m freestyle at the 2010 Telstra Australian Swimming Championships in Sydney. In the final, the former world record holder and Olympic silver medallist was fit and fast. He was the best off the blocks before turning with a 0.36 second lead over the field. His second 50m was as impressive as the first, touching the wall a length clear in a world best time for the year of 48.52, booking a place on the Commonwealth Games team. Joining Sullivan in Delhi will be Tommaso D'Orsogna (49.35), while James Magnusson (49.43) won the bronze medal. Sullivan said after the race that he is still to fully recover from his hip surgery. "The day before the meet I was 90 percent sure I was going to pull out, but I fought through the pain and just decided to deal with it," Sullivan said.



AIS based Thomas Fraser-Holmes put the earlier drama of an overturned disqualification behind him to win the men's 400m individual medley and claim his first national title. Fraser-Holmes had initially been disqualified from his heat following a perceived incorrect turning manoeuvre, but won the right to swim from lane four in the final when his appeal was upheld. In the final, the 18-year-old hit the lead in the backstroke leg and was never headed, closing it off in the freestyle to win in a time of 4:16.81. Jayden Hadler won the silver medal in 4:20.79, while Mitch Larkin finished strongly in lane 1 to take bronze in 4:21.54.

Dual Olympian Geoff Huegill blitzed the field in the final of the men's 50m butterfly at the Championships to win his ninth title in the event and book a place on the plane to Delhi for the Commonwealth Games in October. Huegill, who won the 50 fly on eight successive occasions between 1997 and 2004, started his remarkable comeback in late 2008 and ever since has been dreaming of Delhi, with India now a reality. Losing more than 45kg in his comeback crusade, the 31-year-old has been one of the form swimmers in Australia this year and is certainly back to world-class status. He jumped to an early lead from the blocks and torpedoed towards the wall to win in a time of 23.46. Defending champion Andrew Lauterstein (23.82) grabbed silver and an automatic place at the Commonwealth Games. Mitchell Patterson finished third in 23.89 to secure a Pan Pacs place with Huegill and Lauterstein, where he will get the chance to join them at the Commonwealth Games with a strong performance. Huegill was visibly overawed with the significance of his achievement. "I'm speechless," Huegill said. "When I got back in the pool I just wanted to get fit and then the reasons gradually changed and here I am now. This time around it is a lot sweeter."

Beijing relay gold medallist Emily Seebohm secured her first non-backstroke Australian title winning the women's blue ribbon 100m freestyle in 54.70. In was high drama on pool deck as 14-year-old Yolane Kukla, who only the day before had booked her ticket to the Commonwealth Games by winning the 50m butterfly, touched first in 54.50 but was later disqualified for moving on the blocks prior to the start gun. Kukla's disqualification paved the way for Seebohm to record her fourth national title, with Beijing Olympian Alicia Coutts (54.86) grabbing silver and AIS based Alice Mills bronze, in 55.32 and a ticket to the Pan Pacific Championships.



Seebohm then backed up an hour later to win the 100m backstroke crown, breaking the minute barrier in a time of 59.21, to make it four Australian 100m backstroke titles in a row. She beat home 19-year-old Belinda Hocking (1:00.11) from Albury and Commonwealth record holder in the 50m backstroke Sophie Edington, and became the first women since Lynn Bates (nee Watson) to win the 100m freestyle and backstroke double in the same year.

Olympic champion Leisel Jones made it 21 national titles after taking out the 200m breaststroke in emphatic fashion and in the process clocking the second fastest time in the world this year, an impressive 2:23.45. While not training specifically for the longer distance, Jones mustered all her experience to hold off her fast finishing Nunawading training partner Sarah Katsoulis (2:25.35) who grabbed silver, with 16-year-old Tessa Wallace from Pelican Waters Caloundra securing third in 2:28.67.




Robert Hurley defended his national title from 2009 as the Wests Illawarra swimmer surged to victory in the men's 400m freestyle. Hurley, who competed on his first Australian team last year where he won bronze in men's 800m freestyle relay and finished 11th in the 400m at the world championships in Rome, clocked a time of 3:47.67. Robert Hurley went on to complete the 400 and 800m double after securing a comfortable three body length victory in the longer event. Hurley clocked a time of 7:55.36 to hold off 1500m specialist Ryan Napoleon (7:59.23), while Christopher Ashwood took the bronze in 8:00.94.

In summing up the week's competition, Australian Commonwealth Games Association CEO Perry Crosswhite said " "We've seen some fantastic results in the pool this week, some new names - and some old ones - and our swimmers always play an important role in the success of the team at the Games. The Commonwealth Games are renowned for revealing the next generation of sporting stars in Australia".

Swimming NSW would like to congratulate all of the athletes who were selected to compete for Australia in the above mentioned teams, especially those from NSW. For some of the athletes it was their first time on a national team and we wished them all the best for the competitions ahead.

2010 Australian Short Course Championships



The Australian Short Course Championships were a spectacle to behold this year with top swimmers from across the country flocking to Brisbane's Chandler Aquatic Centre to compete. NSW athletes in particular fought hard this year to prove themselves as some of the nation's best short-course swimmers.


16 year old Emma McKeon (Wests Illawarra Aquatic) gave a stand out performance in the 50m Freestyle where she collected Bronze with a time of 24.73 despite facing off against tough competitors in Queenslander's Yolane Kukla and Marieke Guehrer. Olivia Halicek (UNSW Uniswim) was also in the mix being right on McKeon's tail before being touched out in a close 24.83. McKeon came back even stronger in the 100m freestyle, swimming a fantastic 53.37 to claim the Silver medal with Felicity Galvez OAM (SOPAC Swim Club) putting in a great effort to swim 53.51 for the Bronze. Galvez then went on to dominate Butterfly events at the Championships with Gold in the 50m, 100m and 200m Fly as the clock displayed times of 25.65, 56.34, and 2:04.76 respectively.

The NSW Men left no room for other competitors in the 50m Butterfly, with 6 out of the top 8 spots claimed by NSW swimmers! Geoff Huegill (SOPAC Swim Club) claimed Gold, swimming 22.95 with fellow Olympic veteran Adam Pine (Ginninderra) close on Huegill's heels to take out Bronze with a time of 23.45. Mitchell Patterson (Warringah) notably claimed 4th place (23.50), leaving Benjamin Treffers (Burley Griffin, AIS) in 6th (23.64), Joe Carty (Macquarie University) in 7th (23.70), and Andrew Lauterstein (SOPAC Swim Club) in 8th (23.74). Pine also took out Bronze in the 100m Freestyle, swimming a superb 51.82, while Patterson kept his 4th place ranking with a time of 52.02. Kingswim's Lachlan Staples made sure that NSW had a stake in the top three in the 200m Butterfly as he claimed Bronze with an excellent time of 1:55.14.



Although Treffers placed 6th in the 50 Butterfly, he took the 50m Backstroke head on and proved his point with sheer determination to earn him Gold (23.81). Daniel Arnarnart (Aquaburn) had a great swim as well and placed 3rd with a time of 24.24, just milliseconds behind AIS athlete Ashley Delaney. Arnarnart and Treffers also put out a good effort in the 100m Backstroke, claiming Bronze (52.14) and 4th place (52.31) respectively.

Belinda Hocking (Albury, AIS) represented NSW with her usual gusto in the Backstroke where she came away with Silver in the 100m event, swimming 57.67 against Emily Seebohm's 56.58. Hocking then went on to blow her competition out of the water in the 200m Backstroke, claiming Gold to stop the clock at 2:03.47.



Matt Abood (Sydney Uni) staked his claim on 50m and 100m Freestyle as he firstly powered through the 50m to take out Silver with a time of 21.75. An additional push in the 100m Free also resulted in victory with Abood claiming Gold to swim a remarkable 47.07. James Magnussen (Macquarie University) and Eamon Sullivan (SOPAC Swim Club) met the competition in the 100m Free as well, swimming 47.68 and 48.00 respectively.

The NSW ladies weren't afraid to push for excellence in their grueling Freestyle endurance events with Jessica Ashwood (SOPAC Swim Club) placing 3rd in the 800m with a time of 8:22.06, while Erin Killey (Hunter) swam a decent 8:34.30. Ashwood and Killey's determination shone through in the 1500m Free where both swimmers pushed ahead and came out in front as Ashwood claimed Silver with a time of 16:12.64, while Killey catapulted herself into the top three with a time of 16:14.86 for the Bronze.

Robert Hurley (Wests Illawarra Aquatic) had a thrilling comeback from his 8th place result in 200m Freestyle and claimed Gold in 400m Freestyle with a time of 3:41.58. Hurley then went on to crush his competition, claiming Gold in 1500m Freestyle with a time of 14:41.80 (12 seconds faster than Silver recipient Thomas Fraser-Holmes). The 800m Freestyle event gave Wally Eggleton (Blacktown City) and Theodore Pasialis (SOPAC Swim Club) an excellent opportunity to show off their skills, as they claimed Silver (7:53.74) and Bronze (7:57.33) respectively. Eggleton then moved on to compete in 1500m Freestyle and took out Bronze with a time of 14:58.61.



Kenneth To (Trinity Grammar) left the Australian Short Course Championships feeling very proud this year with a Bronze in the Men's 100m Breaststroke to clock a slick 59.70. Craig Calder (Albury) also swam hard and scored a Bronze for NSW in 200m Breaststroke with a time of 2:07.28. However it was To who lead the rankings in the men's 100m and 200m Medley, receiving Gold (52.39) and Silver (1:56.40) respectively. John Goo (Ryde Carlile) kept NSW in the top three in the 100m Medley, claiming Bronze with a time of 54.54, while Daniel Tranter (Liverpool) took out Bronze in the 400m Medley with a time of 4:09.29.

Australian Open and Age Open Water Swimming Championships

The 2011 Australian Open and Age Open Water Swimming Championships took place at the Sydney International Regatta Centre in Penrith from 5th – 6th March 2011. Leading into the races, Swimming Australia Open Water Head Coach Greg Towle said the weekend was the first important step towards Olympic selection for Australia's best open water swimmers;

"Like we saw ahead of Beijing, swimmers who finish in the top 10 at the World Championships (10km) this year will automatically qualify for London, so the competition to make the Australian team this weekend will be white hot," said Towle.

16 Year old Jarrod Poort (Wests Illawarra Aquatic) was the first NSW male across the line overall and in his age group to take home the Gold in a very quick 1:55:22.00 – the only athlete in his age group to break the 2 hour barrier.

Next was Bayside athlete, Josh Beard with his slick swim of 1:57:54.00 for the Silver medal in the 17-18 Year age group. Brad Horrey (Sea's the Limit) was battling it out in a pack of about 10 swimmers to come in to touch with 2:06:53.00 which bagged 6th position and Nathan Novak (Hunter) also lunging up for the finish gate and slam a 2:27:42.00 for 9th in his age group.



Sam McKeown-Paterson (Woy Woy) didn't let the distance phase him as the 14 year old took on Sebastian Cummins (Surrey Park, VIC) for his 10km race. Cummins pulled away in the closing stages and McKeown-Patterson came home with the Silver medal in an impressive time of 2:04:52.00.



15 Year Old Blake Fulko (Campbelltown) had his work cut out for him in the 10km Open Water Championship but turned up the pace, and took out the Bronze medal in 2:07:16.00.

The Women's 10km Open Water Championship was lead by Telopea Open Water swimmer Jessica Traficante as she took on the 19 & Over age group with World Championship Gold Medallist Melissa Gorman (Redcliffe, QLD), New Zealander Cara Baker and 10km specialist Danielle DeFrancesco (Miami, QLD) in the mix for the Australian Championship. Traficante put in a strong effort with a time of 2:10:26.00 for 10th place.

15 Year Old Sofia Jenson (Blacktown City) was in fine form for her 10km event against St Peters Western, QLD athlete Stephanie Greene. Jenson swum the race of her life to touch in an impressive 2:10:57.00 for the Silver medal with Greene stealing the Gold in 2:09:18.00.



The 17-18 Years age group was strong for NSW with Zoe Elkerton (West's Illawarra Aquatic), Jessica McNevin (Campbelltown), Claire Nicholls (Woy Woy), Chloe Palmer (Picton) and Caitlin Anders (SLC Aquadot) in the water for the Girls 10km Open Water Championship. It was a great result for NSW with Elkerton bagging the Silver in 2:12:49.00 and Nicholls stealing the Bronze in 2:15:46.00 which took the medal count to 7 for NSW on Day 1.

Lone ranger Kaylie Ekinici (Campbelltown) didn't let her interstate rivals swim over her in the 14 & Under age group as she bagged a Silver for her efforts in 2:14:57.00 for the last of the 10km races. The Championships went on into the afternoon of Day 1 as the 5km races began with a nail biting finish in the Boys 5km event for Telopea's Liam Barber and Joshua Winnington (Palm Beach). Barber was stroke for stroke with Winnington before he pulled away in the final stages to touch for the Gold medal in a smashing time of 1:04:00.00 with Winnington settling for Silver in a very close 1:04:05.00.

The girls corresponding event was another win for NSW with Rebecca Samuela's (Unattached) blistering swim up against Suzanne Ryan (Miami, QLD). Samuela was grinning from ear to ear when she took home Silver for NSW in a time of 1:05:58.00 with her closest NSW rival Michaela Hokin (Mount Annan) back in 11th place with 1:11:46.00.



Day 2 of the Championships saw Jarrod Poort (West's Illawarra Aquatic) stand out in the Men's Open 5km Open Water being not only the youngest competitor but placing 5th overall to post an impressive time of 57:05.00.

There was no rest for Zoe Elkerton (West's Illawarra Aquatic), Monique Schipp (Hunter) or Jessica Traficante (Telopea) on their 2 Day of competition with a fresh Alicia Burgess (Corrimal), Jessica Errington (Sans Souci Sea Devils) and Natalie Stell (Castle Hill RSL Dolphins) deciding to focus only on the 5km Open Water Championship. Elkerton and Traficante weren't phased by their consecutive day of competition as Elkerton took out 10th place in 1:03:07.00 and Traficante 12th in 1:03:28.00.

In the 17-18 Years 5km Championship Josh Beard (Bayside) was another athlete putting in a massive program over the weekend and to take out the Gold medal in equal position with Josh Richardson (Albany Creek, QLD) in a time of 57:53.00. Brad Horrey (Sea's the Limit) added a 7th place to his Australian Championship achievements in 59:18.00. In the 16 Years age group, David Phillips (Campbelltown) just missed the medals podium with his 4th place for the 5km Championship but clocked a speedy 1:00:18.00 for doing so.



It was a hat trick for NSW in the Girls 16-18 Years Open Water Championship with Jessica Lauricella (SLC Aquadot), Alexandra Lee (Carlisle) and Rachel Teys (Campbelltown). The 3 girls surged away from the rest of the competition as Lauricella took the Gold in 1:03:18.00, Lee the Silver in 1:03:23.00 and Teys the Bronze in 1:03:31.00.

Dalhas Rogers (Campbelltown) did not disappoint with her 5km Open Water Championship in the 16 Years age group as she claimed the Silver medal in 1:05:09.00. Chelsea Findley (Novocastrian) was not far off the pace for the medals in 1:06:32.00 (4th) with Alana Bernard (Campbelltown) hot on her heels in 5th place with 1:06:39.00.

Kazim Boskovic (Carrs Park) was out in front for the Boys 15 Years 5km event and broke the elusive 1 hour barrier to clock 59:53.00 ahead of a large pack fighting over the remaining medals.

In the 14 Years, Sam McKeown-Paterson (Woy Woy) took out the Gold medal in 1:00:33.00 after backing up from the 10km the previous day with his nearest NSW rival, Daniel Collins (Hunter) unable to catch McKeown-Paterson as he settled for 5th place in a solid time of 1:01:38.00.

The final 5km event of the Championships ended with the Girls 14-15 Years age group as Kaylie Eckinci and Lana Rogers triumphed for Campbelltown and NSW taking out the Silver (1:04:27.00) and Bronze (1:04:46.00) medals respectively. Meg Bailey (Hunter) wasn't far behind in 5th place with 1:06:00.00 determined at the finish gate with Sarah McNevin (Campbelltown) touching in 10th with 1:09:52.00.

In the 15 Years age category, Sofia Jenson (Blacktown City) led the NSW charge to take home another Silver in an impressive 1:04:25.00 with Briella Brown (Carlisle) and Peta Teys (Campbelltown) the next 2 NSW girls to touch in 1:05:49.00 (6th) and 1:08:25.00 (11th) respectively.

The final session of the day started promisingly with Lachlan Colquhoun posting a solid time in the 400m individual medley. Queensland again turned on a steamy summer day for competition on the second day of the Swimming Queensland Qualifying Meet. In the 100m Freestyle personal best times came from Jacob Hansford, Nick Duncan and Tristan Daniell with Ashleigh Steed, Ella-May Basalo and Christina Ouzas also swimming personal best times in their 100m Freestyle.

Tim Cottam, Nick Rispoli, Oskar Stevens-Jones and Peter Topalidis posted personal bests in the 200m Individual Medley, but were outdone by Jacob Hansford who bettered his previous best by a massive five seconds. In the girls 200m Individual Medley Jacinta Mattingly posted a personal best, but it was

Christina Ouzas who stole the limelight with the biggest personal best of the day, a huge 9 seconds.

In the 200m Backstroke, Jessica O'Brien, Tristan Daniell and Ashleigh Steed continued with the trend posted personal best times. 

Membership Distribution by Area Yearly Trends




Membership Distribution by Gender 2010-2011
