# **PRESIDENT'S REPORT**

It is a privilege to present this report, which highlights a year of considerable achievements and strong performance against the key areas that are detailed in the Strategic Plan.

Again, this year, the Board concentrated on continuing to provide opportunities for the CEO and staff to establish new programs and to improve existing services by lifting them to new levels for the benefit of all members.

The Strategic Plan is structured around three main areas, namely, Participation, Performance and Partnership and my report on our progress over the past year is set out under those headings.

# PARTICIPATION

It was wonderful to note that we increased our total overall membership by 5.8% this year and pleasingly "Swimmer" membership increased by 9.6%. This increase means that we now have 2,000 more swimmers in the water enjoying our sport.

A key focus this year has been assisting Clubs and Areas with the Governance and Planning functions, with numerous visits and workshops being conducted throughout the last 12 months. We also assisted many Clubs with membership recruitment initiatives and the implementation of the Junior Dolphin Program, which helped our Clubs to grow their membership.

Excellent ongoing support has again been provided by our dedicated and enthusiastic Development Officers. They have played key roles in the delivery of the programs mentioned above

and not only have they worked well with the Clubs but they also have engaged with the schools in their respective areas. All their valuable work and ongoing support has contributed greatly to the increased membership this year.

It is pleasing to report that we have been successful in securing \$100,000 in funding under Water Safety Funding to recommence our Indigenous Learn to Swim Programs that have been so successful in recent years. This year SNSW recorded an increase in the number of Indigenous members enjoying the sport of swimming.

Partnerships continued to strengthen throughout the year with Disability services and Disability groups across the State. These partnerships are assisting greatly in increasing participation and removing barriers for swimmers with disability. SNSW now offers regionally based classification opportunities for swimmers with disability. SNSW has again recorded an increase in the number of Multi Class athletes enjoying our sport.

The employment of the NSW Coaching Director has greatly increased our ability to assist Coaches with their lane space and employment arrangements and this additional resource has enabled us to build a better relationship with facility owners to grow aquatic space for our sport.

# PERFORMANCE

Swimming NSW throughout the year continued to provide swimmers with a strong domestic competition program. It continues to improve the resources available to members, Clubs and Areas to ensure smooth operation of all areas relating to meets, athlete information and entries and results. Our event attendances and revenue increased on the previous year.

This year we employed Jon Shaw as NSW Coaching Director and in conjunction with Swimming Australia (SAL), Ron McKeon was appointed State Head Coach. Jon and Ron are already making a great impact on the

support and services being offered to our Coaches and Athletes across the State.

The new Performance Pathway Structure was implemented this year for our talented athletes. This structure is delivering a greatly improved development program for these athletes and included our first overseas touring team for many years. Our NSW Touring Team visited the National Championships in Japan.

The Technical Swimming Committee (TSC) has again given excellent service to our increasing number of volunteer Technical Officials throughout the year. Many resources, training notes and other material for Technical Officials were reviewed and updated by the TSC and these resources are available to members on the NSW website and the Technical Officials Newsletter continues to be a great success.

The roll out of our Online Technical Official Courses continued this year with four (4) Courses now available. Over 900 candidates have now taken one of these courses. These courses are now being used across Australia and overseas. We also recorded a 4% increase in Technical Official Accreditations across the year.

# PARTNERSHIPS

Swimming NSW together with ascta NSW Inc. has worked hard to support and develop NSW Coaches through the delivery of the National Accreditation Program and a well-resourced coaching development framework. This very important partnership has been further strengthened with the appointment of the NSW Head Coach and the NSW Coaching Director this year.

During the year, Swimming NSW continued to work closely with and support SNSW Aquatic Management Pty Ltd. Aquatic Management continues to build valuable relationships with local Councils and Aquatic Management owners and operators.

Our partnership with SAL continued to be strong. Several projects of significant importance for NSW included the launch of the Junior Dolphins, the release and implementation of the Safe Sport Framework and the appointment by SAL of our Head Coach. There will be future increased support from SAL for the members and Clubs through the development and delivery of new participation programs given the major financial boost of the Optus sponsorship.

Representation has continued to be active with NSW Olympic Council and the Australian Commonwealth Games Association (NSW Branch).

# CONCLUSION

This year has produced some very good results for Swimming NSW and it is important to acknowledge and thank those who have contributed to those outcomes.

Swimming NSW is in a sound position with excellent programs and services for all of our members and this year we have recorded our fifth consecutive operational surplus. The very capable Staff, ably led by CEO, Mark Heathcote, have provided great support and service to the members, Committees and Board during the year. It is largely due to their efforts that we find ourselves in this situation.

Also, a huge thank you to our sponsors, who are listed elsewhere in the report. Without their support, we could not have achieved the level of success that we have experienced. This year we have explored partner opportunities with new organisations that align with our objectives to further grow investment in our sport and this included securing an additional \$140,000 in NSW Government funding.

This opportunity is taken to also acknowledge the contribution made by my fellow Directors who have given strong strategic direction to the CEO and Staff. There have been many challenges in recent times for our sport and the decisions made by the Directors have placed our Company in its current strong position.

Finally, a sincere thank you to all the members who have assisted in getting Swimming NSW to the enviable place that we enjoy today and I look forward to the continued advancement of our wonderful sport in the future.

# ACHIEVEMENTS


The 2016-17 year was a fantastic year for Swimming NSW where we achieved a number of milestones against our strategic objectives. Strategic Plans are often aspirational, but with one year left to go on the current Swimming NSW Plan, we are confident that we will record significant achievement across all our objectives. Importantly, we are building momentum across several key areas. Membership has grown on four occasions in the last five years. We have recorded our fifth consecutive financial surplus. Our events have continued to grow and provide invaluable competition for our members and we have launched the Safe Sport Framework to make our sport more enjoyable and safer for everyone.

Our financial results have allowed us to invest more into our sport than ever before and we have done this with the employment of a NSW Coaching Director, increased development activities and better services for our members through the Development Officers and Office Staff. We have also been able to invest in our volunteers, providing online courses for them as well as an excellent development program, which has allowed us to increase the number of Technical Officials we have across the state for three consecutive years.

There are of course still several areas where we can make further progress and the most pressing of these is to improve our athlete's performances at National events. The Board and Management have made this a key priority for Swimming NSW and as mentioned we have put in place to a NSW Coaching Director to assist with educating, developing and mentoring our Coaches. This role has been supplemented by the appointment of a NSW State Head Coach by Swimming Australia. As I write the Board are now investigating an opportunity to appoint a third individual, specifically tasked with assisting with Coach Education and Development in regional NSW. We firmly believe the more we can support and develop our coaches, the stronger our Clubs and Athletes will be when they compete on the National stage.

A highlight over the past year was the launch of the Optus Junior Dolphin Program across the State last summer. Over 300 NSW Clubs now offer this program at their Club and the program now boats almost 6000 members. The program's emphasis on fun and participation has reenergized many Clubs and it was fantastic to see hundreds of smiling faces splashed across our social media pages over the course of the summer as Clubs ran Junior Dolphin Carnivals. If there ever was a program that reinvigorated the grass roots of our sport then this was it. We look forward to working even harder next year to support our Clubs to again provide this program to their members.

Our events continue to be the showcase for our sport and this year we experienced increased levels of participation in all of our events. This year we again surveyed our event attendees to collect important information about the Swimming NSW event experience. This information has allowed us to make several changes to improve the overall experience for our members. We recognise that we still have some work to do to ensure that our events remain current and are appropriate to the needs of our members and therefore will we will continue this work to evolve our events so that they provide the greatest level of customer satisfaction for our attendees. We were proud to launch the Swimming NSW Results App, SwimMate at the 2016/17 NSW



State Age Championships and with now over 2000 downloads the App has been a great success. We plan to launch the Android version very shortly along with a major update later in the year.

Swimming NSW has continued its support of Swimming NSW Aquatic Management and both organisation's this year have concentrated their efforts on ensuring that our Clubs and Coaches have the water access they require to achieve their objectives. It was pleasing to see so many brand new or re-developed Aquatic Centre's opening in the last 12 months; Pymble Ladies College, Trinity Grammar, Angelo Anestis Aquatic Centre at Bexley, Auburn & Hornsby Aquatic Centre. There are also some fantastic facilities in the pipeline at Tamworth, Parramatta and Canberra. We have also continued our work with several Areas and Clubs to ensure that they have appropriate agreements in place to protect their water space. Our Coaching Director has also been regularly visiting Coaches and assisting them, wherever possible, in securing and/or increasing their current lane space.

With a key focus of our Strategic Plan being increased participation in the sport of swimming we were pleased to again record an increase in membership this year. This year's increase was the largest in recent times and demonstrates we are building energy in this important area. Much of the membership increase result can be attributed to our excellent volunteers at both Club and Area level who have worked tirelessly to create opportunities for parents and swimmers to participate in our sport.

Our Standing and Management Committees continue to provide excellent advice and guidance on various operational and strategic aspects of our sport. The Committees ensure we are working towards a continuous path of improvement and are regularly developing new initiatives for our members. We are always looking for new people to nominate for our Standing Committees and there are regularly vacancies on these Committees so I would encourage anyone who is interested in these Committees to please nominate for one of these important roles.

This year we launched our Lane Ropes to Leadership program, which has been specifically designed to give our teenage members a voice with the administrators of our sport. This group of outstanding individuals have already provided some invaluable insights into how we can make our sport more enjoyable for teenagers and therefore keep them in the sport longer. This group has also developed two initiatives

which they will launch this summer; a Twilight Race Party and a Leadership Camp and we are very excited to see these two initiatives come to life.

As noted, in conjunction with Swimming Australia, we launched the SAL Safe Sport Framework in July 2016 which now applies to all Areas and Clubs. The Framework is first and foremost our commitment to providing a safe sport for all members, particularly children, but is also a fantastic resource for Areas and Clubs to use when dealing with issues that arise from time to time. We have run numerous face to face education sessions on the Framework throughout the year as well as several webinars to assist members in understanding what the Framework is all about. We are also continuing to develop further resources that will assist Clubs and Areas with implementation of the Framework.

Swimming NSW maintains its support to our large volunteer base through our Technical Swimming Committee. Throughout the year, the Committee has continued to look at ways to simplify both the Accreditation and Officiating Pathways to make it easier for volunteers to be involved in our sport and to also provide development and mentoring opportunities for these individuals.

This year we launched a further three Online Technical Official Training modules and in addition to the Timekeeper module, we now have Inspector of Turns, Judge of Strokes and Marshall/Check Starter (thanks to the assistance of Metro North East). The Starter Module is now in development and will be released shortly. We have had almost 1000 unique candidates take one of these courses across Australia and overseas. All our volunteers continue to be kept up to date with the latest information and news through the Technical Swimming Committee's bi-monthly newsletter.

The Committee have also continued to develop and improve the Technical

Official Development program which runs in parallel to the Area Development Program which has been well received and provides development opportunities for up and coming Area Technical Officials. The Committee has also been developing resources for Area Technical Swimming Coordinators to make the task of training new volunteers much easier. All of this work culminated in Swimming NSW recording an increase against the previous year for every single Technical Official accreditation and an increase overall of 4%.

I would also like to take this opportunity to acknowledge the ongoing support of sponsors, Speedo, the NSW Office of Sport, the NSW Department of Justice, 2XU and the Courtyard by Marriott North Ryde. Without the generous support of all our sponsors we would not be able to foster, control and develop the sport of swimming in NSW to deliver membership and development activities for the benefit of all our members.

Swimming NSW has continued to capitalise on the changes we have made over the previous years, so as to ensure the continued improvement of our sport into the future. The Board and staff are well aware of the importance of continually evolving the administration of our sport to suit the modern day needs of society and this year we have aimed to achieve this through both increased and improved service to our members.



# **FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE**

The Company recorded a profit for the financial year of \$57,803 which was ahead of the original intended budget surplus of \$27,790. This was another pleasing result for the Company.

The major reasons for the result are as follows:

- Increase in Donations, Sponsorships
   & Government Grants of \$92,000
- Increased Swim Meet Revenue of
   \$38,000 due to increased entries and attendances

A saving of \$8,000 on Stationery and Printing, now that we are using electronic methods more regularly

to communicate with our members

A saving of \$11,000 on Office Equipment Rental & Supplies due

to the renegotiation of existing contracts

A saving of \$13,500 on Depreciation

 expenses across the course of the year

A saving of \$13,000 on Swim Meet expenses due to decreases in administration costs in presenting each of our events

This gave the Company an Operating deficit of \$65,775, the lowest in recent years, and this was offset by our Swim Trade and Speedo Swim Shop profits to the value of \$105,447. Overall the net surplus for the year was \$39,687.

This year, the Board invested for the first time \$500,000 into an Investment Fund with

Swimming Australia which is managed by Escala Partners, the value of this investment at year end had risen to \$524,984. The unrealised gain on this investment of \$18,116 combined with the net surplus gave the overall profit of \$57,803.

This result is the Company's fifth consecutive surplus and places us in an enviably strong financial position. A surplus budget has again been approved for the 2017-18 financial year. Our strong financial results in recent years has allowed the Board to create a Reserve Fund which the Board can invest in specific projects which will assist Swimming NSW in achieving its Strategic Objectives.

# **MEMBERSHIP**

The membership figures as at year end indicate an increase in membership of 5.8% or 1846 to 33,714. Again, this year, Swimmer membership grew faster (9.6% increase) than Non-Swimmer Membership. This membership increase was reflected across nearly all Areas, with particularly strong growth in the regional areas of NSW. At the time of writing, we now have over 34,000 members.

As noted previously, this year we launched the Optus Junior Dolphins Program across the State to great success. Over 5500 children are currently registered as Junior Dolphin members. We hope to grow this program further in 2017/18 and also launch the program in Learn to Swim Schools to further boost participation.

Last summer we also launched our 'Dive In' membership campaign which aimed to capitalise on the increased exposure for the sport of swimming during the 2016 Rio Olympic Games and to get more children into learn to swim and swimming Clubs through 'Come N Try' events being run throughout the summer season. We are confident that this campaign played a role in our increased membership this year.

It is our goal to continue to support the grass roots aspects of the sport which will assist in maintaining participation levels across the State and also enable us to attract new people to our sport. We also are also looking to grow participation in the sport overall through non-member based initiatives in the coming year.

A big thank you to the coaches in attendance for giving your time and sharing your expertise.
















# **OPEN WATER & DISTANCE SQUAD**

# **MEMBERS**

The Committee is comprised of two directors appointed by the Board and up to four independent persons appointed by the Board. These independent appointees all possess special and appropriate financial and business skill sets and add value to this committee. The committee is supported by SNSW's CEO Mr. Mark Heathcote and Finance Manager Michelle Boon.

# WORK

The committee undertook a wide range of tasks during 2016-2017. Its primary and principal tasks were as follows the:

• Review of the monthly management accounts and reporting to the Board about those accounts. The Committee uses a "dashboard' style of reporting on the monthly management accounts to assist the Board in identifying the key issues for discussion. Pleasingly, the financial result for 2016-2017 was ahead of budget and has resulted in a surplus. The achievement of this surplus which is in line with the organisation's Capital Adequacy Policy is important for ensuring the ongoing financial sustainability of the organisation.

• Review of the monthly actual operational results against profit forecast. The outcome of these reviews is reported to the Board. These reviews provide assurance and early warning as to if the budget forecast is on track and if any corrective action is required to be undertaken.

• Overseeing the process for the preparation of the annual financial statements for 2016-2017 and the audit of those statements. • Overseeing the process and the preparation of the 2017-18 financial budget, and providing advice on this process to the Board.

• Overseeing the administration and review of the organisation's Investment Policy Statement. This administration includes the delegated power to make strategic decisions in regard to the investment of part of the capital of SNSW in a broad range of asset classes with FORM. FORM is a management investment company recommended by SAL.

• Ongoing monitoring of the performance of the Speedo Shop at SOPAC.

• Receiving of reports at each of its meeting on the status of Work Health and Safety issues within the organisation and monitoring compliance with the Board's Work Health and Safety policies and legislation. Again, the Committee uses a "dashboard' style of reporting to assist it with assessing this status and compliance.

•Periodic review of the strategic and operational risks of the organisation, and the effectiveness of risk management policies and mitigation strategies being adopted to manage those risks.

• Reviewing of the terms of the insurance policies for 2016-2017.

• Review of Board policies, including its: various governance policies which cover conflicts of interest, Board and staff policy, corporate gifts and hospitality, member protection and welfare, financial policies covering delegations of authority, financial policies and procedures, and various Human Resource policies covering Work Health and Safety, IT security and disaster recovery, the protection of confidential, private and personal information managed by the organisation. During the past year, the committee reviewed over 20 Board policies.

The Committee prepares and follows an annual work plan. This work plan aids the Committee in retaining its focus and the achievement of its function.

# CONCLUSION

The Committee undertakes an important role in assisting the Board in its governance and financial stewardship of the organization. As ever, the members of the Committee have been committed and are diligent in their role, and the Board is thankful for their continued willingness to make themselves available and to serve SNSW in this important way.

On behalf of the Technical Swimming Committee (TSC), I have much pleasure in submitting this Annual Report, covering activities for the 2016/17 year.

It was with sadness that the TSC noted the passing of several long standing Technical Officials who individually and collectively have provided many years of service to SNSW and to their respective Clubs and Areas. Sincere condolences are extended to the families and friends of Al Koh, Keith Midgley, Margaret Kniha and Chris Elliott.

The TSC continues to work through the Pathways Document developed in early 2015. This paper sets out the pathway from "grass roots" to FINA level officiating. All the initial recommendations of the Report have been addressed and exceeded in some areas. With the assistance of Ben Ramsden from Abbotsleigh Swim Club, the TSC has produced online Technical Official Courses for Timekeeper, Judge of Strokes, Inspector of Turns, Marshal and Check Starter. It has been very pleasing to see the very high number of candidates registering for the various courses, including candidates from interstate and overseas.

A sub-committee of the TSC has met on a number of occasions during the year and have developed a number of strategies around the broad themes of "Accreditation Pathway" and "Officiating Pathway". The TSC is currently working through their recommendations.

The TSC welcomed the appointment of John Rohloff to the committee in August 2016. On behalf of the TSC, I must acknowledge the considerable work of John Skene OAM, who retired from the TSC in July. Many thanks John for your significant contributions to the TSC over a number of years.

Five Swimming NSW (SNSW) Officials and a mentor were appointed to the 2016 State Teams Meet and workshops, which were held at the AIS, Canberra. Congratulations to David Cooksley, Sue Worthington, John Williams (Mentor), Phil Johnston, Brett Patrick and Nick Keith. The Meet and Workshops are held over a weekend in Canberra and consist of education sessions and four pool sessions where the Technical Officials are given the opportunity to work at a SAL meet. Congratulations on your achievements and many thanks to both SAL and SNSW for their continuing support of this important event.

At the conclusion of the State Teams Meet, the SAL TSC held a meeting with representatives from State and Territory Technical Swimming Committees. This was the first time such a meeting was held and was a fantastic initiative. Topics covered included officiating culture, recruitment, development and retention. There was also discussion on how the SAL TSC can work more cohesively with each of the State TSCs in the future.

The Technical Official **Development** Program was again held during 2016 and built on the success of the initial program in 2015. The 2016 Program culminated with the Achiever's Squad Meet which included 63 participants with Technical Officials coming from every SNSW Area. This was the first full year of the Technical Official Development Program and the TSC has closely reviewed the outcomes to develop and refine the 2017 Program. The Development Program is important in creating peer group ties throughout NSW and in improving and standardising officiating at local levels throughout the State. Since the program's introduction in 2015, 78 Technical Officials have participated.

Over 200 people completed a recent Survey of Technical Officials conducted by SNSW. It was pleasing to see the high number of respondents. It was also pleasing to note the high number of officials who read the Newsletter which the TSC continues to produce every two months. The Newsletter is an important way to help improve communication between the TSC and Technical Officials by highlighting TSC activities, upcoming events and rule changes. A number of people who responded to the Survey have made comment on the content of the Newsletter, and the TSC is currently working through the comments with the view to incorporating some of the suggestions into future editions.

The Annual Awards dinner was held on 23rd July at the Pullman Hotel, Sydney Olympic Park. Congratulations to the following recipients on their achievements:



The Technical Officials Forum was held the following day. Guest presenter was Nick Smith, a Sports Scientist from Swimming Queensland. Nick gave a very entertaining and informative presentation covering training and DQs. The TSC has reviewed the feedback received and will use this information to help develop next year's Forum program.

Congratulations to the following SNSW Officials on their recent appointments/ achievements:

• Faye Lewis on her appointment to FINA List 19 (Referee);

• Cherry Smith on her appointment to FINA List 19 (Referee) and the 13th FINA World Short Championships in Canada;

• Dave Cooper on his appointment to FINA List 19 (Starter);

• John Hart on his appointment to the SAL TSC;

• Ken Jones on his appointment to the 2016 Olympic Games in Rio;

• **Bill Ford** on being appointed to the 2016 Olympic Games in Rio and the 17th FINA World Swimming Championships in Budapest; and

• John Rohloff on his appointment to the 17th FINA World Swimming Championships in Budapest.

Congratulations also to the very capable contingent of Technical Officials from NSW who officiated at the 2016 Oceania Swimming Championships in Fiji; the Junior Pan Pacs in Hawaii and to our officials appointed to the various Australian Championships held during the year.

Thank you to those who have supported the TSC during the year. In particular, thanks to the many Technical Officials



who continue to provide their time and expertise; to assist at many State, National and International meets, as well as the various other meets held throughout the year; the ATSC Coordinators and the members of their Committees whose demanding work ensures the successes of Swimming NSW Technical Officials; and to SNSW CEO, Mark Heathcote, President Graham Towle and Board of Directors for their ongoing support.

During the year, Swimming Australia made changes to the National Officiating Accreditation Program (NOAP) to reflect stronger officiating principles. Learner Guides were refreshed to conform Australian Sports Commission with requirements and updated in line with recent FINA Rule changes. The main changes to the Program included the introduction of a written examination and two practical assessments for the Level 1 Referee gualification and written assessments for both Judge of Strokes and Inspector of Turns. While understanding Technical that Officials some may difficulty undertaking have written examinations, the TSC is supportive of the SAL objective to achieve competent officials and the SNSW TSC is committed to provide the necessary support to any official to help achieve this outcome.

It is pleasing to see that many people have already successfully completed the examination. Therefore, the TSC has reviewed and updated a number of Training Notes and Exercises to take into account changes to the NOAP and the introduction of the online Technical Official modules.

The 2017 NSW Country Regional Meets were held in Charlestown, Wellington and Unanderra. Numerous assessments were carried out by members of the TSC who attended these meets. Congratulations to all Officials involved and thank you for the hospitality shown to the TSC members.

It was pleasing to see the number of people undertaking training and assessments during the year. At State 13-18 years a large number of officials were successful in their Level 2 Starter and Referee practical assessments and a number were successful in their Level 3 Pre-assessment. Swimming NSW The Competitions Committee continues to be committed to the ongoing review of Swimming NSW events to ensure the development of the NSW event structure, in line with national events. There has again been outstanding participation across Swimming NSW Championships. This is a tribute to the continued hard work of coaches and athletes. The Committee has continued to review the qualifying standards at NSW Championship events. There have been several new committee members come on board in the last year and this has led to some robust conversations around the committee table. The input has been extremely valuable to ensure we are providing great competition for our swimmers.

The event structure of the NSW Championships has remained stable for the 2016-17 season but there are indications that there may need to be changes in line with the structures being put in place by Swimming Australia. These will be exciting changes. The NSW State Age Championships, held in December for the first time this season, was a success and something to build on in future years. Over the season, we have seen a steady increase in the numbers of athletes at NSW Championships, competing further indicating the tremendous effort our coaches are doing to prepare our athlete for key NSW events. We hope we are ensuring that our swimmers are prepared for higher level competition.

The Annual Pointscore Banner was hotly contested again this year. This is a prestigious award for clubs to compete for throughout the season, with the emphasis on all club swimmers participating and gaining points to contribute to their club's overall tally.



The NSW Open Championships was our feature swimming event of the summer season and was an outstanding success. Many interstate swimmers attended, wishing to have a 'hit-out' prior to the Australian Open Championships (World Championship Trials). It was great to have the Japanese team on board again this year and they provided some stiff competition for all swimmers. Our NSW swimmers can only benefit from this standard of competition, having to race hard and fast to gain places in finals. Swimming NSW again held its NSW National Prep Meet in March, with the aim of providing swimmers with the opportunity to qualify for and prepare for the upcoming Australian Open and Age Championships.

The Committee continues to develop a long-term calendar in consultation with Swimming Australia and ascta NSW to ensure there is a consistent and reliable event calendar in place and are looking at providing high quality competition on a regular basis across the season. #### INDEMNIFICATION AND INSURANCE OF DIRECTORS

As outlined in the Swimming New South Wales Limited constitution, the company shall indemnify its directors and employees against all damages and costs, including legal costs, for which any such director may be or become liable to any third party in consequence of any act or omission except wilful misconduct:

- in the case of a director, performed or made whilst acting on behalf of and with the authority, express or implied of the company; and
- in the case of an employee, performed or made in the course of, and within the scope of his or her employment by the company.

The management liability insurance policy taken out by the company provides a limit of \$5,000,000 with an excess of up to \$2,500 for each claim. The cost of the policy was \$25,882 (2016: \$24,872).

#### INDEMNIFICATION OF AUDITORS

To the extent permitted by law, Swimming New South Wales has agreed to indemnify its auditors, Ernst & Young, as part of the terms of its audit engagement against claims by third parties arising from the audit (for an unspecified amount). No payment has been made to indemnify Ernst & Young during the financial year or since the financial year end.

#### ENVIRONMENTAL REGULATIONS AND PERFORMANCE

The company is not subject to any particular or significant environmental regulation.

### Notes to the Financial Statements

#### FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017

#### 1. CORPORATE INFORMATION

The consolidated financial report of Swimming New South Wales Limited and its controlled entities (the consolidated entity) for the year ended 31 March 2017 was authorised for issue in accordance with a resolution of the Directors on 30 May 2017.

Swimming New South Wales Limited (the Company) is a company limited by guarantee and without share capital. It is incorporated and domiciled in Australia.

The nature of the operations and principal activities of the Company are described in the Directors' Report.

#### 2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### (a) Basis of preparation

The consolidated financial report is a general purpose financial report, which has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Corporations Act 2001, Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board. The consolidated financial report has also been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs.

The consolidated financial report is presented in Australian dollars.

#### (b) Statement of compliance

The consolidated entity has adopted AASB 1053 Application of Tiers of Australian Accounting Standards and AASB 2010-2 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from Reduced Disclosure Requirements for the financial year.

The consolidated entity is a not-for-profit entity which is not publicly accountable. Therefore the consolidated financial report of the consolidated entity is a tier two general purpose financial report which has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements (AASB – RDRs) (including Australian interpretations) adopted by the Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASB) and the Corporations Act 2001.

The consolidated financial report complies with Australian Accounting Standards. Australian Accounting Standards contain requirements specific to not-for profit entities, including Standards AASB 116 Property, Plant and Equipment, AASB 136 Impairment of Assets and AASB 1004 Contributions.

#### (c) Basis of consolidation

For the year ended 31 March 2017, the consolidated financial report incorporates the financial statements of the Company and the entities controlled by the Company, including New South Wales Swimming Nominees Pty Ltd, NSW Swimming Foundation Trust and Swimming NSW Aquatic Management Pty Ltd.

Control is achieved where the Company has the power to govern the financial and operating policies of an entity so as to obtain benefits from its activities. The results of the subsidiaries included in the consolidated statement of comprehensive income are from the effective date of acquisition. All intra-group transactions, balances, income and expenses are eliminated in full on consolidation. In the separate financial statements of the Company, all intra-group transactions are generally accounted for by reference to the existing book value of the items.

### Notes to the Financial Statements (continued)

#### FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017

#### 2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

#### (d) Changes in accounting policy, disclosures, standards and interpretations

The accounting policies adopted are consistent with those of the previous year, unless otherwise stated.

Several new accounting standards and amendments apply for the first time in 2016/17. The consolidated entity has not yet assessed the impact of the new accounting standards and amendments on the consolidated financial report of the consolidated entity.

#### (e) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and short term deposits in the balance sheet comprise cash at bank and on hand and short term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less.

For the purposes of the consolidated statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents consist of cash and cash equivalents as defined above, net of outstanding bank overdrafts.

#### (f) Trade and other receivables

Trade Receivables, which generally have 30-60 day terms, are recognised and carried at original invoice amount less an allowance for any uncollectible amounts.

An allowance for doubtful debts is made when there is objective evidence that the consolidated entity will not be able to collect the debts. Bad debts are written off when identified.

#### (g) Investments and other financial assets

Investments consist of term deposits held with Australian financial institutions with a maturity date greater than three months.

The consolidated entity has classified its financial assets as available-for-sale financial assets. The classification depends on the purpose for which the investments were acquired. Management determines the classification of its investments at initial recognition.

#### Available-for-sale financial assets

Available-for-sale financial assets, comprising principally marketable equity securities, are non-derivatives that are either designated in this category or not classified in any of the other categories. They are included in non-current assets unless the investment matures or management intends to dispose of the investment within 12 months of the end of the reporting period. Investments are designated as available-for-sale if they do not have fixed maturities and fixed or determinable payments and management intends to hold them for the medium to long-term.

#### (i) Recognition and derecognition

Financial assets are recognised on trade-date, the date on which the consolidated entity commits to purchase or sell the asset. Financial assets are derecognised when the rights to receive the cash flows from the financial assets have expired or have been transferred and the consolidated entity has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership.

When securities classified as available-for-sale are sold, the accumulated fair value adjustments recognised in other comprehensive income are reclassified to profit or loss as gains and losses from investment securities.

### Notes to the Financial Statements (continued)

#### FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017

#### 2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

(ii) Measurement

Available-for-sale financial assets are subsequently carried at fair value. Gains or losses arising from changes in the fair value are recognised as follows:

- for available-for-sale financial assets that are monetary securities denominated in a foreign currency – translation differences related to changes in the amortised cost of the security are recognised in profit or loss and other changes in the carrying amount are recognised in other comprehensive income

- for other monetary and non-monetary securities classified as available-for-sale - in other comprehensive income

Dividend income and interest income from these available-for-sale financial assets is recognised in profit or loss as part of non-operating revenue when the consolidated entity's right to receive payments is established.

#### (iii) Impairment

If there is objective evidence of impairment for available-for-sale financial assets, where for available-for-sale assets a prolonged decline in the fair value of securities is considered an indicator that the assets are impaired, the cumulative loss is removed from equity as other comprehensive income and recognised in profit or loss as an impairment expense.

#### (h) Inventories

Trading stock is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Inventories which are not treated as trading stock are held at cost.

#### (i) Intangibles

Intangible assets acquired are initially measured at cost.

The useful lives of intangible assets are assessed to be either finite or infinite. Intangible assets with finite lives are amortised over a 3 to 5 year useful life and tested for impairment whenever there is indication that the intangible asset may be impaired. The amortisation period and the amortisation method for an intangible asset with a finite useful life are reviewed at least at each financial year end. The amortisation expense on intangible assets with finite lives is recognised in the consolidated statement of comprehensive income in the expense category consistent with the function of the intangible asset.

#### (j) Trade and other payables

Liabilities are recognised for amounts to be paid in the future for goods and services received, whether or not billed to the company. Trade account payables are settled within 30 days.

#### (k) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the consolidated entity has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a results of past event, it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

If the effect of the time value of money is material, provisions are discounted using a current rate that reflects the risk specific to the liability.

### Notes to the Financial Statements (continued)

#### 2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

#### (I) Lease

Operating lease payments are recognised as an expense in the consolidated statement of comprehensive income on a straight line basis over the lease term.

#### (m) Property, plant and equipment

Buildings are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and any impairment in value.

Plant and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation.

(i) Depreciation

Items of property, plant and equipment are depreciated over their estimated useful lives.

The depreciation rates and methods used for each class of asset, for the current and previous years, are as follows:

#### (ii) Impairment

The carrying values of property, plant and equipment are reviewed for impairment at each reporting date, with recoverable amount being estimated when events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value may be impaired.

The recoverable amount of property, plant and equipment is the higher of fair value less costs to sell and value in use. In assessing the value in use the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risk specific to the asset.

For an asset that does not generate largely independent cash inflows, recoverable amount is determined for the cash generating unit to which the asset belongs, unless the asset's value in use can be estimated to be close to its fair value.

An impairment exists when the carrying value of an asset or cash generating units exceeds its estimated recoverable amount. The asset or cash generating unit is then written down to its recoverable amount. For property, plant and equipment losses are recognised in the consolidated statement of comprehensive income.

#### (iii) Derecognition and disposal

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no further future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal.

Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the assets) is included in the consolidated statement of comprehensive income in the year the asset is derecognised.

### Notes to the Financial Statements (continued)

#### 2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

#### (n) Taxation

The company is a non-profit organisation formed for the development of swimming and is exempt from income tax. The company is registered for GST.

#### (o) Employee entitlements

#### (i) Wages, salaries, annual leave and time in lieu

Liabilities for wages, salaries, time in lieu and annual leave expected to be settled within 12 months of the reporting date are recognised in trade and other payables and provisions in respect of employees' services up to the reporting date. They are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

#### (ii) Long service leave

The liability for long service leave is recognised in the provision for employees' benefits and measured as the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date. Consideration is given to expected future wage and salary levels, experience of employee departures, and periods of service. Expected future payments are discounted using the market yields at the reporting date on notional government bonds with terms to maturity and currencies that match, as closely as possible, the estimated future cash outflows.

#### (p) Recognition of Revenue

All revenue is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the company and the revenue can be reliably measured.

#### (q) Government grants

Government grants are recognised where there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and all attached conditions will be complied with. When the grant relates to an expense item, it is recognised as income on a systematic basis over the periods that the related costs, for which it is intended to compensate, are expensed. When the grant relates to an asset, it is recognised as income in equal amounts over the expected useful life of the related asset.

## Notes to the Financial Statements (continued)

#### FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017

#### 2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

#### (r) Other taxation

Revenue, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST except:

- When the GST incurred on a purchase of goods and services is not recoverable from the taxation authority, in which case the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense item as applicable; and
- Receivables and payables, which are stated with the amount of GST included.

The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is included as part of receivables or payables in the balance sheet.

Cash flows are included in the consolidated statement of cash flows on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities, which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority are classified as operating cash flows.

Commitments and contingencies are disclosed net of the amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to the taxation authority.

#### (s) Reserves

The accumulated changes in fair value of available-for-sale financial assets are shown in the Available-for-sale reserve account on the consolidated statement of financial position and consolidated statement of changes in equity.

Any gains or losses arising from the disposal of available-for-sale financial assets are recognised in profit or loss as income in the period in which the gain or loss is realised.

#### (t) Comparatives

Where necessary, comparatives have been reclassified and repositioned for consistency with current year disclosures.



This graph shows the membership statistics by Area and Year from 2012-2017.







The graph below shows the member demographics by gender grouping for the 2016-2017 membership season.







#### Membership Distribution by Age and Year


This graph shows the membership age distribution year-on-year over the past five membership seasons.
