### **Working with Children Check**

Unfortunately, this meant that less than half of all nominating officials were able to receive an appointment.

## My Lane – Faye Lewis

### 1. What Club did you start your swimming career? What Club are you with now?

I joined Blacktown City Swimming Club in 2001/2002 when my children joined the swim club and am now a life member. I go to Club Night most Friday nights to officiate.

### 2. What was your first TO credential and what year did you attain that credential?

My first credential was time keeper which I obtained in 2003.

### 3. Why did you become an official? Why do you still officiate?

I became an official to support the club as they required help at club night and I didn't like sitting in the stands all day. I was fortunate at that time to have an experienced official in the club that encouraged me to develop as an official. We would sit together early Saturday mornings to do the theory, in preparation for exams. There were plenty of opportunities to practice skills in a supportive environment. I officiate now as I enjoy officiating at all levels from grass root to international meets. I have developed some great friendships over the years. It took a lot of hard work to develop the skills I need to officiate and to get to the level I am at and I wanted to continue to use these skills. I now enjoy mentoring and training other officials having the opportunity to share my learning.

### 4. What is the highest credential attained?

I am a level 3 referee and have been fortunate to be currently be on the FINA list as a referee.



### **5. What is your goal(s)?**

When I first started officiating my goal was to become a referee to help out the club. My referee training was conducted by a FINA level referee who encouraged me to attend state and national meets. I had some success at State Level getting good assessments being encouraged by assessors to continue on my journey. In 2011 I was fortunate enough to be on the NOSP (National Officiating Scholarship Program) and the goals I set then were to gain Level 3 accreditation, become a FINA level referee and gain an appointment to the Commonwealth Games on the Gold Coast. I have achieved all this and more. My goal now is to continue to improve my skills and to coach and mentor other officials.

### **6. What is the highest-level meet at which you have officiated?**

I have refereed at the Pan Pacific Games on the Gold Coast, the World Cup in Japan and Open National Championships. I officiated at the Junior World Championships in Singapore, and more recently at the Commonwealth Games on the Gold Coast.

### **7. With respect to your answer to Question 6, can you please pass on some of the strategies/tips you used to help you achieve your appointment?**

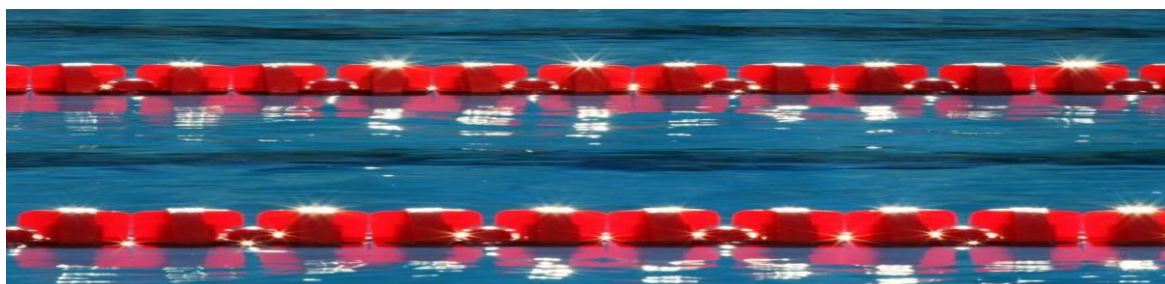
My advice to others is to find a mentor and a good group of friends to officiate with, it makes the experience more enjoyable. Make connections with people that can support you in your pathway.

Have a thorough knowledge of the Rules and refresh and keep up to date regularly.

Be open to learn. Take as many opportunities as you can to officiate, ask lots of questions, learn from others. Every opportunity no matter the position you are appointed in is an opportunity to learn and watch others officiate. Ask questions about what you observe and why decisions were made.

Attend the SAL and State provided training and development opportunities.

Make sure you have the support of your family as it can be time consuming.

## The QUIZ

### April Quiz Answer

To recap – You have been appointed to Referee Session 2 of the SNSW Metro Long Course Championships. During the second heat of the Women’s 800m Freestyle the IoT assigned to Lane 9 at the Turn End has reported to you that as the swimmer in Lane 9 was about to turn at the 150m mark, an adult male (who you find out to be the swimmer’s father) hands the swimmer in your lane a pair of goggles.

The IoT advises that, after receiving the replacement goggles, the swimmer touched the wall at the 150M mark (SW5.2 – “Some part of the swimmer must touch the wall upon completion of each length...”) and did not take a step (SW10.4 – “Standing on the bottom during freestyle events.....shall not disqualify a swimmer, but he shall not walk”).

As Referee, it would be unreasonable to disqualify the swimmer as she has not done anything wrong. The swimmer has touched the wall at the 150M mark and has not taken a stride. Furthermore, on further questioning you understand that she did not pull on the lane rope (SW 10.5 “Pulling on the lane rope is not allowed”) or become completely submerged whilst receiving the new goggles (SW5.3 “Some part of the swimmer must break the surface of the water throughout the race, except it shall be permissible for the swimmer to be completely submerged during the turn and for a distance of not more than 15 metres after the start and each turn. By that point, the head must have broken the surface”).

You thank the IoT for their report and refer the matter to the Technical Manager.

The swimmer in Lane 9 (i.e. the swimmer in question) ends up finishing third in the Event. The coach of the 4<sup>th</sup> placed swimmer approaches the Referee and says that he wants to

protest the result. The Referee explains why Lane 9 was not disqualified, but the coach insists on lodging a formal protest.

What instructions should the Referee give the coach on lodging a protest? Who should the Referee advise and why?

### Answer

The Referee should advise the Technical Manager that a Protest has been received for the Women's 800m Freestyle. The Referee should also advise the Control Room Supervisor as publication of the results will need to be delayed until after the Protest is resolved.

GR 23 details the procedure for Protests and Jury of Appeal. In this example, the coach should be advised that the Protest needs to be submitted in writing to the Referee, along with a deposit of \$100 and received within 30 minutes after the conclusion of the 800m Freestyle. The Referee should see SNSW Staff for a copy of the current Protest Form. If not immediately concluded at the time of the Protest, the Referee, as a courtesy, should advise the coach what time the 800m concluded.

GR23.2 states that "Protests must be submitted to the Referee, in writing by the responsible team leader or the swimmer, or a representative on behalf of the swimmer."

The Rule goes on to say that "All protests must be considered by the Referee. If he rejects the protest, he must state the reasons to the Jury of Appeal."

In this example, the Protest is received by the Referee within the required timeline. The Referee, based on the original discussion with the IoT, rejects the protest.

Before advising the coach accordingly, the Referee needs to complete and note the decision on the Protest Form. It is recommended that the Referee's reply be brief and to the point. For example, the Referee could note -

"After reviewing all the information relating to the disqualification, I have not found any grounds to alter my decision as I believe that it is a decision of fact. I therefore dismiss the protest."

### June Question

The Coach is not happy with the Referee's decision and wishes to appeal the rejection to the Jury of Appeal. Who establishes the Jury of Appeal, who composes the Jury and generally, how is the Jury run?
