INTRODUCTION

These swimming rules shall apply to all events conducted by Swimming NSW (SNSW) and meets conducted by affiliated Clubs and Areas.

NOTE: The alpha notation after an SW rule number indicates a modification to a World Aquatics or World Para Swimming rule.

GENERAL RULES

GR1 THE POOL

GR1.1 Standards for World Aquatics (WA) Olympic Pools are found on the World Aquatics website, www.worldaquatics.com under Competition Regulations.

GR1.2 For Championships of New South Wales the Board may approve a venue pool of a lesser standard than stated in GR1.1, PROVIDED THAT, the length is not less than 50 metres for Long Course Championships and not less than 25 metres for Short Course Championships prescribed in GR10.

GR1.3 An unenclosed pool is one which permits the ingress and egress of the water. For events conducted in these pools the height of the starting platform shall not exceed 1.5 metres nor be less than 0.3 metres.

GR1.4 As a minimum, all swimming activities including competition events and training conducted by a Member Association must be conducted in accordance with current local government regulation.

GR2 GENERAL CHAMPIONSHIP POOL

GR2.1 A Member Association shall not conduct a championship event, having a title or limitation of persons qualified to compete, without the consent of the Board unless:

GR2.1.1 The event is a championship of a Member Association which is confined to its members and the name of which is confined to the name of the Member Association; or

GR2.1.2 The event is a championship bearing the name of an area other than the words 'New South Wales' or 'State' and is controlled by a Member Association having sole jurisdiction in the whole of the territory covered by that area.

GR3 CHAMPIONSHIP CONDITIONS OF ENTRY

- GR3.1 All New South Wales Championships shall be conducted in pools which comply with the conditions prescribed by the Swimming Rules for the establishment of New South Wales Records. The Board may approve qualifying times for entry to championship events and other conditions of entry as appropriate to the meet.
- GR3.2 All entrants in a New South Wales Championship shall abide by and be subject to the Swimming New South Wales General Rules, Swimming Rules, Open Water Swimming Rules, By-Laws, Policies, and published procedures
- GR3.3 All entrants in a New South Wales Championship (or if under the age of 18 years their parent or guardian) shall declare themselves fit to compete. If an entrant experiences a medical issue whilst competing at, or during a New South Wales Championship, the entrant will be required to provide a medical clearance from a healthcare professional before being allowed to resume competition at that Championship. The Meet Director/Technical Manager will have the sole authority to adjudicate this rule.

GR4 DOPING CONTROL

- GR4.1 Sport Integrity Australia (SIA) is the authority to conduct Random Drug Testing on a selected number of swimmers in events at specific Company Meets. Such authority shall observe the pertinent provisions as necessary of the Doping Control Rules of WA.

The sanctions provided by the WA Doping Control Rules if a swimmer is found to have a positive result implying the use of a banned substance are specific and mandatory.

- NOTE: SIA has been established by the Australian Sports Commission in conjunction with the Australian Olympic Committee (AOC) to monitor the use of Drugs in Sport in accordance with the requirements of the International Olympic Committee. SIA has the authority to test athletes at random during training or competition and report any positive test results to the AOC and SA.

GR5 CHAMPIONSHIP ENTRANT REQUIREMENTS

- GR5.1 Swimming New South Wales Open and Age Championships are open to the following:
 - GR5.1.1 Swimmers who are registered as a Full Swimmer member with a Swimming New South Wales Club and meet the entry qualifying time for the event.

- GR5.1.2 Non-Australian citizens who are not members of another federation affiliated to WA who are registered as a Full Swimmer member with a Swimming New South Wales Club and meet the entry qualifying time for the event.
- GR5.1.3 Swimmers who are registered with another State's swimming organisation and meet the entry qualifying time for the event as a visitor.
- GR5.1.4 Members of other Federations affiliated to WA who meet the entry qualifying time for the event as a visitor, provided they hold a valid clearance from their Federation.
- GR5.1.5 Swimmers with an impairment who hold a current National or International Classification according to the Classification Database held by SA, in line with eligibility requirements outlined in the SA and WPS Classification Policy and Procedures for classes 1-10 (FCS), 11-13 (Vision Impairment), 14 (Intellectual Impairment), 15 (Hearing Impairment), 16 (Transplant), S17 (Dyspraxia), S18 (Other including Down Syndrome) and S19 (High Functioning Autism).
- GR5.1.6 A swimmer representing a State or a Club affiliated to a State swimming organisation shall be registered with that State or Club prior to the closing date for entries for the championship being entered.
- GR5.1.7 A swimmer who is a member of another Federation affiliated to WA shall not be eligible to represent a Club or score points for a Club.
- GR5.2 In Swimming New South Wales Age Championships not more than two (2) visitors shall be permitted to contest the final or the fastest heat of a Timed Final unless there are insufficient New South Wales swimmers to fill all the lanes.
- GR5.3 Country Championships. Except as decided by the Board, only a full swimmer primary member of a Club in the following Areas shall be eligible to compete in the Swimming New South Wales Country Championships. Australian Capital Territory, Coast and Valley, Mountains and Plains, New England & North West, North Coast, South Eastern, Southern Inland and Western.
- GR5.4 Metropolitan Championships. Except as decided by the Board, only a full swimmer primary member of a Club in the following Areas shall be eligible to compete in the Swimming New South Wales Metropolitan Championships. Metro North East, Metro North West, Metro South East and Metro South West.
- GR5.5 Notwithstanding the provision of GR5.1, when a team of visiting overseas swimmers, being members of a body affiliated to WA which has been specifically

invited by the Company to tour New South Wales, the Board shall be authorised to permit members of such team to contest championships detailed in GR5.3 and GR5.4.

GR5.6 OPEN WATER SWIMMING CHAMPIONSHIPS

In the case of two or more Open Water Swimming Open or Age Championships being conducted concurrently a swimmer shall not be permitted to enter more than one event and all swimmers shall have attained the age of 11 Years for distances up to and including 2,500 metres, 12 years for distances up to and including 5,000 metres, 13 years for distances up to and including 10,000 metres and 14 years for distances over 10.000 metres on the day of the conduct of the event.

GR6 CHAMPIONSHIP ENTRY FORM, AGE DETERMINATION

GR6.1 New South Wales Championship entry and age determination shall require:

GR6.1.1 An entry for a New South Wales Championship event shall be made at the direction of the Company either electronically or manually on the official Company entry form which shall include the entrant's entry time for the distance, in accordance with the conditions of entry, showing the meet, date and online results link for when the time was established, being equal to or better than the qualifying time approved for this event, and in the case of an Age event, date of birth together with the entry fee.

GR6.2 An entrant in an Age Championship shall be of the specific age on the first day of the meet series, PROVIDED THAT, such meet shall not exceed a period of sixteen (16) days and, if the Board so desires, shall produce a certificate of registration of birth or other satisfactory evidence of date of birth signed by the parent of guardian of the entrant.

GR7 QUALIFYING TIMES

GR7.1 Swimming NSW may adopt an entry qualifying time for each distance and style for all NSW Championships. Advice of the approved qualifying times shall be published by the 1st of April and the 1st of October for the Winter and Summer Seasons, respectively.

GR7.2 Qualifying times must be achieved at a properly approved or sanctioned meet, refer GR 16.

NOTE: Qualifying times achieved at meets conducted by school and other kindred associations must conform to the current Swimming NSW School Swim Meet policy.

GR7.3 The Officials for an approved meet shall include both an accredited SA Referee and an accredited or approved Starter as a minimum requirement.

GR7.4 When qualifying for State Long Course Championships swimmers can use either a long course or short course qualifying time. However, if entering a short course time their entry time will be equal to the qualifying time for that event. This is subject to the discretion of Swimming NSW and will be advertised prior to the meet.

GR7.5 When qualifying for State Short Course Championships swimmers can use a long course or short course qualifying time.

GR7.6 Any swimmer who fails to achieve the qualifying time for the event entered is subject to review and may be sanctioned by the Board.

GR8 CHAMPIONSHIP ENTRY FEE

GR8.1 The Board Shall set an entry fee for the following:

Individual Events

Team Relay Events

Open Water Swimming Events; and

Such fees shall be advertised to members by Swimming NSW.

NOTE: Entrants in an Open Water Swimming Championship shall be required to pay the member Annual Registration fee before the first Open Water Swimming Event entered in the current Company year as provided in By Law 6.

GR9 NEW SOUTH WALES OPEN AND AGE CHAMPIONSHIPS AND OTHER SWIM MEETS

GR9.1 The Board shall determine the order of events and the duration of the Championships, and such other swim meets as it determines from time to time, giving as much notice as possible to members. The Board shall also determine annually the format for the conduct of the Open and Age Championships Meet for the ensuing summer season. PROVIDED THAT, the format so determined shall be advertised at the time of calling entries for the Meet.

NSW CHAMPIONSHIP PROCEDURES:

GR9.1.1 MARSHALLING PROCEDURE:

For Heats, Semi-Finals & Finals, swimmers shall report to the Call Room Supervisor at a time determined by the event management. A swimmer failing to do so shall be deemed to be withdrawn. Once reported, a swimmer is not permitted to leave the marshalling area unless approval is first obtained from the Call Room Supervisor. All heats of each event shall be deemed to be one event for the purpose of this Rule.

When Self-Marshalling procedures are to be employed, the procedures will be detailed in the meet program. Swimmers are personally responsible for being at the starting platform at the time determined by the event management.

GR9.1.2 WITHDRAWAL PROCEDURE:

HEATS

A swimmer, who fails to report to the Call Room Supervisor by the specified time (see GR9.1.1), or, who having reported and subsequently leaves the marshalling area for any reason without the permission of the Call Room Supervisor, may be deemed a withdrawal.

For Self-Marshalling heats, the meet procedures will indicate if swimmers are required to advise the Call Room Supervisor of their withdrawal from events.

FINALIST AND RESERVES

GR9.1.2.1 In all SNSW swimming events, finalists and reserves (there shall be only two reserves listed) wishing to withdraw from an A or B final shall do so in writing. This must be signed by the swimmer or their representative within 30 minutes of the results being posted following the event in which the qualification took place.

Following this, the finalist list for the A final will comprise of the top 10 (or 8 in an 8 lane pool) fastest swimmers and then the B final will comprise of the next 10 (or 8 in an 8 lane pool) fastest swimmers (no reserves will be listed).

GR9.1.2.2 A swimmer or relay team not having withdrawn as provided in GR9.1.2.1 and who does not compete in the event, shall be deemed a late withdrawal except where there are medical reasons or proven hardship and the swimmer or relay team's Club shall be fined the sum of \$100.00. The Board shall determine the acceptability of all matters where medical reasons or hardships are claimed and its determination shall be final.

GR9.1.3 RELAY EVENTS

In relay events, the names of the swimmers and the order they are to swim shall be submitted via the online entry system prior to the closing date.

Any alterations to originally submitted relay teams and the addition of reserves, must be submitted in writing to the Control Room Supervisor, Chief Recorder or delegate prior to the commencement of the session at which the relays are to be swum.

For clubs who enter multiple teams in an event, all swimmers listed in these relay teams are automatically considered as reserves for all teams nominated by that club for that club relay event.

If a reserve swimmer is to swim in a relay team, written notification must be submitted in writing to the Control Room Supervisor, Chief Recorder or delegate prior to the commencement of the session at which the relays are to be swum.

In Club relays a maximum of one (1) swimmer from a younger age group may participate. A swimmer may only appear in one (1) relay team list for that event.

A club may enter as many teams as they wish in each Club Relay event, however if they enter three (3) or more teams into an event, all teams must meet the Qualifying Times for that event.

Only two (2) teams per Club per event can win medals and score points.

NOTE: At the NSW Senior State Age Championships, in club relays a maximum of one (1) swimmer from a younger age group may participate, however at these championships only male and female athletes who are aged 12 years or older are allowed to compete.

GR10 NEW SOUTH WALES SWIMMING CHAMPIONSHIPS

GR10.1 Swimming New South Wales shall each year conduct:

GR10.1.1 Long course and short course NSW Swimming Championships, NSW Country Swimming Championships and NSW Metropolitan Swimming Championships, long course NSW Multi-Class Championships and

GR10.1.2 NSW Open Water Championships and such exhibition and/or non championship events for both Open and Age group swimming for both male and female swimmers, selected from the table below and as may be determined by the Board from time to time.

GR10.2 Multi Class Competition

GR10.2.1 NSW Championships events for para-swimmers shall be conducted in Multi Class (MC) format. Swimmers must hold an eligible classification as described in GR5.1.5.

GR10.2.2 A swimmer with an impairment may require assistance from support staff. Support staff is any person designated to assist a swimmer as defined in the Swimming NSW Para Swimming Rules

NOTE: The order of events and the duration of the championships shall be determined by the Company which shall give as much notice as possible of such determination to Members.

Age Championship events shall be restricted to swimmers who are the specified age on the first day of the meet as defined in GR6.

Except as decided by the Board, only a full swimmer primary member of a Club in an Area as defined in GR5.3 shall be eligible to compete in Swimming New South Wales Country Championships.

Except as decided by the Board, only a full swimmer primary member of a Club in an Area as defined in GR5.4 shall be eligible to compete in the Swimming New South Wales Metropolitan Championships.

The procedure for the conduct of the New South Wales Open Water Swimming Championship events shall, where possible, be in accordance with the World Aquatics Open Water Swimming Rules.

In the case of two or more Open Water Swimming Open or Age Championships being conducted concurrently a swimmer shall not be permitted to enter more than one event and all swimmers shall have attained the age of 11 Years for distances up to and including 2,500 metres, 12 years for distances up to and including 5,000 metres, 13 years for distances up to and including 10,000 metres and 14 years for distances over 10,000 metres on the day of the conduct of the event .

Swimming New South Wales shall recognise Records established for the individual and team events being swum in the Open and Age Championships as listed in GR10 excluding Open Water Swimming as there are no records within this discipline.

GR11 CHAMPIONSHIP AWARDS

GR11.1 A swimmer placed first, second or third in the final or timed final of New South Wales Open Championships, both long and short course, shall be awarded a medal, PROVIDED THAT;

GR11.2 In a Teams Championship the awards shall be made to the members of the teams placed first, second and third. Awards will only be awarded to the swimmers who contest the final of that event;

GR11.3 The first three (3) Swimming New South Wales registered swimmers or teams in a New South Wales Age Championship final or timed final shall be awarded a medal, however a similar placed swimmer who is not a Company member shall be awarded an appropriate medal; and

GR11.4 In all New South Wales Championships a finalist ribbon or other appropriate award will be awarded to those swimmers in an individual event other than medallists who are placed in the final or to those swimmers placed in a timed final being equal to the number of lanes of the pool used for the championships.

GR11.5 PRESIDENT'S AWARD

Awarded to the respective Swimming New South Wales registered male and female swimmer in the Open Championship achieving the highest point score, using the World Aquatics rankings, in an individual event.

GR11.6 The Ion King Trophy will be awarded to the respective Swimming New South Wales Country registered male and female swimmer in the Country Long Course and

Short Course Championships achieving the highest percentage against the State Age or Open record for that individual event.

GR11.7 GREGSON AWARD

Awarded to the respective Swimming New South Wales registered male and female multi-class swimmer in the Senior State Age Championships achieving the highest Mult Class Point Score (MCPS) throughout the duration of the meet.

GR12 CHAMPIONSHIP POINTSCORES

GR12.1 POINTSCORE GENERAL:

GR12.1.1 In each case points shall be awarded in order of placing, in accordance with the following:

GR12.1.1.1 for Finals the placings shown in the table in GR12.1.1.3 shall include Timed Finals for individual and relay events for the first number of placings being equal to the number of lanes, not exceeding ten (10) of the pool used for the conduct of the Championship Meet, or

GR12.1.1.2 for Open Water Swimming Championships the placings shown in the table in GR12.1.1.3 shall be for the first ten (10) places,

GR12.1.1.3 the points shown in the following table shall be for the first ten (10) places:

1 st place	35 points	6 th place	17 points
2 nd place	30 points	7 th place	14 points
3 rd place	26 points	8 th place	11 points
4 th place	23 points	9 th place	8 points
5 th place	20 points	10 th place	5 points

GR12.1.1.4 Where two (2) or more individual swimmers or relay teams are accorded the same placing, the appropriate points shall be allocated for that placing and the next one or more respective numerical placings shall be deleted accordingly.

GR12.1.1.5 Where a swimmer/team is disqualified or does not achieve the entry qualifying time for the event, points shall not be awarded. However, medals shall still be awarded to swimmers who place, despite not achieving the qualifying time.

GR12.2 STATE OPEN CHAMPIONSHIPS

GR12.2.1 Swimmers with impairment point score will be compiled for Multi Class events only for which all clubs, NSW and visiting, shall be eligible to receive points.

- GR12.2.2 A point score for able bodied swimmers will be compiled for able bodied events only for which all clubs, NSW and visiting, shall be eligible to receive points.
- GR12.2.3 A point score combining both GR12.2.1 and GR12.2.2 will be compiled for the Championship and the winning Club of this point score shall receive the State Open Championship Point Score Award. The second and third placed Clubs shall receive an appropriate Award.
- GR12.2.4 A point score will be compiled for Swimming NSW Clubs only, encompassing both swimmers with impairment and able bodied swimmers. Points will only be awarded to full swimmer primary members and NSW swimmers who finish in the top twenty (20) swimmers overall in a particular event. The points from this point score will contribute to the Swimming NSW Top 10 Annual Club Point Score.
- GR12.3 STATE OPEN WATER POINTSCORE
- GR12.3.1 A point score will be compiled for Swimming NSW Clubs only, encompassing the 5km, 7.5km and 10km events at both the State Open and State Age Open Water Championships.
- GR12.3.2 The winning Club of this point score shall receive the State Open Water Championship Point Score Award. The second and third placed Clubs shall receive an appropriate Award.
- GR12.3.3. The points from this point score will contribute to the Swimming NSW Top 10 Annual Club Point Score.
- GR12.4 STATE AGE CHAMPIONSHIPS
- GR12.4.1 A point score will be compiled for the Junior State Age Championships.
- GR12.4.1.1 The winning Club shall receive the Junior State Age Championship Point Score Award. The second and third placed Clubs shall receive an appropriate Award.
- GR12.4.2 A point score will be compiled for the Senior State Age Championships.
- GR12.4.2.1 The winning Club shall receive the Senior State Age Championship Point Score Award. The second and third placed Clubs shall receive an appropriate Award.
- GR12.4.3 A point score combining both GR12.4.1 and GR12.4.2 shall be compiled and the winning Club shall receive the State Age Championship Point Score Award. The second and third placed Clubs shall receive an appropriate Award.
- GR12.4.4 The point score from GR12.4.3 shall contribute to the Swimming NSW Top 10 Annual Club Point Score.

- GR12.5 STATE AGE WINTER SHORT COURSE CHAMPIONSHIPS
- GR12.5.1 A point score will be compiled for the 10 & Under – 12 Years State Age Winter Short Course Championships.
- GR12.5.1.1 The winning Club of this point score shall receive the 10 & Under – 12 Years State Age Winter Short Course Championship Point Score Award. The second and third placed Clubs shall receive an appropriate Award.
- GR12.5.2 A point score will be compiled for the 13 & Over Years State Age Winter Short Course Championships.
- GR12.5.2.1 The winning Club shall receive the 13 & Over Years State Age Winter Short Course Championship Point Score Award. The second and third placed Clubs shall receive an appropriate Award.
- GR12.5.3 A point score combining both GR12.5.1 and GR12.5.2 shall be compiled and the winning Club shall receive the State Winter Short Course Championship Point Score Award. The second and third placed Clubs shall receive an appropriate Award.
- GR12.5.4 The point score from GR12.5.3 shall contribute to the Swimming NSW Top 10 Annual Club Point Score.
- GR12.6 TOP 10 ANNUAL CLUB POINT SCORE
- GR12.6.1 On an annual basis Swimming NSW shall present an appropriate award to the Top 10 Clubs who have accumulated the most points from the point scores encompassed within GR12.2.4, GR12.3.3, GR12.4.4 and GR12.5.4.
- GR12.7 SWIMMING NEW SOUTH WALES METROPOLITAN CHAMPIONSHIP
- GR12.7.1 Points shall be allocated in order of placing of primary members of Clubs in the New South Wales Metropolitan Championships, (see GR10) in each of the following separate Point Score Premierships:
- GR12.7.1.1 The Open and Age Individual Swimming Championships; and,
- GR12.7.1.2 The Open and Age Individual Winter Swimming Championships
- GR12.7.2 In each case points shall be awarded in order of placing in accordance with GR12.1.1 as applicable to this Point Score.
- GR12.7.3 The winning Club of each Point Score shall receive the Joseph M. Harrison Trophy and the title Swimming New South Wales Metropolitan Point Score Champions,

second and third placed Clubs of each of the Point Scores shall receive an appropriate award.

GR12.8 SWIMMING NEW SOUTH WALES COUNTRY CHAMPIONSHIPS

GR12.8.1 Points shall be allocated in the order of placing of primary members of Clubs in all Swimming New South Wales Country Championships (see GR10) events in each of the following Point Score Championships:

GR12.8.1.1 The Open and Age Individual Swimming Championship Point Score for Men and the winning Club shall receive the W. J. Payne Shield to be held for one (1) year and Swimming New South Wales Men's Country Point Score Champions.

GR12.8.1.2 The Open and Age Individual Swimming Championship Point Score for Women and the winning Club shall receive the W. J. Payne Shield to be held for one (1) year and Swimming New South Wales Women's Country Point Score Champions.

GR12.8.1.3 The Open and Age Individual Swimming Championship Point Score for Men and Women and the winning Club shall receive the Roger F. Pegram Trophy to be held for one (1) year and Swimming New South Wales Country Championships Point Score Champions Title, and

GR12.8.1.4 The Open and Age Individual Winter Swimming Championships point score for Men and Women and the winning Club shall receive the Nancy Dixon Trophy being the Country Championship Award to be held for one (1) year and the Title of Swimming New South Wales Winter Country Championship Point Score Champion.

GR13 EMERGENCY POWERS

Under special circumstances the Board may:

GR13.1 Cancel or suspend all or any Championships as set out in GR10; and

GR13.2 Suspend GR11 and approve other awards for events and places in lieu of medals.

GR14 SWIMMERS INELIGIBLE TO COMPETE

GR14.1 Events for swimmers ineligible to compete according to By Law 34 shall not be conducted at the same meet without permission of the Board.

GR15 AREA AUTHORITY

An Area shall have authority to:

GR15.1 Grant permission for the Clubs within its territory to promote and control interclub swim meets, PROVIDED THAT:

Approval will not be granted where the proposed date of the meet is on the same date as a SA or Company conducted meet HOWEVER if the proposed meet is limited to only age groups that are not eligible for the Company meet then Areas are able to approve such meet i.e. a meet for 12 & under can be held on the same date as Senior State Age or a meet for 13 & over can be held on the same date as Junior State Age.

NOTWITHSTANDING the preceding provisions of this General Rule, the Board may at its discretion approve the conduct of a meet deemed to be in conflict with a Company conducted Championship Meet (see By Law 30).

NOTE: Championship Meets are any of the following meets conducted by the Company.

Metropolitan Championships; LC and SC
Country Championships; LC and SC
Junior State Age LC
Senior State Age LC
State Age 9 – 12 Years SC
State Age 12 & Over SC
State Open; LC
State Age and Open, Open Water
Sydney Open

Clubs that are not eligible to compete at the relevant Country or Metropolitan Championships may conduct a meet on the same date as these meets.

GR16 APPROVED MEETS, FORWARDING OF RESULTS

AREA APPROVAL

GR16.1 An Area shall be authorised to approve the conduct of a Meet for the purpose of the establishment of qualifying standards by a Club in accordance with current SA and Company Policy. The Area or Club shall forward or cause to be forwarded to the Company results of Area or Club Meets within seven (7) days of the meet being held (for the avoidance of doubt, this is a period of 168 hours, commencing from 12am on the day following the conclusion of the meet) or by the closing date for entries for the Championship Event, whichever is first in time, or as required by the Board.

SWIMMING NEW SOUTH WALES APPROVAL

GR16.2 Results from Board approved swim meets, school meets and/or kindred association meets must be submitted in accordance with the requirements of GR16.1.

GR17 INTER CLUB EVENTS

An open inter club event is one available to more than one (1) Club, the entrants from each Club shall be registered members of the Club, PROVIDED THAT:

GR17.1 Such members shall not compete with those who are not members of the Company except as may be approved by the Board, or members who are ineligible to compete according to By Law 34;

GR17.2 An entrant in age events shall be of the specified age on the first day of the meet series; and

GR17.3 The Board may in extenuating circumstances approve that the period stated in GR6.2. may be extended for a specific non championship age meet series.

GR17.4 In all open inter club Open Water Swimming events a swimmer, who has not attained thirteen years of age on the day of the event, is not permitted to contest distances of over five kilometres.

NOTE: An open inter club event in this context is one not closed or restricted by special conditions and open does not refer to age grouping (see By Law 25).

GR18 OFFICIALS FOR INDIVIDUAL ATTEMPTS ON RECORD

GR18.1 Subject to approval by the Board, officials for an individual attempt on a record at a meet promoted and controlled by the Company shall be appointed from the Swimming New South Wales Technical Officials by the Technical Swimming Committee.

GR19 GENERAL SWIMWEAR POLICY (WA GR7)

GR19.1 All swimwear must be WA approved.

GR19.1.1 The swimwear (swimsuit, cap and goggles) of all swimmers shall be in good moral taste and suitable for the individual sports discipline and are not to carry any symbol which may be considered offensive (WA GR7.1).

GR19.1.2 Subject to GR 19.1.5 and GR 19.1.6, in pool and open water swimming competitions the swimmer must wear only one swimsuit in one or two pieces. No

additional items, like arm bands or leg bands shall be regarded as parts of a swimsuit. For pool swimming competitions swimsuits for men shall not extend above the navel nor below the knee, and for women, shall not cover the neck, nor extend past the shoulder, nor below the knee. The swimsuits shall be made from textile materials.

- GR19.1.3 All swimsuits shall be non-transparent. It is permissible to wear two caps.
- GR19.1.4 Modification of swimsuits to accommodate a swimmer's impairment is permitted as per WPS10.15.2 provided that for Swimming NSW meets any such approval may be granted by the Technical Manager. Proposed modified swimsuits shall be presented to the Technical Manager prior to the swimmers first event at the competition for approval.
- GR19.1.5 Unless otherwise directed by Swimming NSW, swimmers may wear swimsuits that do not bear a valid WA approval label provided they satisfy the material requirements outlined in the current World Aquatics requirements for swimwear approval and meet the following criteria:
- i. Men's swimsuits are limited to one (1) suit that covers at most the body surface from hips to knee. Swimsuits may not extend above the waist or below the knees;
 - ii. Women's swimsuits are limited to one (1) suit in up to two (2) pieces that is of 'open back' and 'open shoulder' designs that may extend down to the knee; swimsuits must not extend below the knees;
 - iii. No zippers or other fastening devices are allowed except for a waist tie; and
 - iv. Swimsuits must be of textile material (i.e. permeable textile open mesh materials such as cotton, nylon, lycra and the like) with no application of surface treatment closing the open mesh structure.
- GR19.16 Notwithstanding any other clause in this by-law, swimsuits may be modified or alternative swimsuits may be worn to accommodate a swimmer's individual needs and preferences, including in respect of modesty, religious or cultural purposes, gender identity, physical impairment or in connection with any other protected attribute under federal or state anti-discrimination legislation provided any modification or proposed alternative swimsuit:
- a. complies with the Swimming Australia Inclusive Swimwear Policy; and
 - b. is approved by the Technical Manager prior to the swimmer's first event at the relevant competition.

GR19.1.7 The referee of a competition has the authority to exclude any swimmer whose swimsuit or body symbols do not comply with this rule.

NOTE: Australian Open and World Records can only be broken by wearing a WA approved swimsuit.

GR20 ADVERTISING

At Swimming NSW events, competing clubs and swimmers must observe the following regarding advertising on clothing and equipment.

GR20.1 SWIMSUITS IDENTIFICATION IN THE FORM OF

- a. One manufacturer's logo of a maximum size of 30 square centimetres when worn. Where one-piece bodysuits are used, two logos of the manufacturer shall be permitted, one above the waist and one below the waist of a maximum size of 30 square centimetres each when worn. These two logos of the manufacturer shall not be placed immediately adjacent to each other. Where two-piece body suits are used, the two logos of the manufacturer shall be placed on one piece each.
- b. The manufacturer's logo must be calculated taking into consideration the entire surface of the logo. One sponsor's logo/name/insignia of a maximum of 30 square centimetres when worn. Clubs and swimmers with commercial sponsorship opportunities that sit outside of the above points, should contact Swimming Australia for approval.
- c. The name and the logo of the Club/State of the swimmer shall not be regarded as advertisements.

GR20.2 CLUB/STATE CAPS

- a. One manufacturer's logo/name/insignia of a maximum of 20 square centimetres (when the cap is not being worn).
- b. One sponsor name/logo/insignia not exceeding 20 square centimetres.
- c. The name and the logo of the Club/State of the swimmer shall not be regarded as advertisements.

GR20.3 GOGGLES

Two manufacturer logos of a maximum size of 6 square centimetres each are allowed on goggles but only on the spectacle frame or band.

GR20.4 POOL DECK EQUIPMENT

All pool deck clothing, including those items listed below may carry two logos/names/insignia (one of the manufacturer and the other one of the sponsor) each with a maximum size of 40 square centimetres.

All accessories and equipment items listed below may carry two logos/names/insignia (one of the manufacturer and the other one of the sponsor) each with a maximum size of six square centimetres.

- a. T shirt, polo, casual shirt, jumper, tracksuit top, bathrobe, deck coat, pants, shorts and skirts – 40 square centimetres
- b. Towels, caps/hats, socks and footwear – six square centimetres
- c. Bags – not greater than 10% of the surface area of the item, to a maximum of 60 square centimetres.

For upper-body clothing items only, the manufacturer's logo being a design mark of maximum of eight centimetres in width may additionally be displayed in the form of a strip in one of the following positions: around the bottom of both sleeves or centered down the outer seam of both sleeves (from the collar across the top of the shoulders down to the bottom of the sleeve).

For lower-body clothing items only, the manufacturer's logo being a design mark of maximum of eight centimetres in width, may additionally be displayed in the form of a strip centered down the outer seam of both legs (from the waistband down to the bottom of the leg).

The name and the logo of the Club/State of the swimmer shall not be regarded as advertisements.

GR20.5 Body advertisement is forbidden.

GR20.6 Advertising for tobacco, vaping, gambling, or alcohol is not permitted.

GR20.7 This Rule does not apply to design advertising and trademarks of Swimming NSW or its commercial partners, or the design advertising and trademarks of the major sponsor of a member organisation, so long as this does not conflict with a partner of Swimming Australia.

For the avoidance of doubt, the manufacturer logo cannot be the same as the sponsor logo.

GR20.8 Any advertising logos/identifications which are not indicated in GR20 are not permitted. If any apparel contravenes these regulations, the club or swimmer will

be asked to remove the item/s and replace it with apparel that complies with these regulations. If a breach is unable to be remedied immediately, the club or swimmer will be provided with warning that further breaches may result in exclusion from future meets.

GR20.10 Swimming New South Wales reserves the right to request Clubs, Areas and Swimmers to present any apparel for inspection and approval prior to the commencement of the Championship (SA CBL25.9)

GR20.11 **PRODUCT TECHNOLOGY IDENTIFICATION**

Where one-piece body suits (swimsuits or wetsuits) are used in competition, two product technology identifications shall be permitted, one above the waist and one below the waist, of a maximum size of 10 square centimetres each when worn. However, these identifications shall not be placed immediately adjacent to each other, nor immediately adjacent to any manufacturer's logo. Where two-piece body suits are used, one product technology identification may be placed on each piece.

Other clothing: one additional identification allowed on clothing, limited to product technology identifications, with a maximum size of 10 square centimetres.

Product technology identifications means the technical identification (which shall not include any identification of the manufacturer, or any part thereof) used on clothing to identify any fabric technology.

GR21 ACCIDENTAL OMISSION BY AN OFFICIAL

GR21.1 The accidental omission by an official to perform their duties shall not prevent an event being properly conducted unless such omission has prejudiced the chances of any swimmer in a material way.

GR22 ERROR BY AN OFFICIAL

GR22.1 If an error by an official follows a fault by a swimmer, the fault by the swimmer may be expunged. If an official's call on deck leads to a review of an athlete's potential infraction, and it is deemed that the athlete made no error, the athlete will be cleared of the inquiry. Additionally, if an error by a competitor follows the fault of an official, the fault of the competitor shall be expunged.

GR23 JURY OF APPEAL AND PROTESTS

GR23.1 Protests are possible (WA GR13.1.1)

- a. if the rules are regulations for the conduct of the competition are not observed
- b. if other conditions endanger the competitions and/or swimmers; or
- c. against the decisions of the Referee. However, no protests shall be allowed against decisions of fact.

GR23.2 Protests must be submitted:

- a. to the Referee
- b. in writing by the responsible team leader or the swimmer, or a representative on behalf of the swimmer
- c. together with a deposit of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) and shall have been lodged within thirty (30) minutes following the conclusion of the respective event.

If conditions causing a potential protest are noted prior to the competition, a protest must be lodged before the signal to start is given.

GR23.3 All protests shall be considered by the Referee. If the Referee rejects the protest, the Referee must state the reasons for their decision. The protestor may appeal against the rejection to the Jury of Appeal within one (1) hour from the moment when the decision has been communicated. The decision taken by the Jury of Appeal shall be final.

GR23.4 If the protest is rejected by the Jury of Appeal the deposit will be forfeited to the management body of the competition. If the protest is upheld, the deposit will be returned.

GR23.5 In the event of a protest being upheld the prize shall be awarded according to any revised placings.

GR23.6 Where the subject of the protest cannot be resolved by the Jury of Appeal during the Meet series, the matter shall be referred to the Board for decision.

GR23.7 JURY OF APPEAL

GR23.7.1 For Swimming New South Wales Championships and other swim meets, the Jury of Appeal shall be composed of three technical officials as outlined within the Swimming NSW Protests and Jury of Appeal Policy. The Technical Manager may utilise a coach that is impartial to the decision to form part of the Jury.

The Referees' decision shall be afforded a significant degree of deference. The Jury of Appeal shall not substitute its view of the protest for that of the Referee unless the appellant presents clear evidence that the Referee's decision was made arbitrarily, irrationally, or in abuse of the discretion afforded to the Referee. The test shall be recognised as a high test for an appellant to overcome. The Chair of the Jury of Appeal may ask to call any affected party or expert to assist in the Jury's review.

The decision of the Jury is final.

GR24 PRIZES AND SOUVENIRS

GR24.1 A body offering a challenge prize subject to a guarantee for its return shall, if required, state explicitly to each entrant the exact nature of the guarantee required and where any difficulty arises in arranging the terms the decision of the committee of that body shall be accepted by all parties as final.

GR25 GAMBLING

GR25.1 Gambling shall not be allowed at a meet of a Member Association and it shall be the duty of every Member Association to take the best means in its power to enforce this Rule. Any Member Association failing to take prompt measures to suppress betting at its meets shall be liable to suspension for such times as the Board may deem necessary.

GR26 SMOKING AND ALCOHOL BANS

GR21.6 At all Company meets alcohol shall NOT be permitted during the meet in any area designated for swimmers, either prior to or during competitions.

GR26.2 At all Company meets smoking (including e-cigarettes) shall not be permitted in any enclosed or outdoor public areas as required under legislation.

SWIMMING RULES

World Aquatics (WA) Competition Regulations Part Two: Swimming Rules are incorporated in the following Swimming New South Wales Rules which are applicable at Swimming New South Wales Meets.

SW1 MEET CONTROL

SW1.1 A Meet Committee shall have jurisdiction over all matters NOT assigned by the Rules to the Referee, judges or other officials and shall have the power to postpone events and to give directions, consistent with the Rules, relating to the methods to be adopted for the conduct of any event which the Meet Committee may deem necessary, PROVIDED THAT:

SW1.1.1 Pool admission fees will, in no case, be returned nor expenses allowed to any swimmer in consequence of any postponement or alteration.

SW1.1.2 A Technical Manager shall be appointed by the Meet Committee as its representative in control of the meet

SW1.2 FOR SWIMMING NEW SOUTH WALES CONDUCTED MEETS

Organisers of swimming competitions shall appoint sufficient officials to ensure the fairness, integrity and safety of the competitors. (WA SW 1.2)

SW1.2.1 An accredited Referee shall be appointed by the Technical Swimming Committee; and

SW1.2.2 Accredited Swim Meet Officials specified in SW2.2 to SW2.15 inclusive and SW 2.17 shall be appointed by the Technical Swimming Committee and be responsible to the Referee of the Meet.

SW1.2.2.1 For all swimming events conducted by Swimming New South Wales, the following minimum number of Technical Officials is considered desirable for the control of the competitions:

Starters	2
Chief Timekeeper	1

Timekeepers (3 per lane)	30
Reserve Timekeepers	2
Chief Inspectors of Turns (one at each end of the pool)	2
Inspectors of Turns (one at each end of each lane)	20
Control Room Supervisor	1
Recorders	2
AOE Operators	2
Computer Operators	2
Call Room Supervisors	4
Check Starters	3
Presentation Officers	2
Announcer	1

SW1.2.2.2 A Chief Finish Judge and Finish Judges may be used when Automatic Equipment and/or three timekeepers per lane with digital watches are not used.

Chief Finish Judge (only when necessary) ... 1

Finish Judges (only when necessary) ... 2 to 4

SW1.3 Where underwater video equipment is used by television, the equipment must be operated by remote control and shall not obstruct the vision or path of the swimmers and must not change the configuration of the pool or obscure the required WA markings. (WA SW1.4)

SW1.4 The event management shall specify for heats, semi-final and finals the presentation and preparation protocol that the competitors must respect when they leave the final call-room. (WA SW1.5)

SW2 SWIM MEETS OFFICIALS, THEIR CONTROL, DUTIES AND POWERS

GENERAL COMMENTS ON RULE SW2.

SW2 defines the technical duties officials are required to perform. However, there are some general requirements which are applicable to all officials and these are detailed for information.

Para swimmers competing in Multi Class events must provide their Classification and exceptions with their entries.

Para swimmers may compete in non Multi Class events at Company meets. Where para swimmers compete in non Multi Class events, they must comply with all entry requirements, including the qualifying time. The swimmer shall have Full Swimmer membership with an affiliated Club and registered by SA as an athlete classified with an impairment.

Referees and appropriate Technical Officials should be given a list of athletes classified with an impairment which includes their classification and exemptions. The Referee should use the Para Swimming Rules for swimmers with impairments competing in Company meets.

- SW2.1 A REFEREE shall be appointed and:
 - SW2.1.1 Have full control and authority over all officials, approve their assignments and instruct them regarding all special features or regulations relating to the competition. They shall enforce all the Rules and decisions of the Company and shall decide all questions relating to the actual conduct of the meet and event or competition, the final settlement of which is not otherwise covered by the Rules. (WA SW2.1.1)
 - SW2.1.2 May intervene in the competition at any stage to ensure that the Company regulations and rules are observed, shall adjudicate all protests related to the competition in progress. (WA SW2.1.2)
 - SW2.1.3 When using Finish Judges without three (3) digital watches, the Referee shall determine placings where necessary. Automatic Officiating Equipment, if available and operating, shall be consulted, as stated in SW13. (WA SW2.1.3)
 - SW2.1.4 Ensure that all necessary officials are in their respective posts for the conduct of the competition. They may appoint substitutes for any who are absent, incapable of acting or found to be inefficient. They may appoint additional officials if considered necessary.
 - SW2.1.5 Once all swimmers have removed their clothing, except for swimwear, the Referee shall signal the commencement of an event by a short series of whistles inviting them to get ready at the starting end, followed by a long whistle

indicating that they should take their positions on the starting platform, or for backstroke swimming and medley relays to immediately enter the water. A second long whistle shall bring the backstroke and medley relay swimmer immediately to the starting position. When swimmers and officials are prepared for the start, the Referee shall gesture to the Starter with a stretched out arm, indicating that the swimmers are under the Starters control. The stretched out arm shall stay in that position until the start is given. (WA SW2.1.5)

NOTE: Where the circumstances warrant, the short series of whistles may be omitted.

SW2.1.6 A disqualification for initiating the start before the starting signal must be observed and confirmed by both the Starter and the Referee. When Automatic Officiating Equipment is available, it may be used to verify the disqualification. (WA SW2.1.6)

SW2.1.7 Shall disqualify any swimmer for any other violation of the rules that they personally observe. The Referee may also disqualify any swimmer for any violation reported to them by other authorised officials. All disqualifications are subject to the decision of the Referee. (WA SW2.1.7)

SW2.1.8 All potential infractions shall be verbally reported to the Referee. Once confirmed by the Referee, a signed disqualification card or electronic equivalent, shall be completed by the reporting official detailing the event, lane number and the infraction. (WA SW2.1.9)

SW2.1.10 Have the power to disqualify any swimmer whose action during the conduct of an event in the opinion of the Referee is contrary to the good conduct of the meet.

SW2.1.11 Have authority to commence a race prior to swimmers in the previous race leaving the water.

SW2.1.12 Should the Finish Judges not be able to determine a result, add their placings to clarify the placings within the area of disagreement so that the result may be determined.

SW2.1.13 Have authority to use any judging or timing devices approved by Swimming New South Wales.

- SW2.1.14 Determine the result when a judging device is in use.
- SW2.1.15 Cause the Control Room Supervisor or Chief Recorder to be advised of any disqualification of a swimmer.
- SW2.1.16 Where possible advise promptly any swimmer so disqualified of the reason; and
- SW2.1.17 Signal swimmers to leave the water.
- SW2.2 A CONTROL ROOM SUPERVISOR shall be appointed to operate under the direction of the referee and shall. (SA SW2.2)
- SW2.2.1 Supervise the operation of the automatic officiating equipment including the review of backup timing equipment. (WA SW2.2.1)
- SW2.2.2 Be responsible for checking the results from the computer printouts. (WASW2.2.2)
- SW2.2.3 Be responsible for checking the relay exchange printout and reporting any early take-offs to the Referee. (WA SW2.2.3)
- SW2.2.4 May review the video timing to confirm early take-off; and (WA SW2.2.4)
- SW2.2.5 Receive, from the Referee, notification of any disqualifications, and shall cause these to be recorded in the official results.
- SW2.3 A STARTER shall be appointed and shall:
- SW2.3.1 Have full control of the swimmers from the time the Referee turns the swimmers over to the Starter (SW2.1.11) until the race has commenced. The start shall be given in accordance with SW4. (WA SW2.3.1)
- SW2.3.2 Report a swimmer to the Referee for delaying the start, for willfully disobeying an order or for any other misconduct taking place at the start, but only the Referee may disqualify a swimmer for such delay, willful disobedience or misconduct. (WA SW2.3.3)
- SW2.3.3 Have power to decide whether the start is fair, subject only to the decision of the Referee. (WA SW2.3.3)

- SW2.3.4 When starting an event, the Starter shall stand on the side of the pool within approximately five (5) metres of the starting edge of the pool where the Timekeepers can see and or hear the starting signal and the swimmers can hear the signal; and (WA SW2.3.4)
- SW2.3.5 Shall report to the Referee any violation observed within their jurisdiction. (WA SW2.3.5)
- SW2.4 A CALL ROOM SUPERVISOR shall be appointed and shall:
- SW2.4.1 Assemble swimmers prior to each event and ensure swimmers are reporting for the correct event. When Self-Marshalling procedures are required, direct swimmers to take up their positions on pool deck. (WA SW2.4.1)
- SW2.4.2 Report to the Referee any violation noted regarding swimwear and advertising (GR19 and GR20). (WA SW2.4.2)
- SW2.4.3 Mark off each swimmer as they report on the event sheet and ensure that once reported they do not leave the call room without prior permission.
- SW2.4.4 Before closing an event, ensure the missing swimmer's names are called three times and mark the event sheet accordingly.
- SW2.4.5 Cross out each swimmer who reports as a non-starter or is reported as a non-starter or who has not reported by the closing time of the event
- SW2.4.6 Note the closing time of the event on the event sheet.
- SW2.4.7 After an event is closed, pass the swimmers to the Check Starters with the marked up event sheet
- SW2.4.8 If an amalgamation or reseed is possible within an event, consult the Technical Manager and the Referee for a decision. If the Referee decides to amalgamate or reseed an event, advise the Control Room Supervisor or Chief Recorder.
- SW2.4.9 Refer to the Referee any swimmer who reports to marshalling after an event has closed for a decision about whether they may start in the event.
- SW2.4.10 Notify the Referee of any finalist or reserve who fails to report for a final.

- SW2.4.11 Maintain order in the call room area at all times.
- SW2.4.12 CHECK STARTERS shall be appointed and shall:
- SW2.4.12.1 Receive swimmers, together with the marked up event sheet, from the Call Room Supervisor.
- SW2.4.12.2 Place swimmers in their respective starting positions for the event or when Self Marshalling procedures are required, direct swimmers to take up their positions behind the starting platforms.
- SW2.4.12.3 Signal the Referee when all is in readiness; and
- SW2.4.12.4 Maintain general supervision to ensure the costumes of all swimmers are in accordance with the Rules and report any breach of these Rules immediately to the Referee, PROVIDED THAT, for Swimming New South Wales controlled Meets, the Meet Committee may, if considered expedient, delete any or all of the above duties SW2.4.12.1 and SW2.4.12.4.
- SW2.5 A CHIEF INSPECTOR OF TURNS shall be appointed to each end of the pool and shall:
- SW2.5.1 Ensure that Inspectors of Turns fulfil their duties during the competition. (WA SW2.5.1)
- SW2.6 One INSPECTOR OF TURNS shall be assigned to each lane at each end of the pool and shall:
- SW2.6.1 Ensure that swimmers comply with the relevant rules after the start, for each turn and at the finish.
- SW2.6.2 Jurisdiction for Inspector of Turns at the start end commences from the start signal until the completion of the first arm stroke, except in Breaststroke where it shall be the second arm stroke. (WA SW2.6.2)
- SW2.6.3 For each turn, jurisdiction for Inspector of Turns commences from the beginning of the last arm stroke before touching and ending with the completion of the first arm stroke after the turn, except in Breaststroke where it shall be the second arm stroke. (WA SW2.6.3)

- SW2.6.4 Jurisdiction for Inspector of Turns at the finish commences from the beginning of the last arm stroke before touching. (WA SW2.6.4)
- SW2.6.5 When a Backstroke ledge is being used, each Inspector of Turn or their delegated official at the starting end shall install and remove the ledge. (WA SW2.6.5)
- Once installed, the ledge shall be set at zero (0).
- SW2.6.6 In individual events of 800 and 1500 metres, an Inspector of Turns at the start or turning end of the pool shall record the number of laps completed by the swimmer in their lane and keep the swimmer informed of the remaining number of laps to be completed by displaying "lap cards". Electronic equipment may be used, including underwater display; and (WA SW2.6.6)
- SW2.6.7 Each Inspector of Turns at the starting end shall give a warning signal when the swimmer in his lane has two lengths plus five (5) metres to swim to finish in individual events of 800 and 1500 metres. The signal may be repeated after the turn until the swimmer has reached the five (5) metres mark on the lane rope. The warning signal may be by a whistle or bell. (WA SW2.6.7)
- SW2.6.8 Each Inspector of Turns at the starting end shall determine, in relay events, whether the starting swimmer is in contact with the starting platform when the preceding swimmer touches the starting wall. When Automatic Equipment which judges relay take offs is available, it shall be used in accordance with SW13.1. (WA SW2.6.8)
- SW2.6.9 Inspectors of Turns shall report to the Referee any violation within their jurisdiction. (WA SW2.6.9)
- SW2.7 JUDGES OF STROKE shall be appointed and shall:
- SW2.7.1 Be located on each side of the pool. (WA SW2.7.1)
- SW2.7.2 Ensure that the rules relating to the style of swimming designated for the event are being observed and shall observe the turns and the finishes to assist the Inspectors of Turns; and (WA SW2.7.2)
- SW2.7.3 Report to the Referee any violation within their jurisdiction (WA SW2.7.3)
- SW2.8 A CHIEF TIMEKEEPER shall be appointed and shall;

- SW2.8.1 Assign the seating positions for all Timekeepers and the lanes for which they are responsible. It is advisable that there shall be three (3) Timekeepers for each lane. If Automatic Officiating Equipment is not used there shall be two (2) additional Timekeepers designated, either of whom shall be directed to replace a Timekeeper whose watch did not start or stopped during an event, or who for any other reason is not able to record the time. When using digital watches, the final time and place is determined by time. (WA SW2.8.1)
- SW2.8.2 When only one (1) Timekeeper per lane is available, an extra Timekeeper must be assigned in case of a malfunction of a stopwatch. In addition, the Chief Timekeeper must always record the time of the winner of each race. (WA SW2.8.2)
- SW2.8.3 Ensure that the card or slip is collected from each lane and forwarded to the Chief Recorder and if necessary, inspect the watches and the time recorded on the lane. (WA SW2.8.3)
- SW2.8.4 Ascertain the method of start from the Starter and inform the Timekeepers the method to be used.
- SW2.8.5 Appoint Chief Lane Timekeepers who shall check and record on a card or slip, the event, heat number and times of all watches and determine the time for that lane.
- SW2.8.6 The Chief Timekeeper may instruct the Timekeepers to record times at the intermediate 100 metre distances in races longer than 100 metres.
- SW2.9 TIMEKEEPERS, sufficient shall be appointed and:
- SW2.9.1 Each Timekeeper shall take the time of the swimmers in the lane assigned to them. The watches shall be certified correct to the satisfaction of the Meet Management Committee. (WA SW2.9.1)
- SW2.9.2 Each Timekeeper shall start their watch at the starting signal and shall stop it when the swimmer in their lane has completed the race. Timekeepers may be instructed by the Chief Timekeeper to record times at intermediate distances in races longer than 100 metres. (WA SW2.9.2)
- SW2.9.3 Promptly after the race, the Timekeepers in each lane shall record the times of their watches on the card, give it to the Chief Timekeeper, and if requested to

present their watches for inspection. Their watches must be cleared at the short whistle of the Referee. (WA SW2.9.3)

SW2.9.4 Unless a video timing system is used, it may be necessary to use the full complement of timekeepers even when Automatic Officiating Equipment is used; and (WA SW2.9.4)

SW2.9.5 Keep a personal record of their individual times for each event.

NOTE: It is desirable to ensure that three (3) Timekeepers are appointed to each lane. There should be two (2) Reserve Timekeepers, one or the other of whom shall replace any Timekeeper as directed.

SW2.10 A CHIEF FINISH JUDGE, if required, shall be appointed and shall:

SW2.10.1 Assign each Finish Judge his position and the placing to be determined. (WA SW2.10.1)

SW2.10.2 After the race, collect signed result sheets from each finish judge and establish the result and placing which will be sent directly to the Referee. (WA SW2.10.2)

SW2.11 FINISH JUDGES, if required, three (3) or more, one (1) of whom shall be the Chief Finish Judge shall be appointed and shall:

SW2.11.1 Be positioned in line with the finish where they always have a clear view of the course and the finish line. (WA SW2.11.1)

SW2.11.2 After each event the Finish Judges shall decide and report the placing of the swimmers according to the assignments given to them. Finish Judges other than push-button operators shall not act as timekeepers in the same event. (SW2.11.2)

SW2.12 A CHIEF RECORDER shall be appointed and shall:

SW2.12.1 Be responsible for the checking, compilation and distribution of results from the Automatic Officiating Equipment, or from results of times and placings in each event, received from the Referee. (WA SW2.12.4)

SW2.13 RECORDERS shall:

- SW2.13.1 Control withdrawals, before and after heats or finals, enter results on official forms, list all new records established, and maintain point scores where appropriate. (WA SW2.13.6)
- SW2.13.2 Supply this information to the Announcer and Press Steward.
- SW2.13.3 Compile lists of swimmers for any ensuing round or final of an event and distribute as necessary to officials, press and public.
- SW2.14 AOE OPERATORS, two (2) shall be appointed and shall:
 - SW2.14.1 Operate the automatic timing and judging equipment at the direction of the Referee.
 - SW2.14.2 Provide the times and placings recorded by the equipment to the Recorders; and
 - SW2.14.3 Inform the Control Room Supervisor of any recording malfunction.
- SW2.15 COMPUTER OPERATORS shall be appointed and shall:
 - SW2.15.1 Operate under the direction of the Control Room Supervisor or Chief Recorder.
 - SW2.15.2 Operate the computers using Meet Manager software.
 - SW2.15.3 Supply the AOE Operators with the program of events and swimmers.
 - SW2.15.4 Receive the results and placings for each heat from the AOE Operators and provide the results and placings for each event to the Chief Recorder; and
 - SW2.15.5 Re-seed and amalgamate events under the direction of the Control Room Supervisor or Chief Recorder, as advised by the Referee, and provide this information to the AOE Operators.
- SW2.16 An ANNOUNCER shall be appointed and shall:
 - SW2.16.1 Report to the Referee and Meet Director/Technical Manager, check the operation of the equipment and become acquainted with the Chief Officials of the meet; and

SW2.16.2 Make all announcements as directed necessary for the conduct and presentation of the meet and generally assist the Meet Director/Technical Manager to maintain meet continuity.

SW2.17 PRESENTATION OFFICERS (2) shall be appointed and shall:

SW2.17.1 Obtain the official placings from the Referee and then conduct and prepare the swimmers placed first, second and third for the presentation ceremony. In addition, the Presentation Officer is required to arrange for the remaining finalists to receive their finalists awards and prepare recipients for other award presentations and ceremonials.

SW2.18 A MEDAL CEREMONY OFFICER shall be appointed and shall:

SW2.18.1 Report to the Meet Director/Technical Manager and receive the allotted medals and other awards for the session

SW2.18.2 Receive results of each event from the Chief Recorder.

SW2.18.3 Allocate appropriate medals for the respective medal presentation ceremony; and

SW2.18.4 Issue finalists awards to the remainder finalists and attend to such other awards ceremony duties as may be required from time to time.

SW2.19 OFFICIALS' DECISION MAKING

SW2.19.1 Officials shall make their decision autonomously and independently of each other unless otherwise provided in the Swimming Rules.

SW3 SEEDING OF HEATS, SEMI FINALS & FINALS

SW3.1.1 (i) For the purpose of a scratch or championship swimming event each entrant shall be required to submit their best competitive time for the relative style and distance on the entry forms or on-line, to comply with the conditions of entry stipulated by the promoting body. (WA SW3.1.1)

SW3.1.1 (ii) Entrants who do not submit a time shall be considered the slowest and shall be listed at the end. If there is more than one such entry, the order of listing shall be determined by draw.

SW3.1(iii) The number of heats in any event shall be determined by the number of lanes of the pool or the width of the course available for use and the number of swimmers. The number of qualifiers comprising the final shall be determined by the number of lanes of a six (6), seven (7), eight (8), nine (9) or ten (10) lane pool or the width of the course available for use in an unenclosed pool.

SW3.1(iv) FOR SWIMMING NEW SOUTH WALES OPEN AND AGE CHAMPIONSHIPS and scratch events where FINALS are to be contested the Chief Recorder or other properly appointed person shall draw up heats where necessary in accordance with the following:

SW3.1.1.1. FOR ONE (1) HEAT

The entrants shall be seeded as a final as provided in SW3.1.2 and swum as scheduled in the finals session of the meet. (WA SW3.1.1.1)

SW3.1.1.2 FOR TWO (2) HEATS

The fastest swimmer shall be placed in the second heat, the next fastest in the first heat and the third fastest in the second heat and so on until all swimmers are assigned. (WA SW3.1.1.2)

SW3.1.1.3 FOR THREE (3) HEATS

Except for 400m, 800m and 1500m events, the fastest swimmer shall be placed in the third heat, next fastest in the second, next fastest in the first. The fourth fastest swimmer shall be placed in the third heat, the fifth in the second heat and so on until all the swimmers are assigned. (WA SW3.1.13)

SW3.1.1.4 FOR MORE THAN THREE (3) HEATS

Except for 400m, 800m and 1500m events, the last three heats shall be assigned in accordance with SW3.1.1.3. The heat preceding the last three heats shall consist of the next fastest swimmers, the heat preceding the last four heats shall consist of the next fastest swimmers and so on until all the swimmers have been assigned in descending order of submitted times within each heat in accordance with the pattern outlined in SW3.1.2, unless determined otherwise by the Company. (WA SW3.1.1.4)

SW3.1.1.5 For 400m, 800m and 1500m events, the last two heats of the event shall be seeded in accordance with SW 3.1.1.3. (WA SW3.1.1.5)

SW3.1.2 Except for 50 metre events in 50 metre pools, assignment of lanes shall be {number 1 lane being on the right side of the pool (0 when using pools with 10 lanes) when facing the course from the starting end} by placing the fastest swimmer or team in the centre lane in pool with an odd number of lanes, or in lane 3 or 4 respectively in pools having 6 or 8 lanes. In pools using 10 lanes, the fastest swimmer shall be placed in lane 4. The swimmer having the next fastest time is to be placed on their left, then alternating the others to right and left in accordance with the submitted times. Swimmers with identical times shall be assigned their lane positions by draw within the aforesaid pattern. (WA SW3.1.2)

SW3.1.3 When 50 metre events are contested in 50 metre pools, races may be swum, at the discretion of the Meet Committee either from the regular starting end to the turning end or from the turning end to the starting end, depending upon such factors as existence of adequate Automatic Equipment, starter's position, etc. The Meet Committee should advise swimmers of their determination well before the start of the competition. Regardless of which way the race is swum, the swimmers shall be seeded in the same lanes in which they would be seeded if they were both starting and finishing at the starting end. (WA SW3.1.3)

SW3.2 SEMI-FINALS AND FINALS

SW3.2.1 In the semi-finals heats shall be assigned as defined in SW3.1.2

SW3.2.2 Where no preliminary heats are necessary, lanes shall be assigned in accordance with SW3.1.1.3 above. Where preliminary heats or semi-finals have been held, lanes shall be assigned as in SW3.1.2 based, however, on times established in such heats.

SW3.2.3 In the event that swimmers from the same or different heats have equal times registered to 1/100 second for either the eighth/tenth place or sixteenth/twentieth place depending on the use of 8 or 10 lanes, there may be a swim-off to determine which swimmer shall advance to the appropriate finals. Such swim-off shall take place after all involved swimmers have completed their heats at a time agreed between the event management and the parties involved. Another swim-off may take place if equal times are

registered again. If required, a swim-off will take place to determine 1st and 2nd reserve if equal times are recorded. (WA SW3.2.3)

SW3.2.4 Where one or more swimmers scratch from a semi-final, or final reserves will be called in order of classifications in heats or semi- finals. Whenever possible, event or events must be reseeded and supplementary sheets must be issued detailing the changes or substitutions, as prescribed in SW3.1.2. (WA SW3.2.4)

SW3.2.5 For heats, semi-finals and finals, swimmers shall report to the First Call Room at a time determined by event management. After inspection, swimmers proceed to the final call room. (WA SW3.2.5)

SW3.2.6 At SNSW events the draw system may be used for assigning lane positions instead of a swim-off if agreed by all swimmers. (WA SW3.3)

SW3.3 In other competitions, the draw system may be used for assigning lane positions. (WA SW3.3)

SW3.4 FINAL

Where preliminary heats have been held lanes shall be assigned in accordance with SW3.1.2 based on times established in the heats.

SW3.5 TIMED FINAL

FOR SWIMMING NEW SOUTH WALES meets where NO FINALS are to be contested the Chief Recorder or other properly appointed person shall draw up heats where necessary in accordance with the following:

SW3.5.1 The entrants shall be allotted to heats in the numerical sequence of the submitted times, the fastest in the first heat and the slowest in the last heat unless otherwise determined and advised by Swimming NSW.

SW3.5.2 The assignment to lanes shall be in accordance with SW3.1.2

SW3.6 The promoting body may in a final, place any specifically invited swimmer in the centre lane and if heats are necessary may be placed in the final as if the invited swimmer had recorded the fastest time in the heats.

SW3.7 For all Scratch or Championship events, there shall be a minimum of three swimmers seeded into any one preliminary heat, but subsequent withdrawals may reduce the number of swimmers in such heat to less than three.

SW3.8 AMALGAMATION OF HEATS

SW3.8.1 Where a reduction in the number of heats is possible owing to the withdrawal of swimmers, the Referee shall have the power to amalgamate two or more heats into one heat or all heats into a final, PROVIDED THAT, any alteration of the first heat shall be kept to a minimum.

SW3.8.2 For the purpose of this Rule a swimmer entered in an event who has not reported to the allotted place at the prescribed time shall be deemed to have withdrawn from the event.

PROCEDURE FOR AMALGAMATION OF HEATS

The Call Room Supervisor shall immediately notify the Technical Manager and the Referee of the possibility of an amalgamation. The Referee shall establish the need to amalgamate heats and advises the Control Room Supervisor who delegates the actual reseeding and amalgamation to the Chief Recorder. The Referee shall direct the Call Room Supervisor to notify the Chief Judge and Chief Timekeeper of the amalgamation and the heat reallocation numbering. The Chief Recorder shall ensure that the Announcer and the Control Room Supervisor receives the swimmer reallocation to heats or a final for public announcement.

Notwithstanding the foregoing the Company may authorise procedures to establish withdrawals from an event prior to seeding the remaining entrants into heats as prescribed herein.

SW3.9 QUALIFIERS FOR FINALS

SW3.9.1 The number of fastest swimmers from all the heats qualifying to contest the final of an event where heats and finals are to be conducted shall be directed by:

SW3.9.1.1 The organising committee of a scratch event meet, however, the finalists shall not exceed eight (8) where automatic officiating equipment is not employed.

SW3.9.1.2 The Board for Swimming New South Wales Championships, GR10; and

- SW3.9.1.3 In Swimming New South Wales Age Championships not more than two (2) visitors shall be permitted to contest the final unless there are insufficient New South Wales swimmers to fill all the lanes. (Refer GR5.2)
- SW3.9.2 In NSW Championships when “B” finals are conducted, that the following shall apply:
- SW3.9.2.1 Nineteen (19) or more swimmers contest the heats in an eight (8) lane pool, and twenty five (25) or more swimmers contest the heats of an event in a ten (10) lane pool.
- SW3.9.2.2 When a “B” final is held the swimmers shall be the next fastest group from all the heats after processing withdrawals.
- SW3.9.2.3 A swimmer who has qualified for the final shall not contest the “B” final of that event.
- SW3.9.2.4 When a “B” final is to be held it shall immediately follow the final of the event.
- SW3.9.2.5 When a “B” final swimmer is called up to replace a swimmer in the Final, no other swimmer will take that position in the “B” final.

SW4 THE START (WA SW4)

- SW4.1 The start in Freestyle, Breaststroke, Butterfly and Individual Medley races shall be with a dive. On the long whistle (SW2.1.5) from the Referee the swimmers shall step onto the starting platform and remain there. On the Starter’s command “Take your Marks”, they shall immediately take up a starting position with at least one foot at the front of the starting platforms. The position of the hands is not relevant. When all swimmers are stationary, the Starter shall give the starting signal. (WA SW4.1)
- SW4.2 The start in Backstroke and Medley Relay races shall be from the water. At the Referee’s first long whistle (SW2.1.5) the swimmers shall immediately enter the water. At the Referee’s second long whistle the swimmers shall return without undue delay to the starting position (see SW6.1). When all swimmers have assumed their starting positions, the Starter shall give the command “Take your Marks”. When all swimmers are stationary, the Starter shall give the starting signal. (WA SW4.2)

SW4.4 Any swimmer initiating a start before the starting signal may be disqualified. If the starting signal sounds before the disqualification is declared, the race shall continue and the swimmer or swimmers shall be disqualified upon completion of the race. If the disqualification is declared before the starting signal, the signal shall not be given, but the remaining swimmers shall be called back and start again. The Referee repeats the starting procedure beginning with the long whistle (the second one for backstroke) as per SW2.1.5 (WA SW4.4)

SW5 FREESTYLE

SW5.1 Freestyle means that in an event so designated the swimmer may swim any style, except that in medley or medley relay events, freestyle means any style other than backstroke, breaststroke or butterfly. (WA SW5.1)

SW5.2 Some part of the swimmer must touch the wall upon completion of each length and at the finish. (WA SW5.2)

SW5.3 Some part of the swimmer must break the surface of the water throughout the race, except it shall be permissible for the swimmer to be completely submerged during the turn and for not more than 15 metres after the start and each turn. By that point, the head must have broken the surface. (WA SW5.3)

SW6 BACKSTROKE

SW6.1 Prior to the starting signal, the swimmers shall line up in the water, facing the starting end, with both hands holding the starting grips. Standing in or on the gutter or bending the toes over the lip of the gutter is prohibited. When using a backstroke ledge at the start, at least one toe of each foot must be in contact with the end wall or face of the touchpad. Bending the toes over the top of the touchpad is prohibited. (WA SW6.1)

SW6.2 At the signal for starting and after turning the swimmer shall push off and swim upon his back throughout the race except when executing a turn as set forth in SW6.4. The normal position on the back can include a roll movement of the body up to, but not including 90 degrees from horizontal. The position of the head is not relevant. (WA SW6.2)

SW6.3 Some part of the swimmer must break the surface of the water throughout the race, except that once some part of the head of the swimmer has passed the 5

metres mark immediately prior to reaching for the finish, the swimmer may be completely submerged. It is also permissible for the swimmer to be completely submerged during the turn and for a distance of not more than 15 metres after the start and each turn. By that point the head must have broken the surface. (WA SW6.3)

SW6.4 When executing the turn there must be a touch of the wall with some part of the swimmer's body. During the turn the shoulders may be turned over the vertical to the breast after which an immediate continuous single arm pull or immediate continuous simultaneous double arm pull may be used to initiate the turn. The swimmer must have returned to the position on the back upon leaving the wall. (WA SW6.4)

SW6.5 Upon the finish of the race the swimmer must touch the wall while on the back. (WA SW6.5)

NOTE: Backstroke start procedure shall be in accordance with SW4.2

SW7 BREASTSTROKE

SW7.1 After the start and after each turn, the swimmer may take one arm stroke completely back to the legs during which the swimmer may be submerged. At any time prior to the first breaststroke kick after the start and after each turn a single butterfly kick is permitted. The head must break the surface of the water before the hands turn inward at the widest part of the second stroke. (WA SW7.1)

SW7.2 From the beginning of the first arm stroke after the start and after each turn, the body shall be on the breast. It is not permitted to roll onto the back at any time except at the turn after the touch of the wall where it is permissible to turn in any manner as long as the body is on the breast when leaving the wall. From the start and throughout the race the stroke cycle must be one arm stroke and

One leg kick in that order. All movements of the arms shall be simultaneous without alternating movement. (WA SW7.2)

SW7.3 The hands shall be pushed forward together from the breast on, under, or over the water. The elbows shall be under water except for the final stroke before the turn, during the turn and for the final stroke at the finish. The hands shall be brought back on or under the surface of the water. The hands shall not be brought

back beyond the hip line, except during the first stroke after the start and each turn. (WA SW7.3)

SW7.4 During each complete cycle, some part of the swimmer's head must break the surface of the water. All movements of the legs shall be simultaneous without alternating movement. (WA SW7.4)

SW7.5 The feet must be turned outwards during the propulsive part of the kick. Alternating movements or downward butterfly kicks are not permitted except as in SW 7.1. Breaking the surface of the water with the feet is allowed unless followed by a downward butterfly kick. (WA SW7.5)

SW7.6 At each turn and at the finish of the race, the touch shall be made with both hands separated* and simultaneously at, above, or below the water level. At the last stroke before the turn and at the finish an arm stroke not followed by a leg kick is permitted. The head may be submerged after the last arm pull prior to the touch, provided it breaks the surface of the water at some point during the last complete or incomplete cycle preceding the touch. (WA SW7.6)

* Separated means that the hands cannot be stacked one on top of the other. It is not necessary to see space between the hands. Incidental contact at the fingers is not a concern.

SW8 BUTTERFLY

SW8.1 From the beginning of the first arm stroke after the start and each turn, the body shall be kept on the breast. It is not permitted to roll onto the back at any time, except at the turn after the touch of the wall where it is permissible to turn in any manner as long as the body is on the breast when leaving the wall. (WA SW8.1)

SW8.2 Both arms must be brought forward simultaneously over the water and brought backward simultaneously under the water throughout the race, subject to SW 8.5. (WA SW8.2)

SW8.3 All up and down movements of the legs must be simultaneous. The legs or the feet need not be on the same level, but they shall not alternate in relation to each other. A breaststroke kicking movement is not permitted. (WA SW8.3)

SW8.4 At each turn and at the finish of the race, the touch shall be made with both hands separated* and simultaneously, at, above, or below the water surface. (WA SW8.4)

* Separated means that the hands cannot be stacked one on top of the other. It is not necessary to see space between the hands. Incidental contact at the fingers is not a concern.

SW8.5 At the start and at turns, a swimmer is permitted one or more leg kicks and one arm pull under the water, which must bring them to the surface. It shall be permissible for a swimmer to be completely submerged for a distance of not more than 15 metres after the start and each turn. By that point, the head must have broken the surface. The swimmer must remain on the surface until the next turn or finish. (WA SW8.5)

SW9 MEDLEY SWIMMING

SW9.1 In Individual Medley events the swimmer covers the four swimming strokes in the following order: Butterfly, Backstroke, Breaststroke and Freestyle. Each of the strokes must cover one quarter (1/4) of the distance. (WA SW9.1)

SW9.2 In Freestyle the swimmer must be on the breast except when executing a turn. The swimmer must return to the breast before any kick or stroke. Leaving the wall on the back during the freestyle portion is permissible but no kicking action is permitted until the swimmer has returned past the vertical to the breast at which point kicking, including a butterfly kick(s) may commence. (WA SW9.2)

SW9.3 In Medley relay events, swimmers will cover the four swimming strokes in the following order: Backstroke, Breaststroke, Butterfly and Freestyle. Each of the strokes must cover one quarter (1/4) of the distance. (WA SW9.3)

SW9.4 Each section must be finished in accordance with the rule which applies to the style concerned. (WA SW9.4)

SW10 THE RACE

SW10.1 All individual races must be held as separate gender events. (WA SW10.1)

- SW10.1.1 All individual races must be held as separate gender events at Company events and Area Championships. At these events, entries must be taken for male and female events. On the day, the Meet Director, Referee/s and affected athletes and coaches may agree to amalgamate the male and female events on the provision that there is one spare (empty) lane between the male and female swimmers. However, no SNSW Records are able to be considered official in mixed gender events.
- SW10.1.2 For all other events, mixed gender races are permissible, and entries may be taken on this basis. However, no SNSW Records are able to be considered official in mixed gender events.
- SW10.2 A swimmer swimming over the course alone shall cover the whole distance to qualify. A swimmer who does not complete the whole distance in accordance with the relevant WA rules shall be disqualified. (WA SW10.2)
- SW10.3 On the pool deck, after respecting the presentation protocol outlined in SW1.5, the competitors must remove all clothing except for swimwear. (WA SW10.3)
- SW10.4 The swimmer must remain and finish the race in the same lane in which they started. (WA SW10.4)
- SW10.5 In all events, a swimmer when turning shall make physical contact with the end of the pool or course. The turn must be made from the wall, and it is not permitted to take a stride or step from the bottom of the pool. (WA SW10.5)
- SW10.6 Standing on the bottom during freestyle events or during the freestyle portion of medley events shall not disqualify a swimmer, but they shall not walk. (WA SW10.6)
- SW10.7 Pulling on the lane rope is not allowed. (WA SW10.7)
- SW10.8 Obstructing another swimmer by swimming across another lane or otherwise interfering shall disqualify the offender. Should the foul be intentional, the referee shall report the matter to the Member promoting the race, and to the Member of the swimmer so offending. (WA SW10.8)

- SW10.9 Any swimmer not entered in a race, who enters the water in which an event is being conducted before all swimmers therein have completed the race, shall be disqualified from his next scheduled race in the meet. (WA SW10.9)
- SW10.10 There shall be four swimmers on each relay team. Mixed relays may be swum. Mixed Relays must consist of two (2) Men and two (2) Women. Split times achieved in these events cannot be used for records and/or entry purposes. (WA SW10.10)
- SW10.11 Relay exchanges must commence from the starting platform. Running starts from pool deck are not permitted. (WA SW10.11)
- SW10.12 In relay events, the team of a swimmer whose feet lose touch with the starting platform before the preceding team-mate touches the wall shall be disqualified (WA SW10.12)
- SW10.13 Any relay team shall be disqualified from a race if a team member, other than the swimmer designated to swim that length, enters the water when the race is being conducted, before all swimmers of all teams have finished the race. (WA SW10.13)
- SW10.14 The members of a relay team and their order of competing must be nominated before the race. Any relay team member may compete in a race only once. The composition of a relay team may be changed between the heats and finals of an event, provided that it is made up from the list of swimmers properly entered by a Member for that event. Failure to swim in the order listed will result in disqualification. Substitutions may be made only in the case of documented medical emergency. (WA SW10.14)
- SW10.15 Except as provided in SW10.16, any swimmer having finished their race, or their distance in a relay event, must leave the pool as soon as possible without obstructing any other swimmer who has not yet finished his race. Otherwise, the swimmer committing the fault, or their relay team, shall be disqualified. (WA SW10.15)
- SW10.16 Should a foul endanger the chance of success of a swimmer, the referee shall have the power to allow them to compete in the next heat or, should the foul occur in a final event or in the last heat, the Referee may order it to be re-swum. (WA SW10.16)

- SW10.17 No pace-making shall be permitted, nor may any device be used or plan adopted which has that effect. (WA SW10.17)
- SW10.18 Unauthorised persons shall not be permitted in those areas of the pool designated for competition, for the swimmers or officials for the duration of any competition. (SW10.18)
- SW10.19 No swimmer shall be permitted to use or wear any device or swimsuit that may aid their speed, buoyancy or endurance during a competition (such as webbed gloves, flippers, fins, power bands, or adhesive substances etc.). The use of technology and automated data collection devices is permissible for the sole purpose of collecting data. Automated devices shall not be utilised to transmit data, sounds, or signals to the swimmer and may not be used to aid their speed. Goggles may be worn. Any kind of tape on the body is not permitted unless approved by the Referee. As a consequence of injury, it is permissible to tape not more than one or two fingers or toes. Any other kind of tape on the body is not permitted unless approved by the Technical Manager and Referee.

SW11 DETERMINATION OF TIMES AND PLACINGS

At any swim meet where the operation of approved Automatic Officiating Equipment is provided:

- SW11.1 The operation of this equipment shall be under the supervision of appointed Officials. Times recorded by Automatic Equipment shall be used to determine the winner, all placings and the time applicable to each lane. The placing and times so determined shall have precedence over the decisions of Timekeepers. If a breakdown of the Automatic Equipment occurs or it is clearly indicated that there has been a failure of the Equipment, or that a swimmer has failed to activate the Equipment, the recordings of the Timekeepers shall be official (see SW13.3). If there is failure of all timing devices in a lane, then the swimmer may be offered a re-swim. (WA SW11.1)
- SW11.2 When Automatic Equipment is used, the results shall be recorded only to 1/100 of a second. In the event of equal times, all swimmers who have recorded the same time at 1/100 of a second shall be accorded the same placing. Times displayed on the electronic scoreboard should show only to 1/100 of a second. (WA SW11.2)

SW11.3 Any timing device that is terminated by an Official shall be considered a watch. Such manual times must be taken by three appointed and approved timekeepers. All watches shall be certified as accurate to the satisfaction of the governing body concerned. Manual timing shall be registered to 1/100 of a second. Where no Automatic Equipment is used official manual times shall be determined as follows: (WA SW11.3)

SW11.3.1 If two of the three (3) watches record the same time, and the third disagrees, the two identical times shall be the official time; (WA SW11.3.1)

SW11.3.2 If all three (3) watches disagree, the watch recording the intermediate time shall be the official time; (WA SW11.3.2)

SW11.3.3 With only two (2) watch times recorded, the average time shall be the official time. When this calculation results in a value that is expressed in thousandths of a second, the final digit shall be dropped without rounding. (WA SW11.3.3)

SW11.3.4 With only one watch time recorded, that shall be the official time.

SW11.3.5 In the event that the Automatic Equipment fails and a manual backup is used, official manual times shall be determined as above.

SW11.4 Should a swimmer be disqualified during or following an event, such disqualification should be recorded in the official results, but no time or place shall be recorded or announced. (WA SW11.4)

SW11.5 In the case of a relay disqualification, legal splits up to the time of the disqualification shall be recorded in the official results. (WA SW11.5)

SW11.6 All 50 metre and 100 metre splits shall be recorded for lead-off swimmers during relays and published in the official results. (WA SW11.6)

PLACINGS

SW11.7 The swimmers concerned in equal placing in an event shall jointly hold the title, and if the Promoting Body consents divide the prize involved or shall re-swim the event within seven (7) days at such time and place as the Promoting Body may direct.

SW11.8 Where a swimmer is disqualified for any reason, including drug misuse or Doping Control the placing he would have held shall be awarded to the swimmer next placed and the other swimmers advanced accordingly. When the disqualification occurs after the presentation of the awards, such awards shall be recalled and re-presented to the appropriate swimmers as determined by this Rule.

SW11.9 For determination of placings (see SW2.1.12) when Automatic Officiating Equipment is not used and if the times registered by the Timekeepers do not agree with the decision of the Finish Judges and where the time of a swimmer placed second is better, the first placed swimmer and the second placed swimmer shall be credited with the times calculated on the average of the actual times recorded for both the first and second places. The same principle is to apply to all placings. It is not permissible to announce times which do not support the classifications made by the Finish Judges.

NOTE: The Referee shall determine placings when the Finish Judges decision is not supported by the times recorded (see SW2.1.3 and SW2.1.13)

SW12 SWIMMING RECORDS - RECORD ATTEMPTS AND APPLICATIONS FOR RECORDS

A record is the establishment of a performance which equals or eclipses the previous best on record. The Company shall recognise a record of the State by issuing a diploma signed by the Chief Executive Officer PROVIDED THAT it has been established under strict adherence to the Rules and there has been compliance with the Rules governing records.

SW12.1 REGULATIONS, APPLICATIONS FOR NEW SOUTH WALES RECORDS

The regulations which shall apply to all applications for recognition of New South Wales records shall be as follows:

SW12.1.1 The Venue Pool shall have been registered as a course suitable for the establishment of a Swimming New South Wales Record.

SW12.1.2 All records shall be made in water with less than 3gr/litre of salt without current or tide, in;

SW12.1.2.1 A scratch event; or

SW12.1.2.2 An individual attempt where the swimmer shall swim alone against time PROVIDED THAT notification in writing shall have been given to the Chief Executive Officer of Swimming New South Wales at least three (3) days prior to the date of the attempt so that public advice through the media and or advertisement as deemed necessary can be effected, and the Officials controlling an individual attempt on a record shall be appointed in accordance with GR18 and shall include a Referee, Starter and three (3) Timekeepers or a Control Room Supervisor as a minimum requirement.

NOTE: An individual attempt shall be deemed to mean an attempt on a record by one (1) Swimmer, one (1) State Team duly selected by the State Selectors of bona fide Swimming New South Wales members or one (1) Club Team of four (4) Swimmers duly selected by the Club Selectors of full swimmer primary members of a Club, respectively.

SW12.1.3 To effect registration of the pool, the promoting body of a Meet, the owner or an Member Association, shall have the measurements of the course certified by a Registered Surveyor or other qualified Official nominated by the Company and subject to the approval of the Board the venue shall be recorded in a register maintained by the Company listing its compliance with the pertinent rules and suitability for establishing one or more of the record Classes i to xxiv as defined in SW12.2 together with any limitations and other statistics as determined by the Board. A Company certificate stating the suitability of the pool for the establishment of Swimming New South Wales records and the various classes shall be forwarded to the approved applicant.

SW12.1.4 The swimmer shall wear the regulation costume as specified in GR 19.

SW12.1.5 In an individual attempt on a record or an attempt on a record in a scratch event, pace making shall not be permitted nor may any device be used or plan adopted which has that effect nor shall instruction to the swimmer be given after the start of such attempt.

NOTE: An Age swimmer competing at a recognised meet in an event outside their age group for which they are eligible shall not be deemed to have been aided by pace making.

SW12.1.6 The time shall be taken and determined by Officials appointed by the Company.

- SW12.1.7 The Referee or other Official shall inspect the watches or electronic timing device used to record the times and the official time shall be publicly announced.
- SW12.1.8 Officials controlling an attempt on a record in a scratch event shall be appointed by the Company and shall include a Referee, a Starter, three (3) Timekeepers, or a Control Room Supervisor as a minimum requirement except as provided for in SW12.1.9.5.
- SW12.1.9 For the establishment of New South Wales records Classes i to xxiv inclusive as defined in SW12.2, the Board may approve the use of Automatic Officiating Equipment which complies with the provisions of WA, PROVIDED THAT, the touch pads shall not be less than 1.9 metres wide.
- SW12.1.9.1 Times which are equal to 1/100 of a second if timed by approved Automatic Officiating Equipment will be recognised as equal records and swimmers achieving these equal times will be called "Joint Holders". In the event of a tie in a record setting race, each swimmer who tied shall be considered to have equal placings. (WA SW1".10)
- SW12.1.9.2 The first swimmer in a relay except in mixed relays, may apply for a record. Should the first swimmer complete the first leg distance in record time in accordance with the provisions of the rules relevant to that event, such performance shall not be nullified by any subsequent disqualification completed. (WA SW12.12)
- SW12.1.9.3 A swimmer in an individual event may apply for a record at an intermediate distance if the swimmer, coach or manager specifically requests the Referee that the performance be especially timed or if the time at the intermediate distance is recorded by approved Automatic Officiating Equipment. Such swimmer must complete the scheduled distance of the event to apply for a record at the intermediate distance provided that in the race the qualifying time is achieved for the event and the swimmer is not disqualified. (WA SW12.13)
- SW12.1.9.4 World, Commonwealth and Australian Records will only be recognised if timed by approved Automatic Officiating Equipment and are in accordance with all the relevant rules of either WA or SA.
- SW12.1.9.5 Application for New South Wales records established by individual swimmers during competition conducted by school and other kindred associations will only be considered by the Board if;

- (i) Prior approval has been granted by the Board in accordance with the Company's current "School Swim Meet Policy".
- (ii) (ii) The competition must have been refereed by a currently accredited, registered Referee.
- (iii) The Starter must be a currently accredited, registered Starter.
- (iv) The times must have been recorded by Automatic Officiating Equipment or Semi-Automatic Equipment in the case of Automatic Officiating Equipment system failure.

NOTE: Applications for New South Wales records will only be considered for performances by an individual. Times achieved by members of a relay team representing a school or association which equal or better an existing New South Wales record will not be considered.

SW12.1.10 Every application for the recognition of any record shall be made to the Company on the official form and forwarded to the Chief Executive Officer not more than seven (7) days after the establishment of the time for approval, PROVIDED THAT, for Australian and State Championship Meets promoted and directly controlled within New South Wales by the Company and the official results shall have been produced and certified by the Chief Recorder, the Chief Executive Officer shall be authorised to use such results to substantiate, without written application, a recommendation for approval of a record established at such State Meet.

SW12.1.11 The form shall be signed by:

SW12.1.11.1 The three (3) Timekeepers or the Control Room Supervisor;

SW12.1.11.2 The Official who inspected the watches or the Automatic Officiating Equipment used to record the time;

SW12.1.11.3 The Referee in making the formal application on behalf of the swimmer and stating that the Rules and regulations of Swimming New South Wales have been observed;

SW12.1.11.4 The Chief Executive Officer on behalf of the Company stating that the venue pool is registered and suitable for the establishment of a specific Class of New South Wales record; and considering the application for approval or rejection.

SW12.1.12 Records approved by the Chief Executive Officer shall be entered into the permanent records of the Company and a Record Diploma shall be issued to individual swimmers and each member of a Relay Team recognising the performance of the swim.

SW12.2 There shall be records in swimming for the State of New South Wales recognised separately for Men and Women, Boys and Girls and for Mixed teams in the following classes:

SW12.3 APPLICATION FOR RECOGNITION OF A RECORD

SW12.3.1 Application for New South Wales State Records Classes iii, iv, xi, and xii of SW12.2 is restricted to a Swimming New South Wales registered member, a team representing Swimming New South Wales or an Area or Club, anywhere in the world.

SW12.3.2 Application for New South Wales State Club Relay Records Classes xvii, xviii, xxi and xxii of SW12.2 is restricted to a Swimming New South Wales affiliated Club, anywhere in the world.

SW12.3.3 Application for a Swimming New South Wales State Country or Metropolitan Event Record Classes v, vi, vii, viii, xiii, xiv, xv, and xvi, of SW12.2 is restricted to a full swimmer primary member of a Club within the Country area of New South Wales or a full swimmer primary member of a Club within the Metropolitan area as defined in GR5.3 & GR 5.4 respectively, for the recognition of a time established at the Swimming New South Wales Country, Metropolitan, Country Short Course Ind Metropolitan Short Course Championships respectively.

SW12.3.4 Application for a Swimming New South Wales All Comers Record Classes i, ii, ix, and x of SW12.2 for recognition of a time established anywhere in New South Wales may be made by:

SW12.3.4.1 A Swimming New South Wales registered member or team of four (4) Swimming New South Wales registered members as prescribed in SW12.3.1, or

SW12.3.4.2 A visiting swimmer or team of four (4) swimmers who are full swimmer primary members of a Club affiliated through an Australian State Swimming Organisation or a bona fide member or members of any Swimming Federation recognised by World Aquatics, competing at an authorised Meet conducted within the boundaries of New South Wales.

SW12.3.5 Application for a Swimming New South Wales All Comers Club Relay Record Classes xix, xx, xxiii, and xxiv of SW12.2 for recognition of a time established anywhere in New South Wales may be made by:

SW12.3.5.1 A Swimming New South Wales affiliated club of four (4) Swimming New South Wales registered members as prescribed in SW12.3.2, or

SW12.3.5.2 A visiting team of four (4) swimmers who are full swimmer primary members of a Club affiliated through an Australian State Swimming Organisation or bona fide members of a Club of any Swimming Federation recognised by World Aquatics , competing at an authorised Meet conducted within the boundaries of New South Wales.

SW12.3.6 In every case a record may be established only when swimmers in an individual event are all male for a Men's or Boy's State Record and all female for a Women's or Girl's State Record.

NOTE: Swimming New South Wales All Comers Records Classes i, ii, ix and x of SW12.2 may be claimed by a Swimming New South Wales Swimmer or a team of four (4) Swimming New South Wales Swimmers or a visiting swimmer or team of four (4) visiting swimmers from another state or an overseas member country of World Aquatics, for a performance within New South Wales.

Swimming New South Wales All Comers Records Classes xix, xx, xxiii, and xxiv of SW12.2 may be claimed by a Swimming New South Wales affiliated Club of four (4) Swimming New South Wales Swimmers or a visiting Club of four (4) visiting swimmers from another state or an overseas member country of World Aquatics, for a performance within New South Wales.

A swimmer claiming a Swimming New South Wales Record Classes iii, iv xi and xii of SW12.2 must be a bona fide member of a Swimming New South Wales affiliated Club for recognition of a performance established anywhere in the world.

A Club claiming a Swimming New South Wales Record Classes xvii, xviii, xxi and xxii of SW12.2 must be a Swimming New South Wales affiliated Club for recognition of a performance established anywhere in the world.

A swimmer claiming a Swimming New South Wales Country or Metropolitan Event Record Classes v, vi, vii, viii, xiii, xiv, xv and xvi of SW12.2 must be a bona fide member of a Swimming New South Wales affiliated Country or Metropolitan Club, as appropriate, for recognition of a performance established when contesting a Swimming New South Wales Country or Metropolitan Championship.

It is not permissible to claim a male or female New South Wales record for a performance in a mixed relay scratch event.

SW12.3.7 When a new event is introduced into SW12.2 for which a Swimming New South Wales Record may be claimed, the swimmer achieving the fastest time swum in that event shall be recognised as the record holder.

SW12.4 APPLICATION FOR RECOGNITION OF AN AGE RECORD

SW12.4.1 Swimmers making an application for recognition of an Age Record shall be the age applicable to the record claimed on the first day of the Meet as defined in GR6.2.

SW13 AUTOMATIC OFFICIATING PROCEDURE

SW13.1 When Automatic Officiating Equipment is used in any competition, the placing and times so determined and relay take-offs judged by such Equipment shall have precedence over the timekeepers and inspectors of turns.

SW13.2 When the Automatic Officiating Equipment fails to record the place and/or time of one or more swimmers in a given race: (WA SW13.2)

SW13.2.1 Record all available Automatic Equipment times and places (WA SW13.2.1)

SW13.2.2 Record human times and places (WA13.2.2)

SW13.2.3 The official place will be determined as follows: (WA SW13.2.3)

SW13.2.3.1 A swimmer with an Automatic Equipment time and place must retain their relative order when compared with the other swimmers having an Automatic Equipment time and place within that race. (WA SW13.2.3.1)

- SW13.2.3.2 A swimmer not having an Automatic Equipment place but having an Automatic Equipment time will establish their relative order by comparing their Automatic Equipment time with the Automatic Equipment times of the other swimmers. (WA SW13.2.3.2)
- SW13.2.3.3 A swimmer having neither an Automatic Equipment place nor an Automatic Equipment time shall establish their relative order by the time recorded by the Semi-Automatic Equipment or by watches. (WA SW13.2.3.3)
- SW13.3 The official time will be determined as follows (WA SW13.3)
- SW13.3.1 The official time for all swimmers having an Automatic Equipment time will be that time (WA SW13.3.1)
- SW13.3.2 The official time for all swimmers not having an Automatic Equipment time will be the three digital watches or the Semi-Automatic Equipment time. (WA SW13.3.2)
- SW13.4 To determine the relative order of finish for the combined heats of an event, proceed as follows: (WA SW13.4)
- SW13.4.1 The relative order of all swimmers will be established by comparing their official times. (WA SW13.4.1)
- SW13.4.2 If a swimmer has an official time which is tied with the official time(s) of one or more swimmers, all swimmers having that time shall be tied in their relative order of finish in that event. (WA SW13.4.2)

OPEN WATER SWIMMING RULES

All Swimming New South Wales Limited (SNWS) Open Water Swimming Championships and Open Water Swimming competitions shall be governed by Swimming Australia Limited's and NSW's Rules and By-Laws, as determined from time to time.

All World Championships, World Cups and WA competitions shall be governed by the rules WA and are found on the WA website.

OWS1 OPEN WATER SWIMMING DEFINITIONS

OWS1.1 OPEN WATER SWIMMING shall be defined as any competition that takes place in rivers, lakes, oceans or water channels, dams, or rowing courses except for 10km events.

OWS1.1.1 MARATHON SWIMMING shall be defined as any 10km event in open water competitions.

OWS1.2 The age limit for all NSW Open, Open Water Swimming events must be at least 13 years of age.

OWS1.3 The age limit for all NSW Age 7.5km & 10km Open Water Swimming events must be at least 13 years of age.

OWS1.4 The age limit for all NSW Age 5km, Open Water Swimming events must be at least 12 years of age.

OWS2 THE VENUE (WA OWS5)

OWS2.1 The NSW Open Water Swimming Championships shall be conducted over distances and at a venue and course approved by the Board.

OWS2.2 The course shall be in water that is subject to only minor currents or tide and may be salt or fresh water.

OWS2.3 A certificate of suitability for use of the venue shall be issued by the appropriate local health and safety authorities. In general terms the certification must relate to water purity and to physical safety from other considerations. (WA OWS 8.1.6.1)

- OWS2.4 The minimum depth of water at any point on the course shall be 1.40 metres. (WA OWS 8.1.6.2)
- OWS2.5 The water temperature should be a minimum of 16°C and a maximum of 31°C. It should be checked on the day of the race, 2 hours before the start, in the middle of the course at a depth of 40cm. This control should be done in the presence of a Commission made up of the following persons present: a Referee, a Member of the Organising Committee and one Coach from the Teams present designated during the Technical Meeting. (WA OWS 8.1.6.3)
- OWS2.5.1 For open water swimming competitions in water with temperature below 18 degrees, the use of wetsuits is compulsory. Wetsuits are not permitted in open water swimming competitions in water with temperature 18 degrees and above.
- OWS2.5.2 Wetsuits (for both men and women) shall completely cover the torso, back, shoulders and knees. They shall not extend beyond the neck, wrists and ankles.
- OWS2.5.3 The Safety Officer shall monitor temperature conditions periodically during the race. (WA OWS 3.12.6)
- OWS2.6 All turns/ alterations of course shall be clearly indicated. Directional Buoys which are alterations of the course shall be of a different colour to guidance buoys. (WA OWS 8.1.3.1)
- OWS2.7 A clearly marked craft or platform, containing a Turn Judge, shall be positioned at all alterations of course in such a manner as not to obstruct a competitor's visibility of the turn. (WA OWS 3.9.1)
- OWS2.8 All Feeding Platforms, turning apparatus and Turn Judges' craft /platforms shall be securely fixed in a position and not be subject to tidal, wind or other movements. (WA OWS5.8)
- OWS2.9 The final approach to the finish shall be clearly defined with markers of a distinctive colour and shall comprise the boundary of the course. (WA OWS 8.1.5)
- OWS2.10 The finish shall be clearly defined and marked by a vertical face. (WA OW8.1.2.3)

OWS3 OFFICIALS

- OWS3.1 The following officials shall be appointed at Open Water Swimming competitions:

Open Water Technical Manager
Chief Referee
Referees (2 minimum, additional Referees proportional to race entries)
Chief Timekeeper plus 2 Timekeepers
Chief Finish Judge plus 2 Finish Judges
Safety Officer
Medical Officer
Course Officer
Clerk of the Course
Recorder
Race Judges (one per competitor) except for events with a course of 10km or less
Turn Judges (one per alteration of Course)
Feeding Platform Judge (when feeding platforms are used)
Starter
Announcer
Recorder

NOTE: No official can act in more than one role simultaneously. They may only undertake a new role after all the obligations of their previous role have been fulfilled.

OWS3.2 For events of 10km or less the Safety Officer and Course Officer's positions and duties are combined. (SA AOWS3.2)

OWS4 DUTIES OF OFFICIALS (WA OWS3)

The CHIEF REFEREE shall:

OWS4.1 Have full control and authority over all officials and shall approve their assignments and instruct them regarding all special features or regulations related to the competition. The Referee shall enforce all the rules and decisions of WA, SA and SNSW and shall decide all questions relating to the actual conduct of the competition, the final settlement of which is not otherwise covered by these Rules; (WA OWS3.1)

OWS4.2 Have authority to intervene in the competition at any stage to ensure that the Rules are observed; (WA OWS3.2)

- OWS4.2.1 In case of hazardous conditions that jeopardise the safety of the competitors and the officials, in conjunction with the Safety Officer, they can stop the race; (WA OWS3.1.2.1)
- OWS4.3 Adjudicate on all protests related to the competition in progress (WA OWS3.1.3)
- OWS4.4 Give a decision in cases where the Judges' decisions and times recorded do not agree; (WA OWS3.1.4)
- OWS4.5 Signal to competitors, by raised flag and short blasts on a whistle, that the start is imminent and when satisfied indicate by pointing the flag at the Starter that the competition may commence; (WA OWS3.1.5)
- OWS4.6 Disqualify any competitor for any violation of the Rules that they personally observe or which is reported to them by other authorised officials. (WA OWS3.1.6)
- Notwithstanding the provisions of OWS6.3 hereof the Referee may decide to enforce the disqualification at the end of the race. (SA OWS4.1.6)
- OWS4.7 Ensure that all necessary Officials for the conduct of the competition are at their respective posts. They may appoint substitutes for any who are absent, incapable of acting or found to be inefficient. They may appoint additional Officials if considered necessary; (WA OWS3.1.7)
- OWS4.8 Receive all reports prior to the start of the race and at the conclusion of the race from the Clerk of the Course, Recorder, Course Officer and Safety Officer; to ensure all competitors are accounted for. (WA OWS3.1.8)
- The REFEREES shall:
- OWS4.9 Have authority to intervene in competition at any stage to ensure that WA, SA and SNSW Rules are observed. (WA OWS3.2.1)
- OWS4.10 Disqualify any competitor for any violation of the Rules that they personally observe. (WA OWS3.2.1)
- The STARTER shall:
- OWS4.11 Start the race in accordance with OWS5 following the signal by the Chief Referee; (WA OWS3.3.1)

The CHIEF TIMEKEEPER shall:

- OWS4.12 Assign at least two Timekeepers to their positions for the start and finish; (WA OWS3.4.1)
- OWS4.13 Ensure that a time check is made to allow all persons to synchronise their watches with the official running clocks fifteen (15) minutes before start time; (WA OWS3.4.2)
- OWS4.14 Collect from each Timekeeper a card showing the time recorded for each competitor, and, if necessary, inspect their watches; and (WA OWS3.4.3)
- OWS4.15 Record or examine the official time on the card for each competitor. (WA OWS 3.4.4)
- OWS4.16 TIMEKEEPERS shall:
- Take the time of each of competitor/s assigned. The watches must have memory and print out capability and shall be certified correct to the satisfaction of the Meet Committee. (WA OWS3.5.1)
- OWS4.17 Start their watches at the starting signal, and only stop their watches when instructed by the Chief Timekeeper; (WA OWS3.5.2)
- OWS4.18 Promptly after each finish record the time and competitor's number on the timecard and turn it over to the Chief Timekeeper. (WA OWS3.5.3)
- NOTE: When Automatic Officiating Equipment is used, the same complement of hand timers is to be used.

The CHIEF FINISH JUDGE shall:

- OWS4.19 Assign each Judge to a position; (WA OWS3.6.1)
- OWS4.20 Record and communicate any decision received from the Referees during the competition (WA OWS3.6.2)
- OWS4.21 Collect after the race, signed results sheets from each Finish Judge and establish the result and placings which shall be sent directly to the Recorder. (WA OWS3.6.3)

OWS4.22 Confirm to each race judge their escort boat and instruct them in their duties. (WA OWS3.6.4)

OWS4.23 Collect after the race, signed sheets from each Race Judge of their observations during the race which shall be sent directly to the Recorder. (WA OWS3.6.5)

FINISH JUDGES, (two) shall:

OWS4.25 Be positioned in line with the finish where they shall have, at all times, a clear view of the finish; (WA OWS3.7.1)

OWS4.26 Record after each finish the placing of the competitors according to the assignment given. (WA OWS3.7.2)

NOTE: Finish Judges shall not act as Timekeepers in the same event.

Each RACE JUDGE shall:

OWS4.27 Be positioned in an escort safety craft (where applicable), assigned by random draw prior to the start, to be able to observe, at all times, their appointed competitor; (WA OWS3.8.1)

OWS4.28 Ensure at all times that the Rules of competition are complied with, violations being recorded in writing and reported to a Referee at the earliest opportunity; (WA OWS3.8.2)

OWS4.29 Have the power to order a competitor from the water upon expiry of any time limit so ordered by the Chief Referee; (WA OWS3.8.3)

OWS4.30 Ensure that their appointed competitor does not take unfair advantage or commit unsporting impediment to another competitor and, if the situation requires, instruct a competitor to maintain clearance from any other competitor. (WA OWS3.8.4)

TURN JUDGES shall:

OWS4.31 Be positioned to ensure all competitors execute the alterations in course as indicated in the competition information documents and as given at the pre-race briefing; (WA OWS3.9.1)

OWS4.32 Record any infringement of the turn procedures on the record sheets provided and indicate the infringement at the time by blasts on a whistle; then immediately communicate the infringement to the Chief Referee; (WA OWS3.9.2) (SA OWS4.9.2)

OWS4.33 Promptly upon completion of the event deliver the signed record sheet to the Chief Finish Judge. (WA OWS3.9.3)

The SAFETY OFFICER shall:

OWS4.34 Be responsible to the Chief Referee for all aspects of safety related to the conduct of the competition; (WA OWS3.12.1)

OWS4.35 Check that the entire course, with special regard to the start and finish areas, is safe, suitable, and free of any obstruction; (WA OWS3.12.2)

OWS4.36 Be responsible for ensuring that sufficient powered safety craft are available during the competition to provide full safety backup to the escort safety craft; (WA OWS3.12.3)

OWS4.37 Provide, prior to the competitions, to all competitors a tide/current chart clearly indicating the time of tide changes on the course and showing the effect of tides or current on a competitor's progress along the course; (WA OWS3.12.4)

OWS4.38 In conjunction with the Medical Officer, advise the Chief Referee if, in their opinion, conditions are unsuitable for staging the competition and make recommendations for the modification of the course or the way the competition is conducted. (WA OWS3.12.5)

OWS4.39 monitor temperature conditions periodically during the race.(WA OWS3.12.6)

The MEDICAL OFFICER shall:

OWS4.39 Be responsible to the Chief Referee for all medical aspects related to the competition and competitors; (WA OWS3.13.1)

OWS4.40 Inform the local medical facilities of the nature of the competition and ensure that any casualties can be evacuated to medical facilities at the earliest opportunity; (WA OWS3.13.2)

OWS4.41 In conjunction with the Safety Officer, advise the Chief Referee if, in their opinion, conditions are unsuitable for staging the competition and make recommendations for the modification of the course or the way the competition is conducted. (WA OWS3.13.3)

The COURSE OFFICER shall:

OWS4.42 Be responsible to the Meet Committee for the correct survey of the course, (WA OWS3.14.1)

OWS4.43 Ensure the start and finish areas are correctly marked and all equipment has been correctly installed and, where applicable, is in working order; (WA OWS3.14.2)

OWS4.44 Ensure all course alteration points are correctly marked, and manned prior to the commencement of the competition; (WA OWS3.14.1)

OWS4.45 With the Referee and Safety Officer inspect the course and markings prior to the commencement of competition; (WA OWS3.14.4)

OWS4.46 Ensure that Turn Judges are in position prior to the start of the competition and report this to the Chief Referee. (WA OWS3.14.5)

The CLERK OF THE COURSE shall:

OWS4.47 Assemble and prepare competitors prior to each event and ensure proper reception facilities at the finish are available for all competitors; (WA OWS3.15.1)

OWS4.48 Ensure each competitor is identified correctly with their race number and that all competitors have trimmed fingernails and toenails and are not wearing any jewellery, including watches; (WA OWS3.15.2)

OWS4.49 Be certain all competitors are present, in the assembly area, at the required time prior to the start; (WA OWS3.15.3)

OWS4.50 Keep competitors and officials informed of the time remaining before the start at suitable intervals until the last five minutes, during which one minute warnings shall be given; (WA OWS3.15.4)

OWS4.51 Be responsible for ensuring that all clothing and equipment left in the start area is transported to the finish area and kept in safekeeping; (WA OWS3.15.5)

OWS4.52 Ensure that all competitors leaving the water at the finish have the basic equipment required for their wellbeing should their own attendants not be present at that time. (WA OWS3.15.6)

The RECORDER shall:

OWS4.53 Record withdrawals from the competition, enter results on official forms, and maintain record for team awards as appropriate. (WA OWS3.16.1)

Each FEEDING PLATFORM JUDGE shall:

OWS 4.56 Be responsible for the management of the activity and the competitors' authorised representatives present on the platform, in accordance with WA rules. (WA OWS3.10.1)

OWS5 THE START

OWS5.1 All Open Water competitions shall start with all competitors wearing an approved swim cap and standing on a fixed platform or in water depth sufficient for them to commence swimming on the start signal. (WA OWS4.1)

OWS5.1.1 When starting from a fixed platform competitors shall be assigned a position on the platform, as determined by random draw. (WA OWS4.1.1)

OWS5.2 The Clerk of the Course shall keep competitors and officials informed of the time before start at suitable intervals and at one-minute intervals for the last five minutes. (WA OWS4.2)

OWS5.3 When the numbers of entries dictate the start shall be segregated in the Men's and Women's competitions. The Men's event shall always start before the Women's event for safety reasons. (WA OWS4.3)

OWS5.4 The start line shall be clearly defined by either overhead apparatus or by removable equipment at water level. (WA OWS4.4)

OWS5.5 The Chief Referee shall indicate by a flag held upright and short blasts on a whistle when the start is imminent and indicate that the competition is under Starter's orders by pointing the flag at the Starter. (WA OWS4.5)

- OWS5.6 The Starter shall be positioned to be clearly visible to all competitors. (WA OWS4.6)
- OWS5.6.1 On the Starter's command "Take your Marks" all competitors shall take up a starting position immediately in line with the start line where a platform is not used, or with at least one foot at the front of the platform. (WA OWS4.6.1)
- OWS5.6.2 The Starter will give the starting signal when they consider all competitors are ready. (WA OWS4.6.2)
- OWS5.7 The start signal shall be both audible and visual. (WA OWS4.7)
- OWS5.8 If in the opinion of the Chief Referee unfair advantage has been gained at the start the offending competitor will be given a yellow or red flag in accordance with OWS 6.3. (WA OWS4.8)
- OWS5.9 All escort safety craft shall be stationed prior to the start so as not to interfere with any competitor, and, if picking up their competitor from behind shall navigate in such a way as not to maneuver through the field of competitors.
- OWS5.10 Although they may start together, in all other respects the men's and women's competitions shall be treated as separate events. (WA OWS4.10)
- OWS6 THE RACE (WA OWS6)**
- OWS6.1 All Open Water competitions shall be Freestyle events and competitors are required to complete the whole course, respecting all designated turning buoys and course boundaries. (WA OWS5.1)
- OWS6.2 Race Judges shall instruct any competitor who is, in their opinion, taking unfair advantage by pacing or slip streaming with the escort craft to move clear. (WA OWS5.2)
- OWS6.3 Disqualification Procedure (WA OWS5.3)
- OWS6.3.1 If in the Opinion of the Chief Referee or Referees, any competitor, or competitor's approved representative, or escort safety craft takes advantage by committing any violation of the Rules or by making intentional contact with any competitor, the following proceeding shall apply: (WA OWS5.3.1)

1st Infringement:

A yellow flag and a card bearing the competitor's number shall be raised to indicate and to inform the competitor that they are in violation of the Rules. (WA OWS5.3.1.1)

2nd Infringement:

A red flag and a card bearing the competitor's number shall be raised by the Referee (OWS4.6) to indicate and to inform the competitor that they are for the second time in violation of the Rules. The competitor shall be disqualified. They must leave the water immediately and be placed in an escort craft and take no further part in the race. (WA OWS5.3.1.2)

- OWS6.3.2 If in the opinion of the Referee, an action of a competitor or an escort safety craft, or a competitor's approved representative is deemed to be "unsporting" the Referee shall disqualify the competitor concerned immediately. (WA OWS5.3.2)
- OWS6.4 Escort safety craft shall maneuver so as not to obstruct or place themselves directly ahead of any competitor and not take unfair advantage by pacing or slip streaming. (WA OWS5.4)
- OWS6.5 Escort safety craft shall attempt to maintain a constant position to station the competitor at, or forward of, the midpoint of the escort safety craft. (WA OWS5.5)
- OWS6.6 Standing on the bottom during a race shall not disqualify a competitor, but they may not walk or jump. (WA OWS5.6)
- OWS6.7 With the exception of Rule OWS6.6 above, competitors shall not receive support from any fixed or floating object and shall not intentionally touch or be touched by their escort safety craft or crew therein. (WA OWS5.7)
- OWS6.7.1 Rendering assistance by an official Medical Officer to a competitor in apparent distress should always supersede official rules of disqualification through "intentional contact" with a competitor (SA OWS6.2.7) (WA OWS5.7.1)
- OWS6.8 For races where escort boats are used, each escort safety craft shall contain: a Race Judge, a person of the competitor's choice and the minimum crew required to operate the escort safety craft. (WA OWS5.8)

- OWS 6.8.1 Each escort safety craft shall display the competitors competition number to be easily seen from either side of the escort safety craft. (WA OWS5.8.1)
- OWS6.9 Each safety craft shall contain appropriately qualified safety personnel and the minimum crew required to operate the safety craft. (WA OWS5.9)
- OWS6.10 No competitor shall be permitted to use or wear any device which may be an aid to their speed, endurance or buoyancy. An approved swimsuit, goggles, a maximum of two (2) caps, nose clip and earplugs may be used. (WA OWS5.10)
- OWS6.11 Competitors shall be allowed to use grease or other such substances provided these are not, in the opinion of the Chief Referee, excessive. (WA OWS5.11)
- OWS6.12 The pacing of a competitor by another person entering the water is not permitted. (WA OWS5.12)
- OWS6.13 Coaching and the giving of instructions by the approved competitor's representative on the feeding platform or in the escort safety craft is permitted. No whistle shall be allowed. (WA OWS5.13)
- OWS6.14 When taking sustenance competitors may use Rule OWS6.6 provided Rule OWS6.7 is not infringed. (WA OWS5.14)
- OWS6.15 No objects can be thrown from the feeding platform to the competitors, including sustenance. The competitors shall receive their feeding in biodegradable containers directly from their representative by a feeding pole or by hand. (WA OWS5.15)
- OWS6.16 Feeding poles are not to exceed 5m in length when extended. No objects rope or wire may hang off the end of feeding poles except for competitors' identification, which is allowed to be attached to the feeding pole but may not exceed the size of 30cm x 20 cm. (WA OWS5.16)
- OWS6.17 In all events, time limits shall apply as follows from the finish time of the first competitors:
- 15 minutes per 5km (or part thereof) up to a maximum time limit of 120 minutes. (WA OWS5.17)

- OWS6.17.1 Competitors who do not finish the course within the time limits shall be removed from the water except that the Chief Referee may allow a competitor outside the time limit to complete the course but not be eligible for any points or prizes. (WA OWS5.17.1)
- OWS6.18 Emergency Abandonment (WA OWS5.18)
- OWS6.18.1 In cases of emergency abandonment of races of 10 km or less, the race will be restarted from the beginning at the earliest possible moment. (WA OWS5.18.1)
- OWS6.18.2 Where a competitor/s has completed the race prior to abandonment, the final ranking will be as reported by the Chief Referee having regard to those competitor(s) who have already finished.
- OWS6.18.3 In cases of emergency abandonment for any race of longer than 10km, the final ranking will be as reported by the Chief Referee. If 2 hours of the race have not been completed, it will be restarted from the beginning at the earliest moment possible. (WA OWS5.18.2)
- OWS7 THE FINISH OF THE RACE (SA OWS7)**
- OWS7.1 Escort safety craft should be stationed at the approach to and entrance of the finish lane to ensure that only the escort safety craft authorised to do so enter or cross this entrance. (SA OWS6.1)
- OWS7.2 The final places will be determined by the Chief Referee based upon the finish judges' report and the finish video. (SA OWS6.2)
- OWS7.3 It is mandatory for all competitors to wear a microchip transponder on each wrist throughout the race. If a competitor loses a transponder the Race Judge or other authorised Official, will immediately inform the Chief Referee who will instruct the responsible Official on the water to issue a replacement transponder. Any competitor who finishes the race without at least one transponder will be disqualified. (WA OWS6.3)
- OWS7.4 When, at the finish of an Open Water Swimming competition, a vertical wall is available, competitors must touch the vertical wall to finish the race. Any competitor who does not touch the vertical wall will be disqualified. (SA OWS6.4)

- OWS7.5 The Finish Judges and Timekeepers shall be placed so as to be able to observe the finish at all times. The area in which they are stationed should be for their exclusive use. (WA OWS6.5)
- OWS7.6 Every effort should be made to ensure that the competitors' representative can get from the escort safety craft to meet the competitor as they leave the water. (WA OWS6.6)
- OWS7.7 Upon leaving the water some competitors may require assistance. Competitors should only be touched or handled if they clearly display a need or ask for assistance. (WA OWS6.7)
- OWS7.8 A member of the Medical Team should inspect the competitors as they leave the water. A chair, on which the competitor can sit while an assessment is made, should be provided. (WA OWS6.8)
- OWS7.9 Once cleared by the Medical Member, competitors should be given access to refreshment. (WA OWS6.9)

PARA SWIMMING RULES

All Swimming New South Wales Limited (the Company) Para Swimming, Multi Class Swimming Championships and Multi Class Swimming competitions shall be governed by IPC, Swimming Australia Limited, World Para Swimming (WPS) and SNSW Rules and By-Laws, as determined from time to time, with the exceptions and additions as noted within the following sections.
